

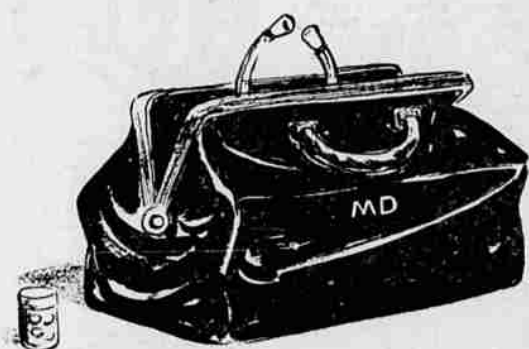

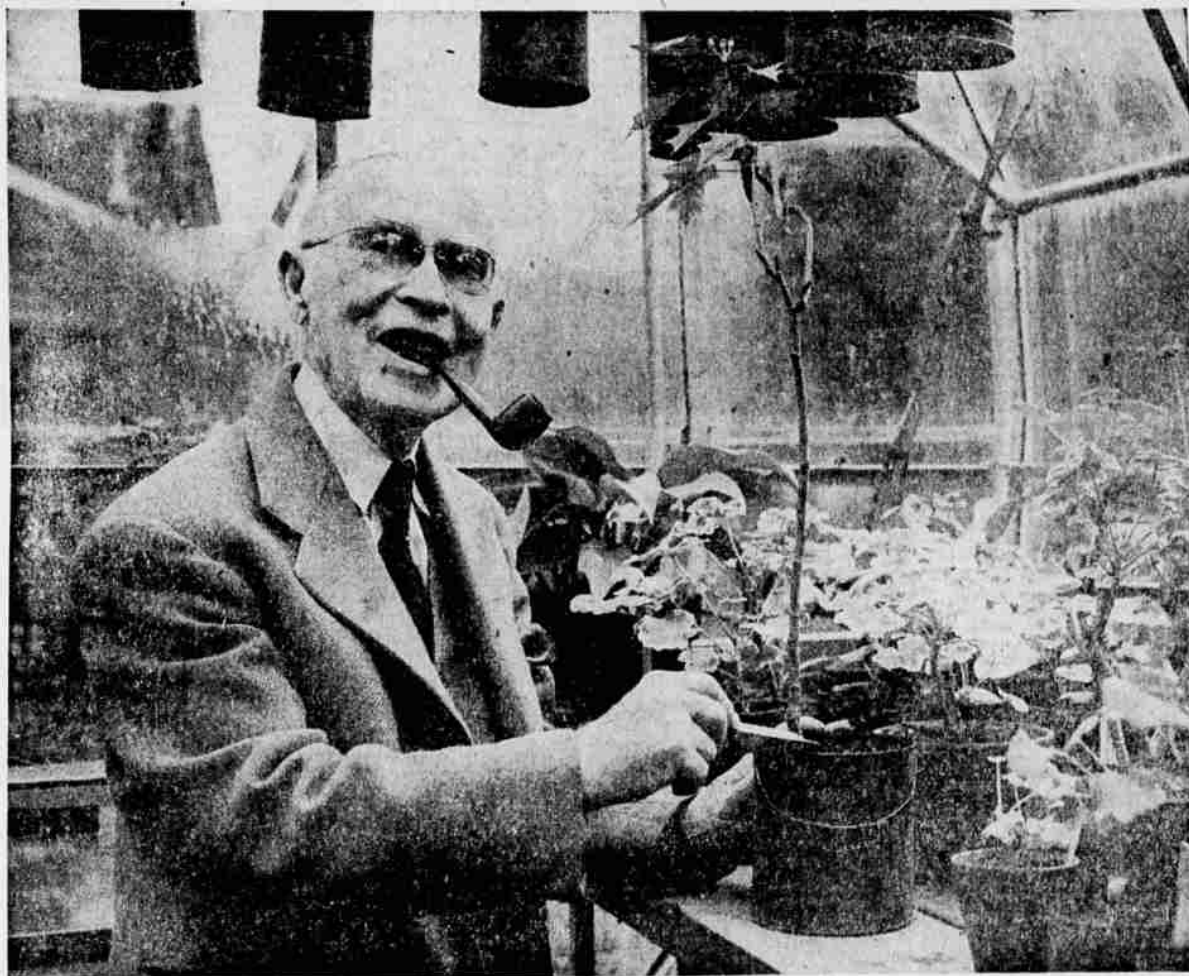
LOTUS KNIGHT PORTER

THE FIVE DOCTORS appearing on today's feature page of the society need no introduction to Douglas County residents, as they have served the people of this community for many years. Only Dr. A. C. Seely retired from his practice entirely, and devotes himself to his numerous hobbies, while the other four are still continuing their practices. Another long-time Roseburg doctor, B. R. Shoemaker, who does not appear on this page because of undergoing a recent major operation, also is still maintaining his office in the Medical Arts building and is able to resume office hours this month following a leave of absence during his illness.



DR. E. J. WAINSCOTT, above, a native Oregonian, has been full-time Douglas County Health doctor, since 1945. He served as part-time health doctor from 1941 to 1945. He started his practice in 1908, first in Baker County—then moved to Drain in 1908, to Oakland in 1910 and to Roseburg in 1924. He and his wife reside at 812 Cobb St. They have a son, Harold, a druggist in Medford, and a daughter, Mrs. Harry Sandquist, Ontario, and one granddaughter, Cheryl Wainscott, Medford. DR. GEORGE E. HOUCK, Roseburg's oldest doctor, now being 88, only recently moved his office from the Medical Arts to his home at 425 S. Stephens, where he resides with his wife. Radio, woodworking, antique clocks and gardening are a few of his hobbies. In Oct. 1952, Dr. Houck was one of two Oregon doctors honored by the Oregon Medical Society for 62 years continuous service as a doctor. He is a native Oregonian and before coming to Roseburg in 1898, he practiced in Mitchell and Prineville. He has one son, Dr. George H. Houck, Palo Alto; a grandson, George C. DR. CHARLES B. WADE, above, also a native Oregonian, began his practice of medicine in Roseburg in 1915. During World War 1, he served as a lieutenant in the U. S. Navy. DR. A. C. SEELY, at left, is pictured in his greenhouse in the garden of his home. Dr. Seely after serving as a ship's doctor, went to Myrtle Creek in 1904 and moved his practice to Roseburg in June 1905, where he continued his practice as an eye, ear, nose and throat specialist continuously until he retired in 1947. He is a former writer for the American magazine and still does considerable writing of stories, besides his extensive gardening activities. He and Mrs. Seely reside at 304 E. DR. E. B. STEWART has continued his practice in Roseburg since 1908, when he moved here from Glendale, where he practiced for three years. It was largely through the efforts of Dr. Stewart that Roseburg obtained the Roseburg Veterans Hospital. He has been an untiring worker on behalf of the American Legion and with Mrs. Stewart, took the Legion tour of Europe in 1929. For a number of years, Dr. Stewart, Dr. A. C. Seely and the late Dr. A. F. Sether were in business together in the U. S. Bank building, after which Stewart and Seely entered private practice again and Dr. Sether moved to Eugene.
