

Roseburg Picks Up Winning Method Knocks Coquille Rallies For Victory

Carter, Booth Dump Through Points To Lead

One of the most interestingly played home games of the season, Roseburg repelled several Coquille rallies throughout the second half to record their second series win of the season over Coquille by a score 57-52 Friday night.

Little Don Carter came up with almost an inspired performance in leading all scorers with 18 points, and he along with the rest of Roseburg lineup looked smooth for once during the game.

While Carter was pouring through the points at opportune times throughout the first half, scoring six in each of the first two quarters, to help the Indians produce a 31-28 halftime lead, another of the old Roseburg standbys, in the quick-stepping form of forward Brian Booth, made the difference at the end of the fast break for 13 nicely earned digits at crucial times in the second, third and fourth periods.

Teams Play Smoothly
Though little was at stake in the contest, except for possibly Red Devil revolt for an earlier season's defeat to the Indians, both teams played savagely, but smoothly, in quest of victory, making the affair the more engaging throughout.

In addition to Booth and Carter, there were two other fine basketball by-products on the floor this evening, on the Coquille side: Lean and bespectacled Jack Jacobson, a 6-9 forward, and equally bespectacled, but not so lean Alan Dungey, 6-4 pivot man, were as vital to the Red Devil cause as were Carter and Booth to Roseburg.

Another who kept the Red Devils from falling from contention in the second half was 6-0 forward Al Brown, who shot a variety of sizes.

Control of the backboards through the first 12 minutes augured well for the visitors as they overcame an early Indian 10-5 lead, then spurning in front 17-15 on Dick Roberts' key shot in the closing seconds of the first quarter, and ending their first half on an evening at 28-24 on Dungey's pivot shot with 1:30 remaining in the first half.

Tribe Leads For Good
With Booth injected into the lineup, Coach Dick Ballantyne's commensurate missed a foul shot and invaders for the last time in this one minute and 30 seconds.

Carter two handed a 20-footer, Booth connected from five feet to the left, Booth streaked to a fast break layin with 30 seconds left to play, Booth missed a foul shot and invaders for the last time in this one minute and 30 seconds.

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With control of the backboards gone into Indian hands, prior arrival of the Bands of Booth and Gilbert, and the Devils rapidly faded as Roseburg struck early in the third period for a game-determining lead.

Jump shots by Carter and Crabb and Booth's foul shots made it 37-28 with two and one-half minutes gone in the game as Booth shot and a variety of shots by Jacobson and Dungey.

Local Players Connect
But Red Devil fortunes ebbed from there on Beamer's one-handed jump shot from 10 feet, Booth's fast break layin on Carter's intervention, and Don Kelley's unguarded fork under the basket for two tallies.

This made it 53-45 with two minutes remaining. Roseburg stowed it away, however, in the next minute on Kelley's two free throws and Booth's bank shot for a 57-49 lead. Brown then hit three foul shots for Coquille.

The game was actually won at the foul line where Roseburg made 15 of Coquille's 19 free throws, although percentage of shots was about even with each hitting close to 500. Field goals were 21 apiece.

Bevos Take Division Lead With Win As Ducks Falter

The Oregon State Beavers, preseason favorites to cop the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division basketball crown, stood atop the standings Saturday.

The Beavers, with Lanky Swede Halbrook's 20 points paving the way, humbled Washington, 70-47, Friday night to run their conference record to 8-3.

The University of Oregon Ducks who were tied with the Beavers for the top spot prior to Friday night, tangled with Idaho and came out losers, 68-54.

Oregon slumped to a meager .237 per cent in shooting as the Vandalis got off to a fast start and handcuffed the Ducks in the scoring department effectively.

Oregon grabbed off a 16-8 advantage at the end of the first half and weathered a second period field an overtime period to do it.

Corvallis, No. 2 in the poll, gained a 61-23 victory over Sweet Home, a district 7 opponent.

Eugene, No. 3, downed Cottage Grove 90-62 to continue its domination of the district 6 race. Elsewhere in the district, Willamette of Eugene beat Oakridge 63-39.

Creswell defeated Elmira 71-55; St. Francis of Eugene edged Pleasant Hill 61-59; and Springfield downed Junction City 76-49.

Roseburg, No. 4, easily defeated Washington 72-42 in a Portland League clash. Other Portland scores: Cleveland 61, Grant 45; Benson 60, Jefferson 49; Lincoln 72, Franklin 69.

Marshfield, rated No. 5, won its 15th game against size losses with its victory over Albany.

Baker, No. 6, downed Hermiston 58-54 to run its consecutive victory string to 12.

Redmond, No. 8, cooled off Burns 48-42.

Gresham, No. 9, squeaked past Astoria, the district 10 favorite, 37-35.

Top Ranked Hoop Teams Draw Nod
NEW YORK (AP) — Five of the nation's highest ranking college basketball teams swing in action tonight with special streaks totaling 55 games, and they'll be mighty surprised if the streaks don't add up to 60 when all the scores are in.

Kentucky, the nation's No. 1 team in the Associated Press poll for weeks, makes a 17-0 mark against Mississippi on the Wildcats' home court, where they haven't lost in more than a decade.

Oklahoma A & M also goes to work with 17 straight, dating back to a December loss to Minnesota, and the Aggies figure to make it 18 against Oklahoma. A & M, ranked fourth in the country, whipped the Sooners 65-48 earlier in the season.

La Salle, No. 7 team, also hasn't lost since December and their winning streak should reach an even dozen tonight against Temple, a team the Explorers whipped 77-53 a few weeks ago.

Indiana is another team which hasn't lost this year—meaning 1954, and the third-ranked Hoosiers will have a sellout crowd on hand in the Northwestern field house as they go for their tenth straight. Leading the Big Ten with an 8-0 mark, the Hoosiers will be listening for the score from Minneapolis where Iowa (7-1) will face Minnesota (6-2).

Western Kentucky, No. 5 team, is the other top ranker in action. The Hilltoppers boasted the longest winning streak in the country, 21 games, until being upset by Eastern Kentucky last week. They came back to start a new one against Morehead Monday night and Murray State, a 57-43 victim earlier, should double the streak.

Is That So!

What is a thoroughbred horse? Does "to eat humble pie" mean to humiliate oneself? It is dangerous to keep plants in a sickroom?

These four questions, each suggesting a popular fallacy, were submitted by readers of the Tacoma (Wash.) News-Tribune & Ledger, the Santa Fe New Mexican, the Lock Haven (Pa.) Express and the Phoenix (Ariz.) Republic.

HUMBLE PIE. In earlier times it was customary to serve servants and ordinary huntsmen a pie made of the humples of deer. Humples (or humbles) are heart, liver, kidneys, lights, and other inferior parts. Only recently has been the more modern meaning creep in — that is, to apologize, retract, humiliate oneself. In short, to eat one's words.

THOROUGHBRED. The word thoroughbred has been misused. A thoroughbred is the name of a noted breed of horse developed in England toward the close of the 17th century. It being, perhaps, a cross between the native mares and Arab, Barb and Turk stallions. The horse became so famous for its high quality, that people began to misuse the word "thoroughbred" when they actually meant "purchased."

A purebred animal is one which is usually bred of the best stock and has a known and recorded ancestry in the studbook (5 generations in the U. S., 7 in England) and represents but one breed of animal.

SICKROOM FLOWERS. Many a time have I seen flowers removed overnight from the sickroom because the plants were supposed to be dangerous due to giving off carbon dioxide.

This danger is greatly magnified. The carbon dioxide given off by a square yard of leaf is only about the 360th part of that given off in the same time by a robust person. In the interest of safety, it would be much more logical to remove the special nurse's whole windowful of plants more probably give off 1-50 of the amount she does.

Were the amount of carbon dioxide given off by plants not negligibly small, it would obviously be highly hazardous for any person to camp out in a forest during a nice, quiet summer's night.

BALD EAGLE. Many seeing the bald eagle up close are distressed by the apparent misnomer. Actually, he has a well-covered pate of snow white feathers. But hold on. In the day the eagle was named, bald-headed meant white-headed!
