Axemen Gain In Prep Vote

Milwaukee continued to be the No. 1 team but high-scoring Eugene gained enough new backing from sports writers this week to move into second place in the Associated Press' Oregon high school basketball poll.

Milwaukee, with a record of 17 wins in 18 games, was the first choice of eight of the 12 who voted. It had 114 points to Eugene's 95. Eugene, which averaged 80 points a game in winning three impressive victories last week, squeezed ahead of Corvallis by two points. Corvallis had been No. 2 four weeks. Each team won two votes for first place.

One of Eugene's victims was Marshfield, to which it lost in the finals of the state tournament last year.

Behind Corvallis came Roosevelt, undefeated in the Portland league, Marshfield, Baker and Salem—the same order last week.

Redmond, No. 8 last week, fell from the first ten. Gresham, the only team to defeat Milwaukee, jumped one notch to eighth and Albany advanced to No. 9.

Grants Pass moved back into the top 10 after a week's absence, taking tenth place.

Ellsworth Timberlands Bill Up For Hearing

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managed on a sustained yield basis. If the acquisition seriously reduced the owner's timber processing operations, the agency "insofar as practicable" would give the owners a like portion of federally owned timberland in the same area.

A major objection to the bills as brought to the House last year is that it assertedly would permit private owners to obtain exchange lands located in national parks and forest wilderness areas.

The amendment approved by the Interior Committee would provide that timberlands exchanged shall not come from parks, monuments, wildlife refuges, or wilderness or primitive areas.

Ellsworth said the amendment also would meet these stated objections to the original bill.

That other timber operations in the same general area of an exchange might be injured through the transfer.

That a government department or agency responsible for the management of federally owned timberlands would have no part in the selection of such lands.

Other objections to the first bill also should be met by the amendment, Ellsworth said.

Metz said, however, that he objected to the bill even in its proposed amended form on these other grounds:

1. That it would disrupt the long-term program of consolidation for efficient operation of national forests.
2. That it looks to only the use of forests for timber, and does not consider watershed protection, mining, grazing, hunting, fishing and other recreational uses.
3. That it is unnecessary legislation and would not increase the timber yield.

The council adopted a resolution of intent to improve a section of Terrace Avenue south of Lane Street. A majority of property owners petitioned to have grades established, curbs and gutters installed, and the street paved.

The council adopted the planning commission's plan for zoning newly annexed West Roseburg areas, with the exception that the proposed business zone in Huerfano was eliminated, leaving that development entirely a residential area.

The planning commission was also given the go ahead for completion of a scale map to be used in its work of redeveloping Roseburg's balled up street system.

The group is working on a program of street renaming and planning for fringe areas.

A representative of Roseburg PTAs asked the council what could be done to bring water fluoridation to the city. Mayor Percy Croft said the council has taken no definite stand on the matter. He said he felt any move to install equipment for fluoridation of city water should come via a vote of the people. The PTA representative indicated a desire to circulate petitions for such an election.

The council received nine bids for supply of gasoline to the city for the coming year. The bids were referred to the street committee and Acting City Manager John Loosely, giving them authority to accept one bid. Low bidder was General Petroleum, which offered to supply regular gas at 21.68 cents per gallon and ethyl at 23.88 cents.

Referred to the health and sanitation committee was a problem presented by E. N. Coons, 920 S. Kane St. Coons and several neighbors and property owners complained that sewage from the Robert W. Penn residence, 924 Kane, has been overflowing, causing an unhealthy situation.

The council approved an application for a new business at 104 S. Main St. called Bernice's Pet Supplies. The shop will also handle birds and goldfish.

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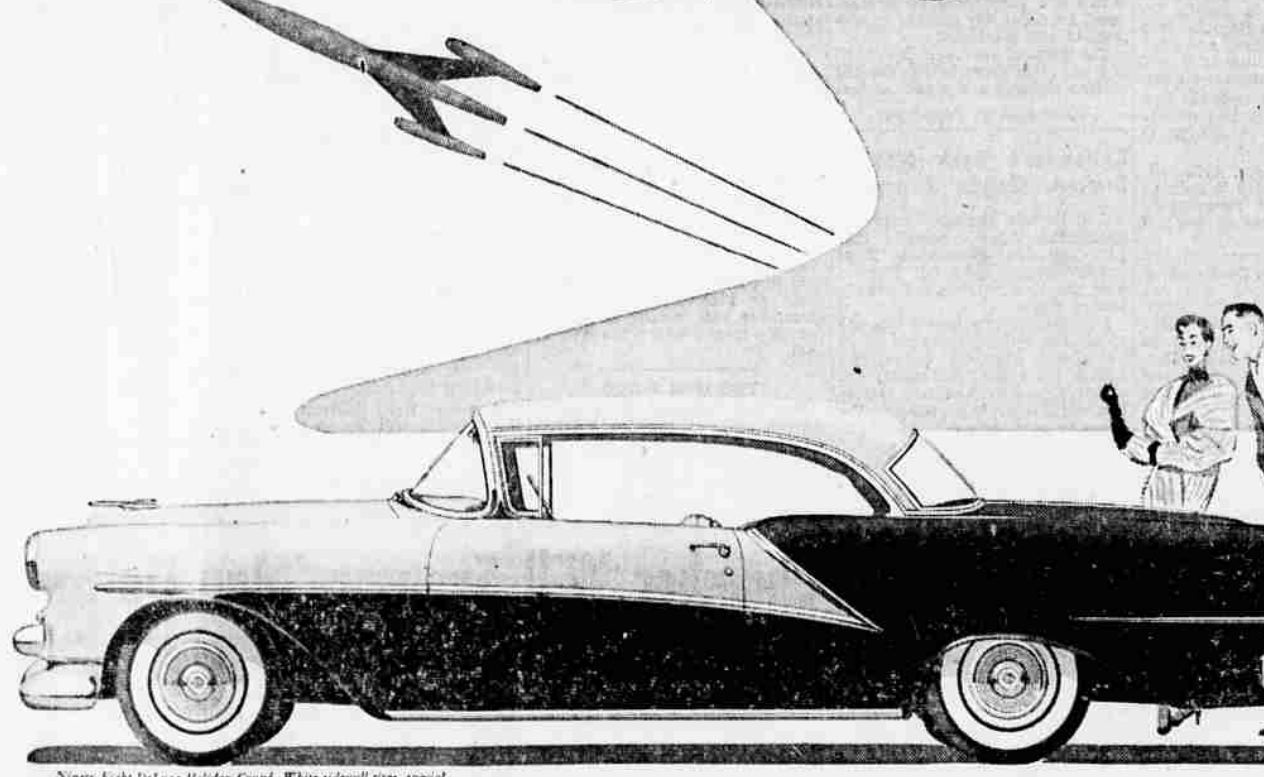
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
