An early third period rally, sparked by Paul Hatcher's jump shot and Wilson Barnes' two long shots, Myrtle Creek's Vikings roll to their ninth win of the season by a score of 59-52 over league-leading Eagle Point in a JDJ League game at Myrtle Creek Friday night.

The visitors led 10-5 early in

the first quarter and 14-12 at the end of the period. But the play of Barnes and Hatcher in the second period turned the tide in favor of the Vikings who led 28-24 at the intermission.

Third quarter score favored Myrtle Creek 46-36 on the basis of shots by Hatcher and Barnes, and when the visitors closed the gap to six points with two minutes to play, Myrtle Creek was forced to hang on to win in the remaining time.

Both teams shot well, but averages favored the winners 45.5 to 41.1. Barnes made 22 for Myrtle Creek, while Charley Eccleston scored 13 for the losers.

Myrtle Creek won the jayvee game 45-32 as Junior Cavaner scored 14.

Crooner Dick Haymes Adds Landlord Difficulties To Long List of Complaints

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Crooner Dick Haymes—who already has ex-wife alimony trouble, back-income tax headaches, and faces a government threat to deport him to his native Argentina—has added another "blow" note in the form of a landlord complaint over allegedly unpaid rent.

The owner of a furnished house in Greenwich, Conn., claims Haymes and his actress wife, Rita Hayworth, owe him \$675 back rent plus \$5,000 damage he says was done to the luxurious, 14-room house. He did not specify the "damage."

The landlord, Joseph Kraefer, installed deputy sheriffs in the house to watch over the personal effects of Rita and Dick, who are not there but staying somewhere in Manhattan.

But Miss Hayworth's two children by previous marriages still live in the house with a governess and a pet dog. The children are Yasmin, 3, whose father is Aly Khan, and Rebecca, 8, daughter of Rita and Orson Welles. And that's another story which involves the FBI and taking photos of the children.

But to get back to the Greenwich rent, recently Kraefer got an eviction order against Rita, who signed the lease, for non-payment of rent. This was withdrawn when he couple paid up for December and agreed to pay \$675 for the six week period ending Monday, Feb. 15.

Young Wife Succumbs From Husband's Slap

DARLINGTON, England (AP) — Ernest Hayman, 21, slapped his young wife's face in a lovers' spat two weeks after their marriage. She died.

Friday, Hayman was led in tears from a coroner's court to stand trial on a charge of manslaughter. "It was our first quarrel," he said.

"I just slapped her face lightly. She didn't fall or cry out. I left the room then and when I came back she was dead."

A pathologist told the court Marine Hayman died of a broken neck through jerking her head back suddenly.
