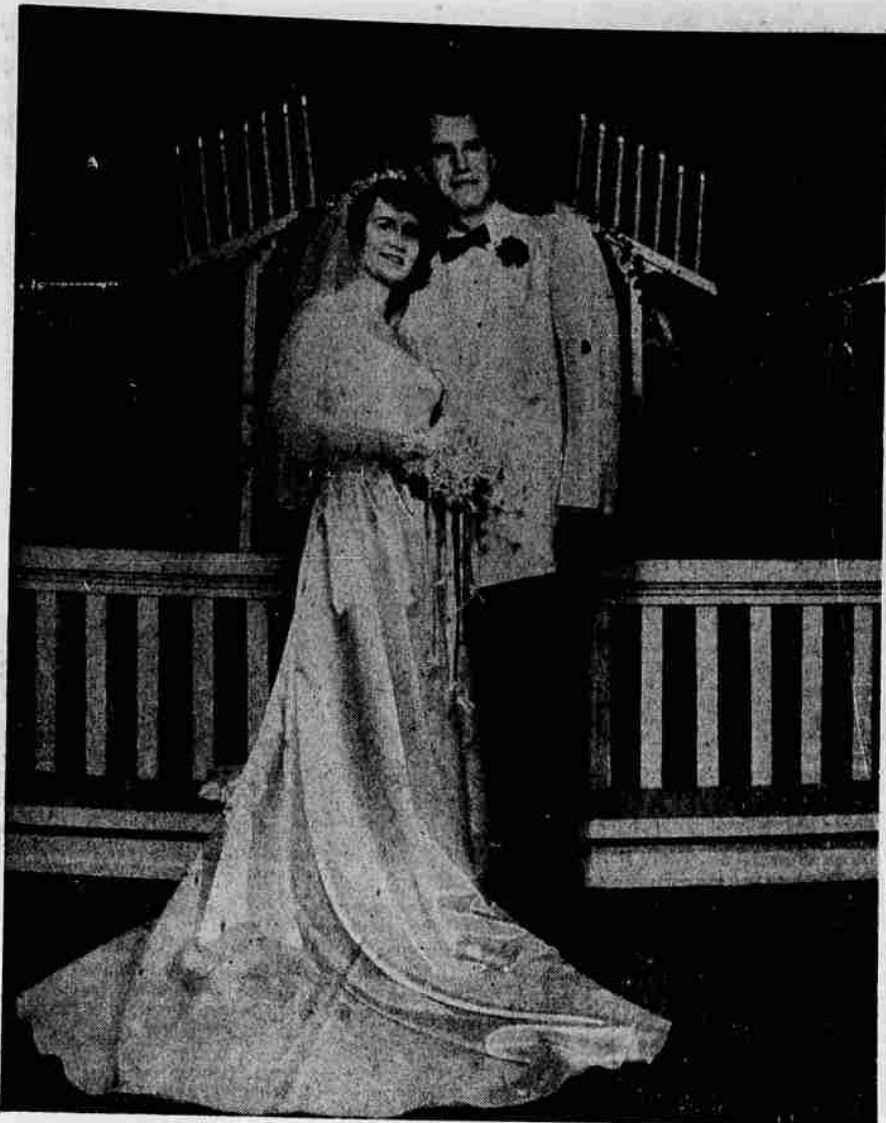

The aims and purposes of a college education as well as the factors contributing to the best type of education for women were discussed by members of the local AAUW at a dessert-luncheon meeting Saturday at the Roseburg Country Clubhouse. Mrs. A. G. McClain was chairman of the program which was entitled "AAUW Branches Look at College Education."

Short reviews, based on a questionnaire completed by AAUW members throughout the United States recently, of various phases of college education for women were given by a panel consisting of Miss Esther Dyer, Mrs. Bruce Hetrick and Mrs. George Halladay.

The purposes of education are twofold, mental and social or personal, according to Miss Dyer's report. Education should cultivate a desire to be part of society and a philosophy of life and a spirit of independence, she said. Attributes of an educated woman are tolerance and understanding stated Miss Dyer.

Training of teachers, attributes of good college teachers and the needs of student counseling were discussed by Mrs. Hetrick. Results of the questionnaire, she reported, showed that AAUW members felt that attractive personalities were all important in teachers and that closer student-faculty relationships were needed on the college level.

Curriculum needs and changes, motivation for self education after college, abolition of the present grading system and co-educational vs. women's colleges were among the topics discussed by Mrs. Halladay.

Following the panel's report the members broke into three groups to discuss further the topics brought out by the speakers. In

After the holidays, Joan returned to Copenhagen, Denmark, to resume her studies.

One of the most interesting trips was made by Joan and a student group to Spain and then to Africa. She reports she would have liked to have stayed longer in North Africa, because the climate at this time of the year is so wonderful. She promises to bring back lots of pictures and talents of her experiences on the trip. A trip through Italy and Switzerland was taken, before the group went

back to Denmark to begin work on their projects.

Feb. 2, Joan left for Renshoved Folk High School in Southern Jutland, near the German border and the following week went to Askov High School. In one of her letters, Joan tells of visiting one of the "smallholder" farm owners.

Typical homes there are square type structures, many of which were built in the 18th century. The living quarters are furnished in an extremely simple manner with neat curtains over the windows which stretch across the front of the house, an extensive collection of books along the wall, a couch, a table decked with a piece of handwork and a delightful old white tile stove which is built through the wall so it warms two rooms at the same time. The dining rooms are even more picturesque with old Danish furniture painted dark blue and decorated with flowers. Joan reports the Danes think nothing of serving six different kinds of cake with the afternoon's coffee.

Besides her parents, Joan has six brothers proud of her and all six are employees of the California Oregon Power Company. Donald, Clifford, Bill and Jim are with the company in Medford; Jack is in Grants Pass and Pete is with the company in Roseburg. Bill and Pete are twins.
