Captain Nielsen is making his last voyage as captain of the Kambodia before retiring. This last trip will be around the world. The ship left Copenhagen, Denmark, in November and is now bound for the Hawaiian Islands, the Orient, Singapore, India and through the Suez Canal and back up to Denmark. Aboard as passengers on this trip are Mr. and Mrs. Damon Trout, prominent Portlanders, who boarded the ship in Portland last week, and Mrs. Baker, a resident of Canada, who boarded the ship in Vancouver, B. C.

Captain Nielsen's wife and their three children, who are 21, 16 and 14 years of age, reside in Copenhagen. Ships he has captained have passed through the Panama Canal 110 times. He received the silver-ship award from his company upon his 100th trip through the canal.

The Kambodia, a freighter, carries 12 passengers. Mrs. Creamer was a passenger enroute from Denmark when it sailed Nov. 20 and six weeks later docked in San Francisco. Stops were made at numerous harbors in South America to take on cargo, as well as the Dutch Island of Curacao. At Coos Bay, timber is being loaded on the ship and in the Hawaiian Islands and the Orient, sugar and rice will be added to the cargo to be taken to Europe.

Mrs. Creamer went to Europe last May 6 aboard the freighter, "Mongolia," a 12-passenger ship, which sailed out of San Francisco. The Mongolia is a ship of the same Danish line as the Kambodia. The ship went through the Panama Canal and stopped at numerous points in the Virgin

Islands, before going to Ireland, England, France, Belgium, Germany and Denmark.

Mrs. Creamer reports a most interesting and enjoyable vacation trip aboard both freighters as well as the time she spent in the various countries of Europe. The freighters spent several days in every harbor the ship went into so that passengers were able to make dozens of sight-seeing tours.

Mrs. Creamer makes her home in the Oak Hill apartments on South Main Street. During her absence, Mr. and Mrs. Oluf Hansen made their home in her apartment. They just recently left for their home in Copenhagen, Denmark, following two years in Canada and the United States. Mr. Hansen managed the Roseburg City swimming pool during the summer months.

State President Is Speaker For AAUW

Mrs. Robert Y. Thornton, AAUW state president and guest speaker for the evening coffee meeting of the local AAUW branch held at the senior high school library pointed out the influence the 27 AAUW branches play throughout the state of Oregon, and in many communities have originated various cultural interests. Mrs. Thornton stressed the importance of the Fellowship program, that AAUW is the only group to sponsor scholarships for American and foreign women to do research and graduate work in universities throughout the world.

Oregon AAUW history dates back as far as 1905 when Portland, Eugene, Corvallis and Salem were the first branches to organize, and to date, there have been ten state presidents. Mrs. Thornton presented the highlights of the 1953 Minneapolis convention, Oregon being vividly

represented by the election of officers: vice president of the North Pacific region went to Mrs. Mabel W. Winston, Southern College of Education, Ashland; and National Committee Chairmanship for Status of Women went to Mrs. Gertrude Houk Fariss, principal of St. Helens Hall, Portland, past state and Portland branch presidents, and the past state legislative chairman.

Commander and Mrs. L. H. (Larry) French, former Roseburg residents now in Lisbon, Portugal, where the former is stationed with the MAAG Staff of the United States Embassy, have been enjoying numerous sight-seeing trips in Europe and Africa, according to word received here by friends.

Commander French was a pitcher with the Chicago Cubs and later was with the Pittsburgh Pirates for a number of years. His wife is the former Thelma Olin, a well-known actress and singer, and a resident of this city. After retiring from baseball, the family resided in Southern California. They have one son, Lawrence Jr.

Commander French arrived in Lisbon last May 12. Mrs. French made the trip over in June and was met in London by her husband. They enjoyed several days touring England and renewed friendships with former friends in New York, who are now in London. They report the British are certainly nice and possibly the most helpful people in Europe. They say they seem glad to see Americans and are apologetic for their lack of material things for the comfort of visitors. Commander and Mrs. French both thought the country especially beautiful and interesting historically beyond description. They stated they liked England, however, it is a very expensive country to visit.

From there, they went to Paris, where they stayed at the Lancaster Hotel, just a half block from Champs Elysees and three blocks from the Arch de Triump. They reported the shops lovely, prices sky high. They stated a good lunch with wine costs \$6 and dinner from \$8 to \$10.

From Paris, they toured Fontainebleau and Versailles. They state their impressions of France were that the people of that country are carefree and pleasure seeking and that they are not particularly endeared to Americans.

After a short stay in Lisbon, Commander and Mrs. French left for Casablanca July 9 to pick up their automobile. They crossed into French Morocco and Spanish Morocco to Tanger, after which they ferried the Mediterranean to Algiers, Spain. Interesting trips were taken throughout Spain and Portugal. Over the Labor Day holiday, they stayed at the beautiful summer resort at Bussaco at the Palace Hotel, a former imperial palace built in the 16th century, and done in Manuelino architecture.
