Most shoulder pain is not due to arthritis of the joint. The shoulder joint offers the greatest range of motion of any joint in the body. Because of this fact it falls heir to strains and stresses not experienced by joints of lesser mobility. One of the most common causes of shoulder pain is the inflammation of the bursa (bursitis). A bursa may be defined as a fluid filled, sac-like structure which serves to lessen friction between muscles and tendons as they glide over the other. The inflammation may come on suddenly and produce severe pain or it may be gradual in its onset. In cases of long standing, calcium may become deposited in the bursa, further complicating the situation. Aching pain in the back part of the shoulder is often the result of irritation of the connective tissue of this loosely constructed joint. Movement of the shoulder frequently creates a condition, and frequently severe limitation of motion results. This so-called shoulder fibrositis is very common and may be mistaken for arthritis. Persistent fibrositis may lead to "frozen-shoulder" which causes dull, aching pain accompanied by attempts to move the almost motionless joint. Shoulder pain may be the principal or only symptom of arthritis of the lower vertebrae of the neck due to pressure on the nerves which leaves the spine at this level to supply the joint. In this situation as well as for bursitis and fibrositis prompt recovery and full use of the part depends upon proper care of the functional disabilities to which it is heir. (Pd. Adv.)

schools. "Unless there is a well-educated population, democracy would have a pretty hard row to hoe."

Richards emphasized that "commerce and education are a team." He said he believes high school curricula should be adapted to business. He went on to say that "students should be served according to their own life plans."

Deller said Richards touched upon what he thinks is the most critical point in the mind of those who have to plan for future increased enrollment when he said, "The lag between the development of school plants and the development of industry is the greatest of anywhere, especially in the Northwest."

MacNaughton told the group that "education must be geared to a better understanding of the world problems." He too emphasized a general education in the humanities.

Jacobson clarified the group that, through valid achievement tests, the general achievement of demost children today is higher than 20-40 years ago. He answered the query, "Why then do we get high school graduates who cannot spell and do 'stampa mathematics'?" by illustrating that up to comparatively recent times those who went to high school were a select group. Today, every child up to 1 years (with minor exceptions) must attend high school. Hence, Jacobson continued, we have a greater number of pupils at both ends of the ability scale.

ference Saturday Dulles went beyond that and called for acceptance of a Germany which would take its full place in what he called a "natural community" of European countries. He specifically referred to the (Schuman plan) coal and steel community to which West Germany already belongs, and to the proposed European Defense Community to which West Germany has subscribed. A main purpose of Russia in the Berlin meeting is to try to block EDC and the German rearmament which would go with it. Bidault declared at the final session of the first week of the Big Four conference that the Russian proposal to establish a German government without free elections would revive the very elements that brought about World War II. He said it would create a Germany "dominated by militarist elements" paying "one cent a mp against the other."

French Air Force Attacks Poud Vietminh Rebels

HANOI, Indochina (AP)—Artillery and air attacks, including napalm bombs, blasted "hundreds" of Vietminh rebels spotted today north of Dien Bien Phu, the French fortress stronghold in northwest Indochina. The French Command claimed "many" killed and wounded among the Communist rebels without giving specific figures.

figure represents an increase of 2,888,000 board feet over the 1952 cut. Timber sale volume also was up during the year, but average price of all species of trees was down for the year. Stumpage value was \$2,850,000, an average of \$13.01 per thousand feet sold. That compares to the average price of \$15.90 for all species in 1952. Volume sold was 217,214,000 board feet, an increase in one year of 48,190,000 feet. **So Decrease** There were 171 sales during the year, a decrease of 68. The Forest Service pooled a good fire record. Logged were 90 blazes, compared to a five-year average of 49. **Good Record** There were well confined, with but one fire covering 100 acres on a logged sale unit and another only 23. The rest amounted to little, except for time expended in locating them. **Seventy-eight** of the blazes were started by lightning; the remainder man-caused. **In other activities**, the forest supervisor: 1. Greeted the formation of an advisory committee. It was established to assist forest officials with policies and programs in recreation, lumbering, water and agriculture. 2.
