er the present starting scale is sufficient to lure teachers who must be brought in to fill the district complement.

It was pointed out by Deller that a larger increment would be attractive to those looking for security and opportunity for annual salary raises.

The board was unanimous in its acceptance of the teacher recommendations on increments. But it tabled consideration of a bid to inaugurate a teacher tenure program by Jan. 1, 1956.

Also tabled was a request that teachers working on a degree at summer school be reimbursed by \$200.

The board's adoption of the salary recommendations came after Deller reviewed the teacher supply and demand problem, tax structure and tax burden of the district, and recruitment activities in Oregon and the Pacific Northwest.

The budget group is to meet again on March 5 to consider a for the summer school reimbursement.

Salaries of non-certified personnel also will be checked at the meeting.

Neuralgia is a symptom, not a disease, although in some instances an acute inflammation of a nerve seems to be the causative factor. It is a convulsive attack of pain in the course and distribution of a sensory nerve or its branches. It may be psychogenic in origin, as in hysteria, or it may be reflex from disease of the gastrointestinal tract, as a rule children are rarely affected. Neuralgia is characterized by sudden stabbing pains, with longer or shorter intervals between paroxysms. In the arm, brachial neuralgia, pain shoots downward from the shoulder to the hand and fingers. The sciatic nerve is frequently affected involving the nerve of the same name in the thigh and leg, affecting men much more frequently than women. If the pain is in the chest—between or along the ribs—it is sometimes caused by herpes zoster, better known as shingles. Constitutional diseases and those of the vertebral column and spinal cord are the most frequent involvements. Facial paralysis is another common nervous disorder, due frequently to exposure to cold, such as a cold draft blowing on one side of the face while sleeping near an open window. The paralysis comes on rapidly, usually with little pain however, although there may be earache. The individual may first discover the paralysis on looking in the mirror, or on trying to eat, talk, or whistle. The face is smooth and expressionless on the paralyzed side. The eye on that side cannot be closed and weeps; the mouth is drawn over to the uninvolved side, and saliva may flow from the Whistling becomes impossible. Eating is interfered with, and the food collects in the cheek of the paralyzed side and speech is somewhat difficult. Facial paralysis following exposure to cold usually disappears, with complete recovery in from two to six weeks. Some individuals have been known to have several attacks. Seasonal Park Ranger Exams Set
The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for seasonal park ranger to fill positions in parks, recreational areas, monuments and other sites operated by the National Park Service.

Jack Calkins, the commission's examiner in charge will answer questions and give out application forms. His office is in the Roseburg Postoffice Building.

The period of employment varies with the location and may range from 60 to 180 days a year at the rate of \$3.175 a year. The minimum age limit is 21 years. No written test will be given.

The commission has also announced examinations for fishery aid, \$2,750 to \$3,410 a year, in various federal agencies in the states of Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington, California and Nevada. Kidnaped Cuban Boy Rescued; Servant Slain

SANTIAGO, Cuba — A Swift army action-rescue, arrests and the killing of a servant deemed faithless—broke the Facundo Bacardi kidnapping case last night little more than 11 hours after the 8-year-old heir to a rum fortune was seized for \$50,000 ransom.

The servant was chauffeur Guillermo Rodriguez, 23, a dishonorably discharged Navy veteran who was at the wheel of the station wagon in which the tousel-haired boy vanished on his way to a fashionable private school at 8 a.m. yesterday.

Accused of conspiracy in the frustrated plot, Rodriguez was shot to death "while attempting to escape" soon after Facundo was restored to his parents, hungry but safe and sound. A jobless youth nabbed while walking the boy along a suburban road was jailed in a barracks.

Army officials said Rodriguez, tossed out of the Navy as a marijuana peddler and gambler some months before the Bacardi family hired him, died under a hail of soldiers' bullets when he made a break for liberty in the country while reenacting his part in the crime.

The surviving prisoner, Manuel Echevarria, 20, faces prosecution under a law providing a maximum of 12 years for kidnapping.

a refrigeration firm in Baltimore. Inslerman said he had been trained in Moscow to photograph documents and to receive the information by radio code.

On his return to this country in 1935, Inslerman said, he was contacted by a Soviet agent named "Ben" whom he could not identify further.

Inslerman said "Ben" suggested that he go to Baltimore, where he met "Bob."

"I now believe the man named Bob to be Whitaker Chambers," he said.

Chambers, a confessed courier for the Soviet underground during the 1930s, was the principal witness at the trial of Hiss, former State Department officer convicted on two counts of perjury. Hiss is serving two simultaneous five-year terms in the federal penitentiary at Lewisburg, Pa.

Inslerman testified that "Bob," Chambers, first brought documents to Inslerman's house in Baltimore "some time in late 1937."

Inslerman's testimony appeared to corroborate some of the testimony given by Chambers at Hiss' two trials. As Inslerman finished testifying, McCarthy said he would like to arrange a meeting of Chambers and Inslerman with a view to further cross checking of their accounts.

Circuit Court Jury Rules For Plaintiffs
A circuit court jury Friday gave the plaintiff the amount asked in a suit which grew out of alleged failure to pay \$3,500 promissory note.

The plaintiffs, Macon S. and Arla Jack, asked for a judgement of that amount, plus fees and interest, from Elmer and Virginia Hosteler because of a note dated Dec. 10, 1952.

The verdict and court judgment awarded the \$3,500, plus \$400 in attorney fees, \$72.68 in interest and disbursement costs.

as that of the man who was in an Illinois asylum.

Sack was picked up after residents in the area reported they had seen a car with his license plates near the spot where the body was found.

Sack, under questioning, told police his wife had left the apartment house they own last Tuesday for a shopping trip. He said she had \$125 in a purse and wore two diamond rings. The purse and the rings were missing when the body was discovered.

Sack declined to answer specifically a number of questions about his background. He did say, however, that his first wife died in a fire and that his second wife was killed in a holdup.

From Chicago it was learned that a Julia Sack, 27, was fatally burned the night of June 1, 1923. Her husband, a George Sack, who was the beneficiary of a \$5,000 life insurance policy, was held for questioning but later released.

Then on March 16, 1925, a Mrs. Edna Sack, 24, was mysteriously shot to death in a taxicab in suburban Cicero. Her husband, a George Sack, also was wounded. He said an unknown assailant had attacked them.

Police charged with murder and Sack was charged with murder and brought to trial. He was represented by the famous attorney Clarence Darrow. Sack was declared insane, only to be released in 1932.

The woman whose body was found in Portland Thursday, her former Goldie Goodrich, was born at Dayton, Ore. She married Sack in September, 1932, after teaching for many years at Great Falls, Mont.

sensational charges made public late Friday, Langer said: "They are all in the file if the full committee wants to do anything with them."

Sen. Eastland had described the charges as a "red herring."

Sen. Watkins (R-Tex.) also had denounced them as "a lot of tommyrot."

Langer said that when the full committee meets Wednesday, he would favor an open or public session but this decision would be left to the members.

Welke said the motion to recommend Warren's nomination favorably to the full committee was made by Watkins and seconded by Sens. Hendrickson (R-N.J.) and Hennings (D-Mo.).

Both Deputy Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers and Asst. Atty. Gen. Warren Olney, in charge of the Justice Department's criminal division, made statements to the subcommittee. Langer said these would be made public later.
