Narriman Wins Divorce From Ex-King Farouk

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—Beautiful, 29-year-old former Queen Narriman won a quick divorce in a Moslem religious court here today from her husband, King Farouk, after a month of behind-the-scenes negotiations.

The girl Farouk first saw in 1949 as she shopped for her engagement ring with another man renounced custody of her 2-year-old son, Ahmed Fadi, and also dropped her demand that the ex-king personally pay her monthly allowance of 5,000 Egyptian pounds (\$14,000) and a dowry allowance of 10,000 pounds (\$28,000).

Instead, her lawyer said, she will ask President Mohamed Naguib's revolutionary government to pay her those moneys out of Farouk's properties in Egypt, which the new regime confiscated when it deposed and exiled him in 1952.

Her chances of getting the money appear problematical.

Narriman in her divorce suit had charged her husband with adultery, malreatment, mental cruelty and estrangement.

Gunman Gets \$2,100 From Market Robbery

Marilyn Parries Questions Asked By Jap Reporters

TOKYO (AP)—Actress Marilyn Monroe, bride of baseball's great Joe DiMaggio, said today she has never seen a ball game.

"I met my husband after he had retired from active baseball," the pin-up star told a Japanese-American news conference.

With occasional help from Lefty O'Doul, San Diego club manager, Miss Monroe parried questions ranging from the risk to the ridiculous.

"How long have you been walking like that?" one Japanese correspondent asked as Miss Monroe swayed across the room.

"I started when I was 6 months old and haven't stopped yet," the blonde actress replied.

The actress had kept newsmen waiting nearly two hours, but quickly dispelled any resulting hostility by taking all questions in stride.

Pointing to a dark fur piece tossed carelessly over her left arm, a newsmen asked, "What is that?"

"Fox—and not the 20th Century kind," she quipped in obvious reference to the recent suspension of her film studio, 20th Century-Fox.

Asked about her suspension for failing to report for work on a new picture, she answered:

"I'm now under suspension. I read the script of the new movie and I didn't care for it. That doesn't mean I don't like musicals—I like good musicals."

While Miss Monroe talked to approximately 75 newsmen, DiMaggio was almost unnoticed in a corner of the room.

Rita And Dick Close Doors To Process Servers

NEW YORK (AP)—The door to the hotel suites of singer Dick Haymes and his actress wife, Rita Haymes, stayed shut Tuesday while two sheriff's deputies waited outside to arrest him on a civil writ.

The deputies took up their posts Monday night and still were standing by 15 hours later.

No food had been sent to the room since the couple had dinner shortly before the deputies arrived.

The deputies appeared at 8 p.m. with a civil arrest order obtained by Haymes' former wife, actress Joanne Dru.

Lawyers for Haymes and Miss Dru followed the officials on the scene; the door remained closed to them too. Then came reporters and photographers.

Miss Dru alleged in the complaint: Haymes concealed assets "for the purpose of defrauding creditors" and owes her \$33,323.12 since he has admitted he owes her \$32,000. He also has violated an agreement with her to give her 10 per cent of his earnings to clear the bill.

Alaska Statehood Bill Is Readied

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chairman Butler (R-Neb) Tuesday predicted the Senate Interior Committee will vote Thursday to send an Alaskan statehood bill to the Senate.

"Whether or not the subcommittee has completed its work," he said, "we'll risk perfecting the bill on the floor," he declared when asked by a newsmen what happened if the territories subcommittee does not complete its draft of the bill by Thursday.

The full committee agreed last week to vote on the Alaska bill by Feb. 4 and to meet Wednesday to discuss possible amendments to the subcommittee draft.

The subcommittee only Monday got down to a discussion of language and already reportedly has run into snags. Causing the trouble are provisions setting forth the proposed state's boundaries and possible entanglement with the long-standing controversy over the original land claims of the territory's natives, it was reported.

Pope Pius' Condition Reported As Unchanged

VATICAN CITY (AP)—After a week of treatment for a strengthening stomach condition, Pope Pius XII's condition was reported "unchanged" Tuesday.

He passed a quiet and restful night, but the hiccup which have afflicted him since Jan. 26 have not gone completely, according to Vatican sources.

Vatican press communiques have been reassuring and have termed the Pope's ailment "slight." But public concern over the 77-year-old pontiff's condition is growing in Rome.

Vietminh Army Staging Drive To Gain Ground

HANOI, Indochina (AP)—Vietminh attacks in five separate sectors shaped up today as parts of a general offensive apparently aimed at overrunning enough territory to give the Communist-led rebels a powerful talking point for ending the Indochina war by negotiation.

A new invasion of Laos threatened Luang Prabang, the royal Laotian capital. Ho Chi Minh threw virtually all his eight regular divisions—trained and equipped by Red China—into the winter campaign.

The Vietnam Division No. 308, detached from the siege of Dien Bien Phu, have crossed the border from northwest Viet Nam into northern Laos, overran French-garrisoned Muong Khua after a 30-mile advance and headed on toward Luang Prabang, 85 miles to the south.

In central Laos, a war theater for six weeks, other rebel troops are battling French forces in the Mekong River area north and east of Thakhek, a town the Vietminh won during Christmas week and then gave up without a fight.

Three Vietminh divisions including No. 316 a heavy weapons outfit called the Iron Division, maintain pressure on Dien Bien Phu, the heavily fortified plain where the French keep a foothold in the Thai mountain country at Laos' back doorstep.

Two hundred miles to the east, troops of Vietminh division No. 329 have infiltrated the Red River delta, the key defense bulwark of French Union forces against the sweep of communism into southern Laos, and opened attacks on guard posts in the Ninh Binh and Nam Dinh sectors.

Russians Charge U. S. Kidnaps Diplomat-Spy

TOKYO (AP)—Japan asked the American Embassy Tuesday if it knows the whereabouts of a Russian diplomat-spy the Soviet Mission charges was kidnapped by U.S. intelligence agents.

The foreign ministry said it had not received a reply. A spokesman for the embassy refused to acknowledge receipt of Japan's request for information.

The delay in answering the foreign ministry could be an indication the embassy may know where Rastvorov is.

An American source who cannot be identified said Monday Yuri Rastvorov second secretary of the defunct Russian diplomatic mission here, asked the United States for political asylum and probably is no longer in Japan. He could be on the American military base of Okinawa or even en route to the United States.

Rastvorov presumably knows valuable information of Russian plans and espionage in the Far East.

The Soviet Mission charged Monday an American intelligence agency had kidnapped Rastvorov, believed to be a top spy with personal access to the best Communist intelligence unit in the Far East.

Winston-Dillard Clergy To Meet Wednesday

A meeting of ministers from the Winston-Dillard area is to be held on Wednesday, at 2:00 p.m
