The latest census shows 2743 residents within the city limits of Sutherlin. This census will offer opportunities to learn how many families are affiliated with a church. There are six churches in Sutherlin and approximately 500 attended church last Sunday. This is considered a very low average.

The same principle applies to church school. The Sutherlin school district attendance is 1693, ages 4-19. Only a small percentage of that group attends Sunday school.
