# Anti-Picketing Unconstitutional, Ruling Of Judge

GRANTS PASS — Circuit Judge O. J. Millard Thursday declared Oregon's anti-picketing law unconstitutional.

In a 40-page opinion, he said that section 17 of the law—the section restricting picketing—"is clearly unconstitutional."

The judge took note, though, that this is not the final word: "We are cognizant of the fact that this is a test case as announced by both counsels and no doubt will be appealed to the State supreme court where the question can be resolved."

The case was one in which Fred G. Scherer, state labor examiner, asked for an injunction to make the AFL Culinary Alliance stop picketing the Cave Shop Restaurant here owned by Dwight C. Bateley. Scherer had held against the union after a hearing and told it, under authority of the anti-picketing law passed in the 1953 Legislature, to stop picketing. The union refused so Scherer went to court to enforce his order.

Traffic was still one way a mile north of Myrtle Creek where a previous slide had choked traffic. The Umpqua Highway from Drain to Reedport was closed for two or three hours last night between Elkton and Scottsburg by a slide, but it was open today. A detour went out north of Gardiner on Highway 101, but it also was open today.

Shows in the mountainous areas last night made travel difficult but still possible with chains, the Highway Dept. reported. A total 25 inches of new snow fell on the Siskiyou and Green Springs highways. Both the Santiam and Willamette passes are still open and the East Diamond Lake Highway is open with spots of one-way traffic. The Union Creek road is closed.

Meanwhile, both California Oregon Power Co. and Pacific Telephone and Telegraph in Douglas County were still repairing damages from the early-week snow storm. Manager Jack McGuire of P & T in Roseburg reported all telephone lines should be working again today. He said two were out in Roseburg and several in the surrounding areas, but "most will be back in shape by tomorrow."

Also in Douglas County, the Southern Pacific Railroad reported from Grants Pass a slide between Glendale and Roseburg closed its line late Wednesday, halting train movements. The SP main line to California is not affected.

agreements other than treaties could become internal law only by act of Congress.

This was offered as a substitute for bricker's proposal which in a clause opposed vigorously by President Eisenhower, says "a treaty shall become effective as internal law in the United States only through legislation which would be valid in the absence of treaty."

Eisenhower contends this would give the states power to repudiate some treaties. Bricker says that is not true. George said his proposal would eliminate the effect of the "which" clause.

George, who will be 76 years old tomorrow and who has rounded out more than 30 years of Senate service, appeared to have come up with a suggestion that Eisenhower's Senate lieutenants might elect to compromise a fight that has split Republicans.

Senate debate on the Bricker proposal began Wednesday before a packed gallery.

Sen Knowland of California, the GOP floor leader, hurried a draft of the Georgian's proposal to the White House, State and Justice Departments and was awaiting replies. George himself said he had discussed it with Eisenhower but gave no indication of the President's reaction.

# Dulles Lashes Back At Molotov Proposal

Molotov is trying to replace the United Nations with a council of five which he said would take over responsibility for running the world.

The Dulles argument hit hard at the five-power conference suggestion which all three Western ministers have already rejected.

But at the same time, the Western delegations are extremely sensitive to peace hopes, especially with respect to Indochina. They were clearly determined to explore all possibilities of a settlement in case Molotov has anything serious in mind.

Dulles, Foreign Secretary Eden and Foreign Minister Bidault lunched together at noon and apparently decided on their tactics to take a tough line on the five-power conference. At least that was the line being taken by Dulles, who sought to move Molotov on to a discussion of the German question.

Dulles told Molotov it was obvious the proposed five-power conference could not be a temporary one. He said it was "incredible" that the four here, plus Chou En-Lai, would be able to solve political, military and economic problems with which the United Nations had grappled for nine years.

The tasks which Molotov outlined Wednesday for the five-power meeting ranging from atomic disarmament to Asian settlements—would compel it to become permanent, Dulles said.

Dulles then made his demand to move on in these words: "My feeling is that we have had an adequate first round exchange of views on this subject (the five-power idea) and that without getting what has been said we should now move on to an exchange of views regarding the problems relating to Germany and Austria."

The commissioners, the survey team said, would serve as adjudicators at the start to assist in cleaning up a backlog of some 15,000 to 20,000 pending cases, including land disposal and oil and gas leasing matters.

The survey team also recommended reducing the number of regional BLM offices from the present seven to one for states west of the Continental Divide and one for state east of the divide.

The team further recommended locating district grazing and forestry offices "in grazing and forest areas where close attention to management problems is required."

The reorganization is expected to take about a year.

# Nine Of 21 American POWs Classed As Stool Pigeons

TOKYO — At least 9 of 21 American prisoners who turned their backs on their homeland acted as stool pigeons for Chinese guards in North Korean prison camps, the U.N. Command officially disclosed tonight.

The nine were accused of informing on fellow prisoners. The UNC said of the 21: Four expected to be punished if they returned and were afraid to come back.

Five were sent to China during their captivity for further schooling. Seven were either selected for or promised more schooling in Red China.

Five were considered weak and not sincere in their Communist beliefs. "Reasons they stayed with the Reds were: they fell in love with Chinese women; they hoped to get something for nothing; and they were promised educations in China."

Twelve were "Progressives" from the first days of capture and active in all kinds of Red activity in the prison camps. Twenty of the 21 were regular Army men. One was a draftee. Three were artillerymen, two were medical aidmen. There were two engineers and the rest were infantrymen.

Five are 21 years old and the oldest is 32. The average age is 23½. Nineteen are single, two married. Three are Negroes. Ten had an average of two years in high school. One had 3½ years of college and another graduated from college. Two completed grammar school only and two didn't finish grammar school. One only completed the sixth grade.

Not a single one of the 21 had any military or political activity prior to entering the Army. The Allied spokesman said 10 of the 21 came from low-income homes. Most of the others were from middle class families. One is the son of an Army officer.

One of the 21 is an orphan who was adopted at the age of 11. Two came from broken homes. Before entering the Army, five were restaurant workers, four were truck drivers, three were mechanics' helpers; one was a bakery employe at a service station attendant, sales clerk, machine operator, and welder. Four were never employed.
