Oregon Education Association Will Meet On Feb. 20

The annual meeting of the Douglas County Division of the Oregon Education Assn. will draw many of the teachers and educators of the county to Fullerton Grade School cafeteria in Roseburg Feb. 20.

County President Robert Sabin, Roseburg, has urged all educators to attend the annual meet, which will run from noon to 3:15 p.m. Lunch will be served from 12 to 1.

The regular program will get underway at 1 p.m. with a panel discussion on the topic of the teacher shortage. It will be carried on by a school board member, school administrator, Parent-Teacher Assn. member, a representative of a college of education, an ex-teacher and a high school student.

A brief business meeting will follow this panel at which a treasurer and vice president of the county division will be elected. A representative from Douglas County to the National Education Assn. convention in New York City will also be chosen, Sabin reports.

East Rules Law Unconstitutional

EUGENE — Section 17 of Oregon's anti-picketing law passed by the last Legislature, was declared unconstitutional by Circuit Judge William G. East.

It was the second time the controversial law's Section 17 had been declared unconstitutional. Circuit Judge Orval J. Millard of Grants Pass handed down a similar ruling last week.

Judge East's ruling was on a case involving the Paul Bunyan Burger restaurant here. After holding a hearing some time ago, state labor examiner Fred Scherer ordered a culinary union to halt its picketing of the restaurant. The union refused to obey the order and the restaurant owners, Carmen and Julius Gilbertson, took the case to court asking a restraining order against picketing.

Judge East refused to grant the order on the ground the law under which they asked it was unconstitutional.

His lawyer, Samuel B. Phoebe, intends to subpoena Clifford A. Melin, controller of several insurance and finance firms established by Roosevelt, who has books and records pertaining to Roosevelt's employment, salary and earnings.

Yeast And Bread Rolls Extension Unit Topic

"Yeast Bread and Rolls" will be the February and March project of home extension units, according to Helen Chandler, county home extension agent.

The project will consist of demonstrations on mixing, kneading and baking, followed by discussions. Meetings by project leaders for the period include care of walls, woodwork and floors. The project includes a comparison of home cleaning preparations with commercial materials.

Miss Chandler said new wall and floor finishes are discussed in relation to new cleaning techniques required. Some general cleaning problems will be discussed. Emphasis will be placed on simple efficient and inexpensive cleaning methods.
