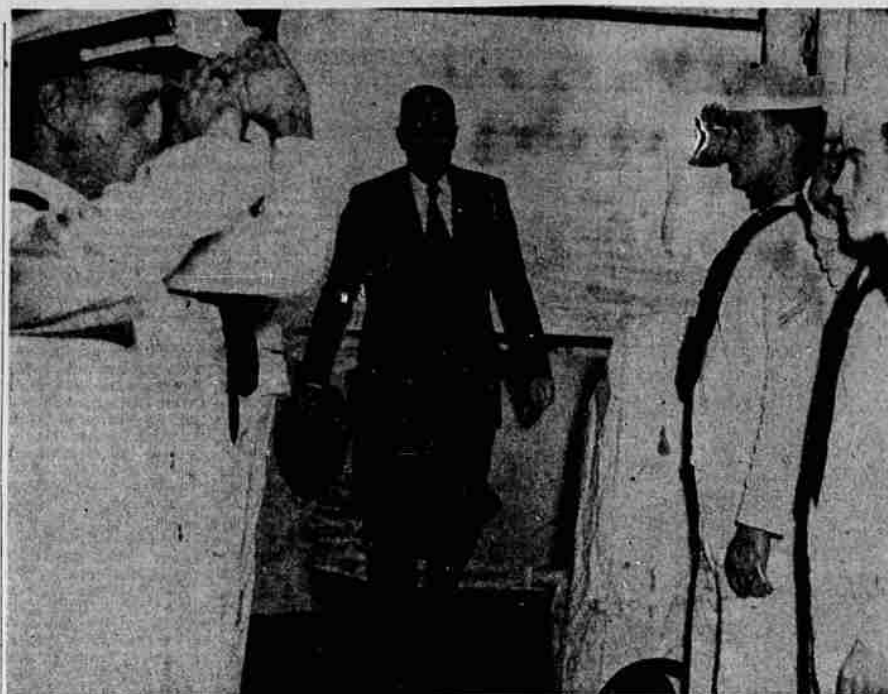
Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Huebner and Mr. and Mrs. Clay Shepherd have both rented houses of Norman Aaby, and have taken possession.

Rescue Boats Searching For Lost RAF Bomber

BARROW-IN-FURNESS, Eng. (AP)—Rescue boats groped through a blinding blizzard of England's west coast Tuesday, seeking possible survivors from an American-built Royal Air Force bomber which vanished in the storm with its crew of seven.

The airmen, bound from Prestwick, Scotland, to the Azores on a training flight, were equipped with inflatable life preservers.

The plane was one of a number of B29 Superfortresses, known in Britain as Washingtons, turned over to the RAF by the U. S. Air Force after World War II.

Increased Jobs By March Seen

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government says a survey of employers indicates belief the tide of unemployment is turning and a modest increase in jobs can be expected between now and March.

That is the summary made by the Labor Department's Bureau of Employment Security of hiring forecasts obtained from employers by various state employment service offices.

The government's latest figures indicate unemployment this month may top two million.

The department said:
1. Over half of the 149 major labor market areas surveyed anticipated little or no change in over-all employment between January and March.

2. But one-third of the areas looked for slight to moderate job gains in the first quarter. These areas included Los Angeles, St. Louis, Baltimore, Cincinnati, Atlanta, Providence and Seattle.

Oregon Dairyman Battles State's License Demand

SALEM (AP)—Elmer Deetz, Canby dairyman, answered the State Agriculture Department's refusal to grant him a grade A milk license Monday by giving evidence that his milk meets the bacteria standards set up by the department.

Deetz, who sells milk in gallon jugs to his neighbors, also served notice that he regards Monday's hearing as a prelude to a court suit in which Deetz said he would contend that the department's milk regulations are unconstitutional.

The department, which ordered Deetz to appear Monday to show cause why Deetz' license should not be granted, admitted that Deetz did meet the bacteria standards.

But John D. Nichols, assistant attorney general representing the department, said Deetz did not meet other standards, such as the department's bottling and cleaning of utensils, that Deetz doesn't have windows of his milkhouse screened and that he doesn't have acceptable bottling and capping equipment.

Deetz contended that as long as he meets the bacteria count, then he doesn't have to meet the other standards.

Norman Easley, attorney for Deetz, said that Deetz doesn't even have to have a license, since he doesn't distribute milk. The law, he says, doesn't apply to those who only produce the milk.

Easley said Deetz couldn't comply with the department's bottling and capping regulations, because there is no available equipment for use of gallon jugs.

Easley said it would cost Deetz \$5,000 to rebuild his milkhouse to meet the department's requirements.

Initiative Poised
Deetz also is attacking, by an initiative measure, the state milk control law, under which prices and production quotas are fixed. Monday's hearing, however, dealt only with the fluid milk law, under which the department regulates the health and sanitation of milk.

Nichols, answering Easley, said the bacteria count is only one of the health standards in the law. "Bacteria count," Nichols said, "has only a limited relevance in determining the quality of the milk. It has nothing to do with the ability of a dairyman to consistently produce good milk."

He added that the department's regulations are reasonable.

Answering Easley's argument that the regulations are unconstitutional, Nichols replied that "no one has a right to exercise his natural rights in a manner that would jeopardize his fellow man."

Deetz said he has 12 producing registered Jersey cows on his 24-acre farm, which he occupied in 1950. He said he started the gallon jug business in the summer of 1950, when he couldn't find a regular market for his milk, and his neighbors started buying it.

Housewife Frees Self From Coal Furnace

FLINT, Mich. (AP)—"I had just given up to die but God got me out."

Mrs. Marie Wilson, 51, housewife, had put her head in her coal-burning furnace in trying to retrieve a battle plate gas deflector which had fallen from the back of the furnace interior.

A second plate fell on her head. Her head was pinned down. It must have been 40 minutes before she freed herself, she said later. After treatment for face and arm burns and a bruise on her head, Mrs. Wilson went home from Hurley Hospital.

Top Officials Believe Strike Vote Idea Dead

WASHINGTON (AP)—Top administration officials were reported convinced today that President Eisenhower's proposal for secret government-supervised strike votes in labor disputes is all but dead.

The proposal was certain to come in for more discussion during Secretary of Labor Mitchell's return appearance at a Senate Labor Committee hearing for further questioning on Eisenhower's 14-point program for revising the Taft-Hartley labor law.

Mitchell, due half an hour later before the House Labor Committee, was to be followed at the Senate hearing by W. B. Barton, general counsel of the U. S. chamber of commerce.

Informed sources who asked not to be quoted by name said the administration has been doubtful all along that Congress would approve the strike vote recommendation. They said Eisenhower's chief labor advisers now feel the proposal would meet overpowering opposition in the Senate.

Water Service Restored At St. Helens Tuesday

ST. HELENS (AP)—Water service to this Columbia River town was fully restored early Tuesday and residents heaved a sigh of relief that there had been no serious fires.

The threat of fire without an adequate water supply has been the principal concern of city officials. The main water pipe line from Salmonberry Dam, 12 miles west, was snapped by a landslide Saturday.

The break was discovered Sunday when the town's main reservoir ran dry.

An auxiliary well system and smaller reservoir supplied some water but there was not enough pressure to carry it to the higher half of the city.

Senate Committee Approves Beeson

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Labor Committee Tuesday approved Albert C. Beeson by a straight 7 to 6 party line vote as a member of the National Labor Relations Board.

The vote came soon after John Lewis denounced the Eisenhower appointment as a "self-styled union-buster."

And, immediately after the vote, Republicans and Democrats hurled charges at each other from the committee bench.

Sen. Lehman (D-NY) accused Republicans of "an attempt to steamroller the nomination through the committee without hearings sufficient to disclose all the facts."

Three Republicans members accused the Democrats of "delaying tactics" and "steam-roller in reverse."

ANTI-TRUST SUITS

WASHINGTON (AP)—Atty. Gen. Brownell Tuesday announced the filing of anti-trust actions against the nation's four largest pencil manufacturers, charging them with a price-fixing conspiracy.

He said a criminal information and a civil action were filed Tuesday morning in the Federal District Court at Newark, N.J., naming Eberhard Faber Pencil Co. of Brooklyn; Eagle Pencil Co. of New York City; Joseph Dixon Crucible Co. of Jersey City; and American Lead Pencil Co. of Hoboken, N.J.
