its great soldier, Gen. Van Fleet, who achieved such miracles in creating the Korean army and in fighting the Communists in Greece.

"We want Gen. Van Fleet to come and help us organize our own forces and at the same time train and organize the armies of Indochina. He could, with his tremendous energy, do both jobs, and we would cooperate by providing our own army officers to help in the training of the Indochinese."

As commander of the U.S. 8th Army until his retirement late in the Korean War, Van Fleet supervised the training of South Korea's army.

Pryn acknowledged in the interview that "it is quite probable" Red China might retaliate to transfer of Korean troops to Indochina by dispatching one or more of its divisions to help the Communist-led Vietnamese.

## Douglas Farm Bureau Coop Meet Scheduled

The 32nd annual meeting of the Douglas County Farm Bureau Cooperative Exchange will be held Monday at 222 Spruce St., Roseburg, according to A. J. Townsend, manager.

Featured at the gathering will be Charles Baker, general manager of the Pacific Supply Cooperative, who will deliver the main address in the afternoon. Speaker in the morning will be Karl Baur, Walla Walla, manager of the chemical division of the Pacific Supply Cooperative.

Baker is widely known on the Pacific Coast, having become an authority on development of the Columbia-Snake river water resources.

His talk is entitled "Looking Ahead for American Agriculture." It will deal, he said, with some of the experiences of the past 30 years and will point out the importance of farm cooperatives in helping farm people meet their problems.

Baur is former head of the agronomy department at Washington State College, Pullman, and now directs the division of soil management and field crop production of Pacific Supply. He will speak on fertilizers. Baur spoke to the county cooperative 1st year in the annual meeting.

Sessions will begin at 10 a.m. with a showing of motion pictures. Baur is to speak at 11 a.m. At noon, a free lunch will be served, and business sessions will start again at 12:30, with consideration of a proposal to amend the articles of the association.

## Two Youths Investigated For Thefts At Drain

Two Everett, Wash., youths who were arrested by Oakland police Thursday are being investigated as suspects in the looting of Drain High School lockers Wednesday.

They are Charles Edward Adams and Kermit LeRoy Anderson, both 18. Both were sentenced Thursday to serve 10 days in the Douglas County jail for vagrancy.

Meanwhile, Sheriff Calvin Baird reports an investigation will proceed on the looting case. Two youths Wednesday mingled with students at Drain High and looted some of the school lockers. They were spotted as they left town on a freight train. Roseburg police were alerted, but the boys never arrived. They were arrested in Oakland Thursday.

Correspondent Edith Dunn reports Oakland Police Chief Walt Manning spotted the boys Thursday afternoon as they were walking toward Oakland High School. He arrested them at the school. Justice of Peace Clarence Leonard of Drain charged them with vagrancy. He reports they said they were on their way back from Myrtle Creek to Washington. They said they had spent the night at Myrtle Creek.

to the 800 feet of river frontage. DAVE BUSENBARK PARK off the Coos Bay Wagon Road is being used by Boy Scouts. The Scouts handled minor clearing operations on the land last year. Collins calls for standard improvements of roads, sanitary facilities, tables and stoves by spring.

Other parks which are waiting for improvements also are: James Wood Park off the Tyee Road on the Umpqua (1.9 acres). Fair Oaks Park near Sutherlin to be developed as a future way-side park (3.17 acres). Ada Park near Siltcoos Lake is in for no immediate improvement (13.9 acres). Otter Slough Park near Gardiner is being side tracked for improvement.

WINTON-DILLARD PARK (5.96 acres) is a project primarily for children, but Collins calls it only "partially successful." He relates the Winton Community Club which sold to Douglas County in 1952 agreed to sponsor the park and fulfill certain obligations. He said further improvements other than planning or engineering are not "contemplated or recommended until the sponsoring group shows a more aggressive attitude. He lists 1953 improvements as tree planting, starting a caretaker's cottage, picnic tables, sand box and other junior play equipment. He states The Community Club has provided a hardwood floor in its building to accommodate roller skating and dancing.

BARTON PARK (14.94 acres) near Glendale still needs sanitary facilities (which will be installed this spring), road improvement and tree planting, but Collins says it is "very usable" in its present state.

It is not being used extensively but Collins advised some work on it.

CANYONVILLE COUNTY PARK (8.24 acres) on the South Umpqua is in for plenty of work in 1954. It includes fencing, new access road, boundary and entrance signs, four additional tables, a stove and considerable brush removal. It now has four tables and three stoves. One snag to greater use for this park on Highway 227 is a poor access road.

## New Psychiatrist Joins Staff Of Veterans Hospital

Another psychiatrist has been added to the staff of the Roseburg Veterans Hospital, bringing the number to five, according to Dr. George Wadsworth, hospital manager.

The new man is Dr. Alexis Gottlieb, a Hungarian by birth. Gottlieb attended the University of Prague for two years, the University of Jena for two years, and the University of Leipzig for another two years. He received his M.D. degree at the latter in 1926. He came to the United States after his graduation and served his internship at Metropolitan Hospital, New York City. He engaged in private practice in New York until 1949.

From 1950 to 1952, he served alternately as psychiatrist, surgeon and neuropsychiatrist for the U. S. Army. He last served as psychiatrist at Camarillo State Hospital, Calif., until June 1953. The hospital now has nine medical doctors with the addition of Gottlieb, Wadsworth said. The new doctor is residing at 217 Chadwick St.

ious treaty negotiations remain unchanged. Figli had appealed for an easing of this "harsh and inequitable" burden.

2. A new definition of troop withdrawal, so worded that the Russians could remain indefinitely in Austria even after Austria has its sovereignty.

The Russian plan provides for troop withdrawal from Vienna but Molotov said troops remaining in Austria "would not be occupation troops nor would they interfere with internal Austrian affairs. The legal status of these troops would be determined by a special agreement drawn up by the four powers with the participation of Austria."

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## Republican Blasts Toned Down On Ike's Advice

the victories which our fighting men win on the battlefields."

In counseling Republicans against indiscriminate attacks, Nixon said: "We must remember that millions of Democrats were just as fed up with Trumanism as we were in 1952."

Eisenhower told a Wednesday news conference the times are too serious for extreme partisanship. He said he would advise his official family against such tactics and assumed the GOP National Committee would follow the same course. But he said he did not see how he could tone down others.

Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), who had said he could not "whitewash" what he calls "20 years of treason" under Democratic administrations to help win support for parts of Eisenhower's program, returned to his oft-voiced plea for a halt of trade with Red China.

In a speech at Dallas, Tex., last night McCarthy said "I know I don't agree with our administration on trade with Red China, but that doesn't mean I don't support that administration."

As for Eisenhower's plea to avoid extreme partisan attacks, McCarthy said "I think he is correct in that." He had said earlier he would not change tactics because he was reciting only the facts.

McCarthy also said there is no reason the two major parties should not work together to make all the world free. He said he has not been denouncing the opposite party, but only "its leadership of the last 20 years."

The administration has opposed McCarthy's calls for U. S. action against friendly nations which carry on limited trade with Communist China, arguing that Washington should not dictate to allies and that some trade is beneficial to the West.

McCarthy said last night he knows of these differences, but he added he supports Eisenhower "not because he's perfect but because his record has been so infinitely better than those in charge during the 20 years of treason — there's no comparison."
