

Chamber Folder To Extol Virtues Of Douglas County

The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce will soon publish a new elaborate folder to extol the virtues of Douglas County, according to the organization's annual report to members issued this week.

Harold Hiskerson, secretary-manager, says the pamphlet will be a 12-page affair, highly illustrated with scenic and vocational highlights.

Information for the booklet, which has a theme of "It's Fun to Live in the Umpqua Valley," has been compiled; the printing contract will be let as soon as possible.

The folder will be distributed throughout the nation and in some foreign countries.

Other things reviewed in the 1953 report include Chamber action on water conservation and flood control, highways and roads, forest management, county planning, agriculture, the airport and aviation.

Douglas County Forest Lands Group To Meet

The second official meeting of the Douglas County Forest Land Classification Committee is scheduled Thursday, Feb. 25, at 10 a.m. in the courthouse at Roseburg.

Elton V. Jackson, chairman of the committee, made the announcement today. He said a number of tracts of forest land which may be considered by the committee for classification in the grazing class will be brought up for consideration. He said the list is currently being compiled by District Warden Fred Southwick of the Douglas Forest Protective Assn.

Under the new law, forest lands which are classified as grazing or Class 3 by the county classification committee may receive fire protection services at a pro rated cost not to exceed five cents per acre. This cost may be exceeded only in the event of extra fire fighting costs on grazing lands.

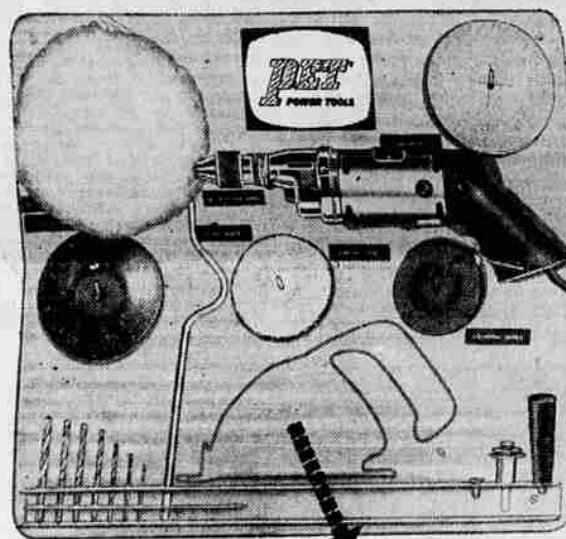
