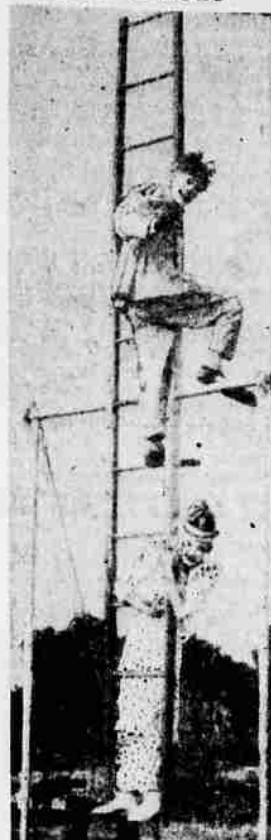


VFW To Sponsor Second Annual Indoor Circus



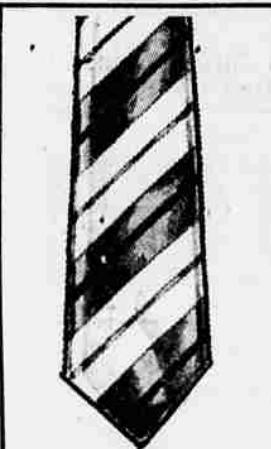

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Myrtle Creek Super Market Opens Doors

MUARION Kusler moved into his new super market located on Main Street in Myrtle Creek, last week-end.

The new store is located right next door to the present store and part of the merchandise will be housed in the old building. A complete remodeling of what used to be Kelly's furniture storage building and Kusler's storehouse has been taking place the past three weeks. The Fred W. Carter Const. Co. of Portland is handling all phases of the remodeling.

The interior of the new store will have 32,000 feet of floor space and 78 feet of new merchandise shelves. The shelves are finished with a natural finish, while each of the four walls is painted a different color in the modern leaf green, French blue, terra-cotta red and chateau green. The floor will be covered with asphalt tile in a two-tone green.

Kusler states that he will handle a complete assortment of frozen foods, dairy products, fruit and vegetables that will be entirely self-service. People may still get meat at the counter, but packaged meats will be available at the self-service unit.

The exterior of Kusler's Super Market has been remodeled with white brick. Four big show windows and a large canopy finish the face of the building.

Kusler is still waiting on customers in the usual manner while the moving process is going on. He will announce the grand opening of the new addition some time this month. Mr. and Mrs. Kusler have been long time residents of this community and Kusler has been in the grocery business nearly 30 years.

Shopping Newspaper Forced To Fold Up

PORTLAND (AP) — The Portland Shopping News, a free weekly newspaper established in 1924, will cease publication after its Feb. 25 issue.

In making this announcement, Walter B. Schade, general manager, said the suspension was the result of "high publishing costs and stiff competition from two fine city daily newspapers."

The Shopping News, with a circulation of more than 100,000, has 15 fulltime employees and about 400 carrier boys. It is printed at the Vancouver, Wash., Columbian plant.

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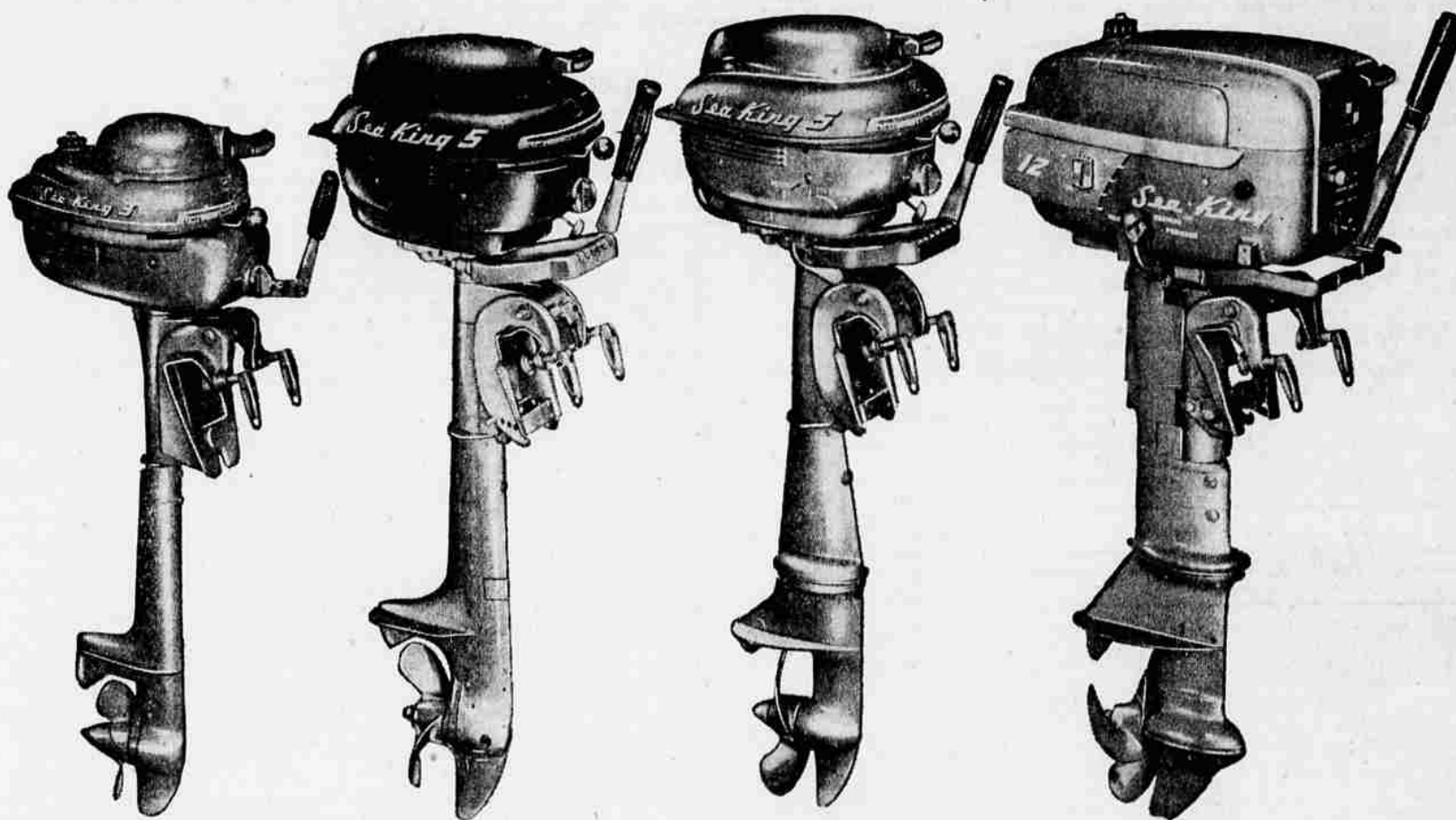
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
