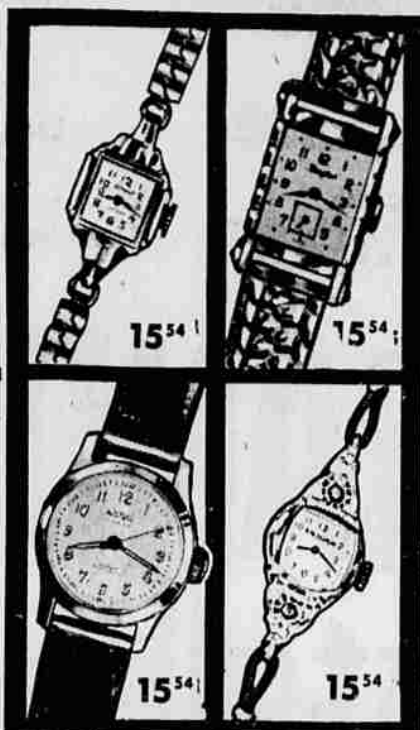

DA Files Abatement Papers Against Buck

PORTLAND — Dist. Atty. John B. McCourt Wednesday filed abatement proceedings against Dr. George H. Buck and Kenneth R. and Katherine E. Horabek, owners of the building in which Buck has offices.

House Labor Group Votes Not To Shelve Bill

WASHINGTON — The House Labor Committee overwhelmingly defeated an attempt Wednesday to shelve amendments to the Taft-Hartley labor law at this session of Congress.

By a vote reported as 18-10, it rejected the motion by Rep. Bailey (D-W.Va.) to sidetrack further action on Taft-Hartley changes this year.

At the same time, the committee set next Wednesday to begin the closed door drafting of amendments.

Wednesday's committee action, taken in closed session, was supported by all Republican members and three Democrats.

Bids Run Higher Than Expected On Dormitory

PORTLAND — Bids ran higher than expected for construction of an addition to a men's dormitory at the University of Oregon, the building committee of the State Board of Higher Education reported Tuesday.

The lowest combination of bids was \$75,000 higher than the \$1,250,000 available for the project—an addition for John Straub Hall. The matter will be referred to the state board for action at a March 8 meeting.

Oregon Hit By Two Separate Storm Fronts

Oregon was hit Tuesday night and early Wednesday by winds resulting from two separate storm fronts, but no heavy damage was reported. At the same time there was light to moderate rainfall.

One storm brought winds up to 50 miles an hour at Astoria and gusts to about 60 at the Columbia River Lightship. The Portland Airport reported gusts to 35 as the storm moved eastward.

The other storm blew in from Northern California, causing winds estimated at 50 miles an hour at Klamath Falls and 35 at Prineville.

The heaviest rain was on the coast, Astoria recording .56 of an inch, Newport .55 and North Bend .80.
