Mrs. Grush was a resident of Roseburg for the past 56 years. She was born March 3, 1864, in Salem, Neb. She was married there on Oct. 11, 1881, to Francis Marion Grush, who died Dec. 28, 1939.

Surviving are her daughter, Mrs. Edna Richardson, Roseburg; two grandchildren, three great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren.

Interment will follow in the Martindale Cemetery. The Chapel of the Roses, Roseburg Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A 31-year-old mother who almost drowned five days ago in a vain attempt to save the life of her 4-year-old son and a companion gave birth to a son Sunday.

Mrs. Betty Mitchell jumped into an ice-covered abandoned quarry last Tuesday when her son Michael and friend Michael Collins fell through the ice trying to retrieve a golf ball. The mother was saved by rescuers. She suffered from shock and exposure.

Recommendation of the examiner but objected to many points. Lyons claimed, moreover, that many points of the original dispute had become moot by subsequent developments, such as installation of centralized traffic control over the line from Eugene to Crescent Lake—an improvement designed to increase the amount of traffic that line can handle.

Lyons rejected all contentions that SP had practiced discrimination, saying, "You don't distribute cars by a slide rule but according to the production capacity of the shippers." He said the freight car shortage was not as real as some figures suggested because the moment cars become less than plentiful shippers begin ordering many more cars than they would ordinarily. Then, Lyons argued, when they don't get all the cars they order they claim there is a great car shortage.

Another intervenor, Wren Planting Mill, Wren, Ore., claimed \$155,000 damages due to loss of profits from June through September, 1950, when the company reported it received 116 cars instead of 343 as ordered.

Lyons defended SP on this point by saying the mill was ordering cars at the rate of six a day, when during the same period of other years it ordered only three or four. He added the mill realized a profit in 1950 matched only once before since it began business.

The three commissioners of the ICC took the case under advisement. There is no determining how soon their decision will be rendered.

Feebleness Of Pope Pius Shown In His Address

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The Vatican radio broadcast Monday a feeble, four-minute message by convalescing Pope Pius XII. The pontiff's voice, weak and hesitant after his recent illness, had been recorded at his bedside over a period of two days.

The Vatican announced that the 77-year-old pontiff's recovery is continuing, "although slowly."

His address marked a day of prayer for the ailing in connection with the church's commemoration of the Marian Year—the centenary of the Catholic dogma of the Virgin Mary's immaculate conception. The recording in Italian was first broadcast Sunday night. Translations in various languages went out over the radio Monday.

Wool Producers May Get Subsidy Payments

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Agriculture Committee plans to begin hearings this week on an administration bill proposing subsidy payments to wool growers.

Specifically designed to encourage the domestic production of 300 million pounds of wool a year, the bill provides for the payment of a subsidy to growers equal to the amount by which the national average market price may fall short of the established support price. The payments would come from tariff revenues on imported wool.

President Eisenhower proposed the plan in his message to Congress outlining his agricultural program.

Canned Food, Water Said Atomic Attack Remedy

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—Advice to housewives: gather up a few cans of preserved food and a gallon jar of water and stick it in a safe place.

It may help your family survive atomic attack or other disaster, says the nation's top woman civil defense official.

Mrs. Katherine Howard, deputy national director of the Federal Civil Defense Administration, said in a transcribed Texas radio broadcast Sunday a three-day supply of canned food and water should be kept in every household as minimum emergency ration.

Ike Will Take Vacation At Palm Springs, Calif.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower, just back from a Georgia quail hunt, will leave Wednesday for five days of sun, golf and work in Palm Springs, Calif.

The President will stay at the Smoke Tree Ranch home of Paul E. Helms, baking firm executive and personal friend of the President.

Flaming Flying Boxcar Landed With No Casualty

McHORD AIR FORCE BASE, Wash. (AP)—The pilot and a flight engineer crash-landed an Air Force C-52 Flying Boxcar near here Sunday after four others had bailed out of the burning transport plane.

The pilot, Capt. Raymond Costello, 33, Redlands, Calif., safely landed the huge craft on a pasture 10 miles south of here. T. Sgt. Dale V. White, Tacoma, flight engineer, rode the plane to the ground with Costello.

Costello said the plane's right engine caught fire at an altitude of 4,500 feet and the blaze spread quickly to the rear of the housing.

With only one engine working and the fire ready to spread to tanks holding 1,400 gallons of gasoline, Costello calmly piloted the plane towards a pasture where cows and horses were grazing. The craft narrowly missed the animals, Costello said, and came to a halt less than 50 yards from a group of trees. Costello and White then put out the fire with hand extinguishers.

Andrews said the tax service also has smacked up against an apparent increase in efforts to claim illegal dependents and deductions and get bigger tax refunds than justified. He noted that refunds have increased from 1 1/2 billion dollars in 1950 to more than 2 1/2 billion for 1953.

The commissioner estimated there are errors in 77 per cent of individual returns for business income of between \$10,000 and \$30,000; errors in 60 per cent of the returns on non-business individual income between \$10,000 and \$50,000.

They are utilizing their leave by taking a trip by automobile along the Pacific Coast to San Francisco and report they are greatly interested in the country through which they are passing. Engel Gerard, who comes from North Africa, says he finds Oregon much like his own community in topography and climate. Correspondents Get Farcial Tour Of East Germany

BERLIN (AP)—The Communists took a group of Western correspondents sightseeing in East Germany Sunday but eyechecked them as strictly as if they'd been Sunday schoolers at a burlesque house.

It was a short trip, too—just 17 miles from Berlin to Potsdam, residence of Prussian kings and German emperors and site of the 1945 Big Three conference.

Two carloads of East German plainclothesmen joined the three busloads of Western and Far Eastern correspondents at the East Zone border and dogged their heels throughout the day.

Under the management of East German press officials, the tour went off without a hitch but the newsmen were depressed and harassed by the close supervision and the open suspicion they might get loose to see something embarrassing to the Reds.

Every time a correspondent stopped to look at a picture of a book in the palace or scribbled a note one of the Red plainclothesmen trotted to his elbow.

One newsmen who turned his camera on three of the operatives precipitated a fine show as each tried to get behind another.

The tour conductors kept the newsmen in a tight little knot. The only time anyone broke away briefly, they learned only that one pedestrian would be mighty glad if the border barriers were lowered so shoes and clothing on the Russian side might be better.

TINY BABY SURVIVES

ASTORIA (AP)—A girl who weighed 2 pounds, 4 ounces at birth Nov. 9, was able to go home this week, after her weight had increased to 5 pounds 8 ounces, born 2 1/2 months prematurely to Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Ray Hicks of Warrenton.

Murder Suspect Apparently Not From Astoria

ASTORIA (AP)—George Edgar Long is at Ft. Bragg, N. C., and his parents here have no idea who the man is who's jailed at El Reno, Okla., with similar name and Astoria address.

His father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Max Long, broke down and cried Saturday when they learned, for sure, it was not their son held in Oklahoma in connection with the slaying at Los Angeles of David L. Johnston, a talent scout, on Wednesday.

They think perhaps the man in jail took their son's identity after robbing him in Los Angeles last month. The story of the robbery came to light Saturday when another son, Edward Long, 27, came up from Corvallis where he is an Oregon State College student, to look into the matter.

The parents of Finnish extraction who have lived here several years after retiring from farming at Rosburg, Wash., were confused and seemingly dazed when they heard news reports that a George Edward Long of their street address in Astoria, was in jail.

Robbery Victim

Their son had been at Ft. Ord and was being transferred to a new station on the East Coast. They said he had phoned them Jan. 20 from Los Angeles. They said they hadn't heard since then.

The brother finally got from them the purpose of the Army son's phone call—it was to report he had been robbed and he needed money to get east. They wired it to him and he reached Ft. Jackson, S. C., on Feb. 1, then went to Ft. Bragg, N. C.

Until a phone call to Ft. Bragg brought assurance from their son's company commander that he was there, they feared he had been slain by the man who took his name, but got mixed up and had the wrong, middle name.

The Astoria soldier taught school at White Salmon, Wash., before entering the Army.

Soviet-Chinese Friendship Pact on its fourth anniversary, declared Sunday night that world security depends upon Communist China attaining "her rightful place in international councils."

The emergence of the Communist People's Republic in China, said Malenkov, has opened a new epoch in Asia, making it a bastion of peace instead of a powder keg. Soviet newspaper editorials, commenting on the pact between the two major Communist nations, stressed the "great aid" Russia has given China and described their friendship link as "unbreakable."

Alaskan Construction Workers Get Pay Raise

SEATTLE (AP)—A general wage increase of 12 1/2 cents an hour for Alaska's construction industry workers was announced Saturday in a joint statement issued by the committees for management and eight craft unions.

The increase was effective as of Feb. 12, and will benefit about 20,000 workers, said Larry Moore, manager of the Alaska chapter of the Associated Contractors. Negotiations have been under way here for the past three weeks.

The crafts involved are the operating engineers, laborers, teamsters, cement masons, plasterers, bricklayers, ironworkers and lathers.

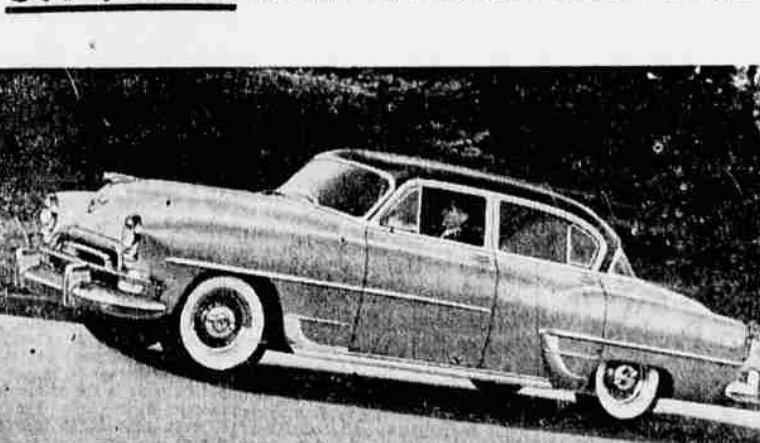
