Lindsey Pins Mad 'Killer'

The curtain all but rings down this week on the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division basketball race with Oregon State holding the reins but still threatened, albeit ever so slightly, by Idaho and Oregon.

Slats Gill's OSC Beavers are riding the top of the standings with a 10-4 record and wind up their season this Friday and Saturday against arch-rival Oregon, in second place at 8-6.

A sweep or split in the series would give the Beavers the division crown.

From there on a number of things conceivably could happen. The race could end up in a tie between Oregon and Oregon State if Oregon swept the OSC series and Idaho dropped one of its three remaining games.

Washington, fourth with a 5-7 record, and Washington State, the bottom club at 3-10, are completely out of the title picture.

Idaho plays three times this week, taking on Washington State at Pullman Tuesday night and moving to Moscow for a two-game series with Washington Friday and Saturday night.

Washington and Washington State officially wind up the season March 5-6 with two games at Hec Edmundson Pavilion at Seattle.

Oregon took its sixth loss from Washington, 67-59, Saturday night as sophomore Karl Voegtlin displayed uncanny accuracy from the corners in getting 20 points, the night's high effort.

Oregon State had little trouble with Washington State's Cougars Saturday night, trimming the Palouse outfit, 62-41, to insure the Beavers at least a share of the division title.

Halbrook Scores 17
The Beavers took over the lead with less than three minutes gone in the first quarter and the issue was never in doubt after that.

Lewis and Clark took the lead in the Northwest Conference basketball race Saturday night by defeating College of Idaho 103-93.

Willamette and Whitman, tied for first before Saturday's contests, both were defeated. Willamette lost 60-58 to Linfield and Whitman was

beaten 77-69 by Pacific.

R. C. Owens, Idaho center, set a season scoring record for a single game with 42 points on 14 field goals and 14 free throws. But that wasn't enough to give his team the victory. Ken Servas paced Lewis and Clark with 39 points.

Saturday's victory gave Lewis and Clark, which won 93-84 Friday night, a clean sweep of the series.

At McMinnville, two free throws by Gene Small with only six seconds to play gave Linfield its upset win over Willamette.

Linfield trailed most of the game but tied the score at 58-58 with a little more than two minutes remaining. Then Willamette's Jerry McCallister fouled Small. Willamette's Bill Colvard, who was high for the game with 14 points, and

Linfield's Dave Sanford were put out of the game in the third quarter after an exchange of blows.

At Forest Grove, Norm Hubert scored 23 points to pace Pacific's victory over Whitman. Center Rex Gwinn led the losers with 16 points.

Willamette and Whitman now are tied for second place in the standings, followed by Pacific, Linfield and College of Idaho.

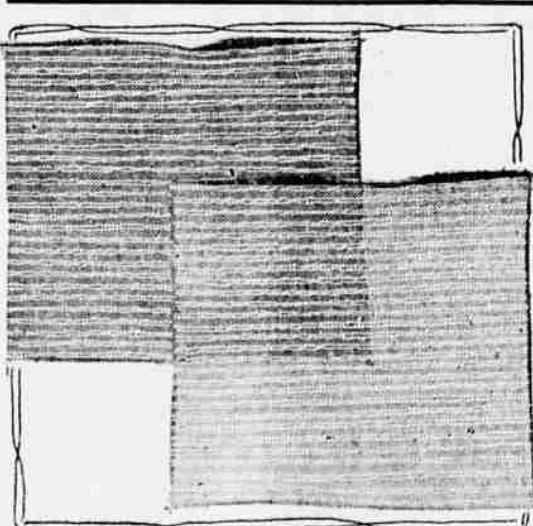

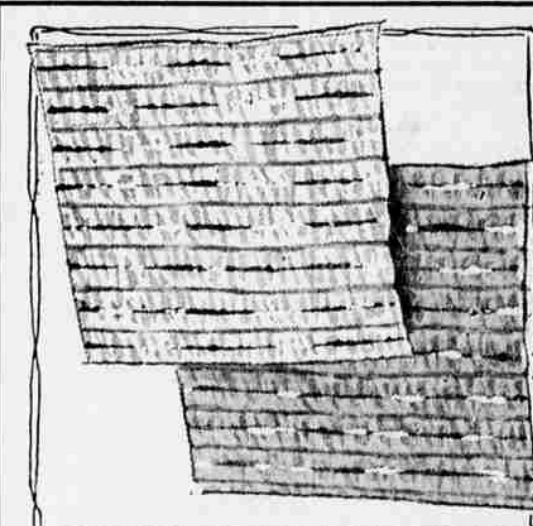
