## Mrs. Roosevelt Names 3 Women Co-respondents

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Mrs. James Roosevelt names three women as co-respondents in a suit filed Thursday seeking separate maintenance from the son of former President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Two letters filed with the suit identify nine other women as having been intimate with her husband.

The letters, the suit charges, were written to her by him in 1945.

Mrs. Romelle Schneider Roosevelt, 38, James' former nurse, seeks \$2,000 a month support for herself and \$1,500 monthly for support of their three children.

Roosevelt, 46, who last week announced he would be a candidate for Congress from the 28th California District, had filed his own suit for separate maintenance last Jan. 18. He asked his wife be compelled to give him certain personal articles including a cigarette holder that belonged to his father. He claimed she had caused him "mental and physical anguish and distress."

## Charge Made McCarthy's Ex-Aide Shown Favors

FT. DIX, N.J. (AP) — The Ft. Dix information officer said Friday that an investigation is under way into "certain allegations" that G. David Schine got preferential treatment while taking prefabricating here.

Schine, 36, was staff consultant to Sen. McCarthy's (R-Wis.) permanent investigations subcommittee before he was drafted on Nov. 4 last.

McCarthy has denied intervening with the military for special treatment for his former aide.

The New York Post said Friday that the investigation stemmed from complaints voiced by Schine's fellow trainees.

## Power Supply Plentiful For Coming Season

TACOMA (AP) — Top power figures in the Pacific Northwest, from both public and private agencies, agreed here Thursday the region faces power shortages unless additional generating facilities are undertaken soon.

However, the group cast pleased glances at the current power picture. Full reservoirs and continued snappy weather have pushed electricity consumption to all-time highs.

## Kefauver Questions Concentrating Jobs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) said he will ask Pentagon officials to explain what he regards as "a dangerous policy of concentrating defense contracts in a single producer."

At his request, Chairman Saiton-stall (R-Mass.) called the Senate Armed Services Committee for a public inquiry into a 200-million-dollar contract for Army tanks with a General Motors subsidiary, Fisher Body Corp.

"This appears to be a dangerous departure from the principle of maintaining a very broad defense production base," Kefauver said in an interview, adding that destruction of a single plant could halt production.
