Speaker Is Scheduled At Brotherhood Meet

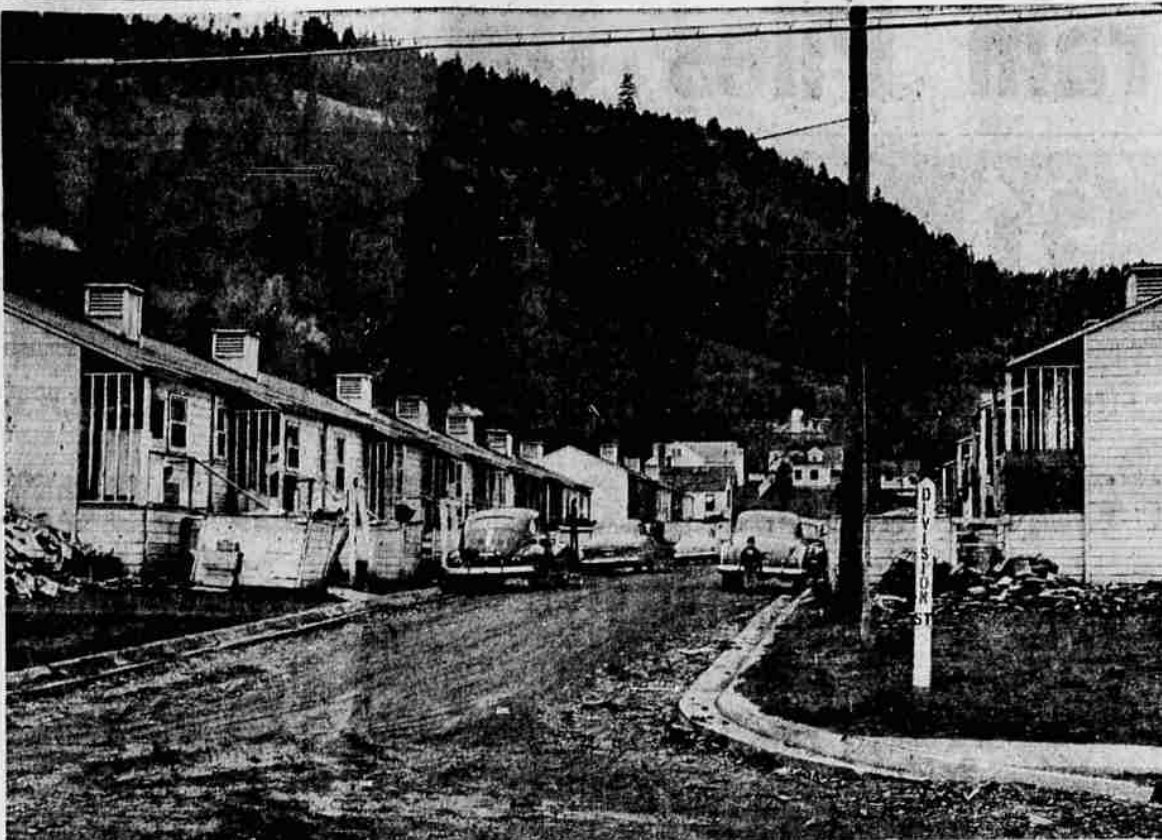


Rev. Fred Savage

American Farm Bureau Favors Ike's Policies

New control policies announced by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson have the support of the American Farm Bureau Federation, reports John J. Lacey, Chicago, director of the Federation's press and radio relations, who was a visitor in Roseburg Thursday.

Lacey was accompanied by George W. Dewey, Salem, secretary of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation.

The pattern of flexible controls over farm production is much more desirable than rigid controls previously in operation, Lacey asserted.

"A good example of the result of rigid controls is found in the dairy business," he explained. "Before controls were placed on butter, the American public used six pounds of butter for each one pound of butter substitute. Today consumption is on a 50-50 basis while the government is holding millions of pounds of surplus butter. In many fields the control program has killed the market for crops or products theoretically being helped."

Lacey and Dewey are touring Oregon to meet with civic and farm leaders. The national representative is planning to contact press and radio executives throughout the entire United States to explain the Federation's program.

Mother, Two Children Are Trapped By Fire

PALMER, Alaska (AP) — Trapped by a fire which blocked exits, a 26-year-old mother of three boys died with two of them in a cabin blaze at Knik, 30 miles southwest of here early Wednesday.

The woman was Mrs. Clyde Hornell. The boys who perished with her were Tommy DePriest, 7, and his 11-month-old brother, Danny. Both were sons by a previous marriage. The third son, Robert DePriest, 3, received serious burns.

Mrs. Hornell's husband of less than a week escaped through the flames with Richard Barnes, 18, who was staying with the couple. Hornell carried little Robert to safety with him but was unable to return. Barnes also required hospitalization for burns.

Officials said the fire apparently broke out when Barnes attempted to start a fire with liquid gas about 7 a.m.

Train Engine Is Raised; Bodies Not Located

MAUPIN, Ore. (AP) — Attempts continued Thursday to salvage a diesel locomotive that hit a rock slide and plunged into the Deschutes River Jan. 31.

For the first time the salvage crew was able to get at the cab of the locomotive. The crew reported the bodies of two missing trainmen were not inside.

The belief is that engineer Ernest Barton, Portland, and fireman Earl Sutton, Wishram, Wash., were thrown into the river in the plunge of the locomotive.

The locomotive has been dragged by cables to within 10 feet of the east bank of the river. The next three or four days will be spent in building a lifting device to try to raise the locomotive to shore.

their meeting here and declared this has been of special value.

"It makes it less likely that any of us should be invidious and miscalculation do what would risk another war," he said.

The conference adjourned at 7 p.m. (10 a.m. PST) after 23 working days and almost 100 hours of debate on Germany, Austria and the Far East.

The Korean action came after a new debate on methods of easing the complexities of life in divided Germany and after Russia refused to make any concession on Austria's continued occupation.

Earlier American authorities said the Big Four had approached agreement on the Geneva parity, awaiting only Molotov's concurrence in a clause spelling out that the meeting itself would not constitute U. S. recognition of the existing government.

In the first hour and a half of the last session the Big Four heard two new proposals from Austria for an independence treaty, listened to a flat veto from Molotov and buried the issue finally.

Austrian Foreign Minister Leopold Figl tried to meet Moscow's demands for indefinite occupation even after an independence treaty is signed with (1) a suggestion that the troops stay there until June 30, 1953 and (2) barring that, the occupation diplomatic missions retain certain control authority. To both, Molotov said no.

The first white settler in the Glide area, Samuel Plumb Blakely arrived in the spring of 1852. The first physician to settle in Glide, Dr. C. L. Plansoen, arrived Feb. 12, 1951.

Dr. Plansoen, osteopathic physician and surgeon, graduated from the Philadelphia College of Osteopathy and interned at the Detroit Osteopathic Hospital.

Licensed by the Oregon State Board of Medical Examiners, he practiced two and one half years at Sweet Home and one year at Port Orford. Married, he has two children, Tommy, 6 years old and Vickie, 3 years of age. The doctor is 35.
