Strike It Rich Program Target Of Radio Probe

NEW YORK (AP) — New York City's drive against radio-TV giveaways programs that get money from the public was defied last night by "Strike It Rich," first of the shows to be criticized.

The program went on the air without changing its format or waiting for the license the Welfare Department said it should have.

Welfare Commissioner Henry L. McCarthy yesterday declared that "programs like this are a national disgrace" and "play into the hands of the Communists."

The program questions people who tell hard-luck stories. They win prizes by correctly answering the quiz, and then people phone in to offer cash, jobs, homes and other aid.

This puts it in the same category as a charity, the Welfare Department rules, and should be licensed.

McCarthy's ire was directed at "Strike It Rich" because, he said, at least 55 families, lured by the promise of "easy money," have chased the program's rainbow from all over the country right on to New York City's relief rolls.

The Welfare Department suggested that producer Walter Fraumer change the program's format.

Skipper Hooks Whale, Sees Two Others Crash

SAN DIEGO Calif. (AP) — The skipper of a fishing boat this week told of hooking a whale on a fish line and witnessing a collision between two other whales, all within the space of 30 minutes.

Harold W. Hanson, skipper of the Lucky II, said he was fishing at the edge of kelp beds offshore when one of his hooks caught either a part of the lobe of the whale's tail or became entangled in the mass of barnacles that encrusted the mammal's side.

Hanson said the whale surfaced, spouted and then headed south at full speed, snapping the fishing gear.

The fisherman said he then sighted two other whales bearing down on his small boat, but they suddenly swerved and crashed into each other head on.

He then got out of the area as fast as the Lucky II could go.

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Aluminum Firm Investigates Aid In Power Construction

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — Aluminum Company of America is ready to look into spending its own money to build hydro-electric power dams in the Pacific Northwest.

C. S. Thayer, Northwest manager for Alcoa, reports that there already have been "informal conversations in many quarters" about getting more generating power with Alcoa's help.

He said Alcoa would work either with private utility firms or with public utility districts as the situation warranted. Talks so far, he said, have been with representatives of private utilities. He added these talks have been extremely tentative and exploratory.

In a statement, Thayer said that the entire aluminum industry in the Northwest is faced with the problem of protecting huge investments. He said Alcoa had been "quite concerned" over its inability to get long-term arrangements for firm power for both its Vancouver and Wenatchee plants.

Much hydro-electric power for aluminum plants now is on an interruptible basis—delivered when available, but cut off in periods of short supply such as when rivers are low.

The statement said that Alcoa had stayed out of the political controversies relative to power development, its chief objective being to be certain of firm power "at a cost competitive with other locations more favorably situated as to transportation and other factors."

Alcoa has built or authorized 13 million dollars worth of new facilities to fabricate aluminum products in the Northwest and "will be ready to invest additional money in new plants fabricating facilities as soon as the company can assure itself that its present aluminum plants have adequate long-term supplies" of economical electric power.

BOSTON (AP) — The Latin Quarter night club cancelled the one-week appearance of Christine Jorgensen, scheduled to begin Friday night—but Christine could not have appeared anyway, under a licensing board edict.

Members of the board said they were not convinced the operations the former GI underwent in Denmark turned him completely into a woman.

CLEVELAND (AP) — A physician slit open the man's chest and massaged his still heart while a dentist applied oxygen in an unsuccessful attempt to revive a 38-year-old businessman who died in the dentist's chair after removal of six teeth Thursday.

Police said the man, James M. Smith, had been given an anesthetic and had regained consciousness briefly. Then he lapsed into a coma. The dentist summoned the physician. The man died an hour later.
