Peruvian crafts was the subject of the talk given by William T. Evans at the meeting of the Roseburg Woman's Club Tuesday at the Clubhouse. Mr. Evans was introduced by Mrs. Kenneth Ford, program chairman, who reminded the group that as a nation, "we have no special crafts." The people of Peru, about ninety percent South American Indians and Spanish descent, are never idle, Mr. Evans said, and the curios, souvenirs, hardwoods, and clothing showing the hand craft of these people, living in this mountainous country would verify that. Numerous hand-loomed woven wool blankets were on display. Of special interest were three robes made from one small portion of the hide of the Llama, only one piece being used from each animal. These were sewed together by hand by the natives. Hats made by the natives would indicate the type of the country they came from. Traveling by boat, airplane and jeep, Mr. and Mrs. Evans visited twenty-two tribes of Indians and found them friendly. They traveled 40,000 miles in the jeep during their stay there. "True Peruvians are Spanish and that is the language of the country," said Mr. Evans.
