McCarthy Given Investigation Fund Allowance

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate apparently set itself Wednesday to invest upward of half a million dollars in work of its two subcommittees which trail Communists.
 1. It voted \$228,000 for its internal security subcommittee, headed by Sen. Jenner (R-Ind.).
 2. The Rules Committee endorsed a fund of \$266,000 for Sen. McCarthy's (R-La.) investigations subcommittee. This is yet to be passed on by the Senate itself.

The money for Jenner's subcommittee was approved by voice vote without objection although Sen. Ellender (D-La.) complained that there seemed to be duplication of the work by Jenner's group, McCarthy's group and the House Un-American Activities Committee. Jenner replied that some duplication couldn't be avoided but "it's healthy work we all are doing."

Because of the "vast extent" of the Communist conspiracy, Jenner said, "there is plenty of room" for all committees.

Jenner is also head of the Rules Committee which earlier a resolution to allow \$266,000 to McCarthy's group. He said the action was unanimous with all members present except Sen. Hennings (D-Mo.).

Accused Kidnap Given 18 Years in Penitentiary

PENDLETON (AP) — James Aguilar, 24, Kennewick, Wash., Wednesday was sentenced to 18 years in the Oregon State Prison by Circuit Judge William W. Wells.
 He was one of four men charged with kidnaping a state policeman, Laurence Keizer, here last October. Two of his companions earlier had been sentenced to terms of 25 and 15 years.

A fourth man, Robert Ellsworth Stultz, also of Kennewick, will go on trial here Feb. 1.
 Earlier this week Aguilar slightly wounded two sheriff's deputies in an escape attempt and they filed a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon against him.

Specialist Says Potato More Than Fat Producer

CINCINNATI (AP) — The potato deserves more respect than just that of a fat producer, A. E. Mercker, a research specialist, says.
 "It actually contains a great number of nutrients," says Mercker, who is connected with the U.S. Department of Agriculture.
 "It has potash, iron, and the very desirable amino-acids," he told the Potato Chip Institute at its annual convention yesterday. "We also must remember that it used to be an old remedy for scurvy."
 There has been a great let-down in potato eating, although the potato chip and frozen varieties have increased considerably, Mercker said.
