PLANS FOR SHROVE TUESDAY PANCAKE SUPPER ANNOUNCED

Shrove Tuesday is the last day before the beginning of Lent, and has become a traditional time for celebrations, the most famous being the Mardi Gras of New Orleans. It has become a local custom at St. George's Episcopal Church in Roseburg, and in many other places, for there to be a pancake supper on the evening of Shrove Tuesday.

The name "Shrove Tuesday" comes from the ancient custom of the people making their confessions before the beginning of Lent and being "shriven" or absolved of their sins. But the present-day observance of Shrove Tuesday are more in the nature of a final celebration before the beginning of Lent.
