2 Men Prevented From Seeing Ike; Vagrancy Charged

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. — Two men who tried to visit President Eisenhower Tuesday at his desert vacation headquarters face arraignment today on vagrancy charges.

"They meant no harm," Police Chief John S. Davis said of Carl E. Kinsey, 25, one-quarter Indian of San Bernardino, Calif., and John T. Ortega, 45, mission Indian from a Palm Springs reservation.

The two were arrested at the entrance to the Smoke Tree Ranch where President and Mrs. Eisenhower stayed for six days before their departure last night for Washington. An unloaded rifle was found in the back of their car.

Secret Service agents turned the men over to the Palm Springs police who learned that Ortega and Kinsey were driving from India to Palm Springs. As they passed the Smoke Tree Ranch, one said to the other:

"That's where the President is staying."

"Let's go see him," suggested the other.

They turned into the ranch property and the Secret Service agents were right on top of them.

The President's secretary, James C. Hagerty, told newsmen there was "no indication at all" that the men had plotted an attempt on Eisenhower's life.

Glide School Budget Vote To Be Apr. 5

The budget committee of Glide School District No. 12 has prepared the budget for the 1954-55 school year to be submitted to the voters on April 5 from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. at Glide High School, Deer Creek Elementary School and Toketee Falls Elementary School.

The total budget is \$433,103; the operating budget calls for expenditures of \$358,480; bonds, interest and emergency fund total \$74,623 for the year. This budget covers a raise in base salary of \$200 per year for each teacher.

In a separate ballot at the same election, the voters will be asked to approve the first two years of a serial levy in the amount of \$90,000 per year to provide building space for the overflow enrollment of the elementary schools during the next few years. The serial levy will be asked in lieu of bond issue, which would require payment of principal and interest over many years.

If both measures are approved, the total tax levy for school purposes is estimated at 24 mills, lower than any recent year except 1953-54. The increase over the current year is due entirely to the pay-as-you-go policy adopted by the directors for further building expansion.

Sec. Mitchell Not Ready For Public Works

FLINT, Mich. — Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell opposes an immediate public works program as a solution to unemployment. He regards present trends as part of a necessary and unavoidable readjustment in American economy.

"Waiting employment upend since 1939, he says, 'it just doesn't make sense' to say the nation is heading for a depression."

In a major speech to a Lincoln Day rally last night, he said federal public works projects, if instituted immediately, would make the adjustment "sharper, more painful, and more protracted."

Australian Man Crushed In Rush To See Queen

MELBOURNE, Australia — A man was crushed to death when 10,000 excited Australians burst through a barrier of police and troops to see Queen Elizabeth II arrive in Melbourne Wednesday.

The Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh had just passed the spot when the crowd surged forward.

Otherwise the Melbourne crowd gave the Queen an orderly but tumultuous reception on her arrival from Tasmania.

As she drove through the city streets a shower of confetti, streamers, and torn-up newspapers and telephone directories fell like snow from office windows.

Lieutenant James McAlpine, who was called to the scene, made the arrest while Carmine guarded the door of the establishment.

Farley readily admitted his identity.

Find Bloodstains, Knife

Chief Olson said officers examining the car parked outside found blood stains on the front seat and door, and a knife with blood-like stains on it. The hunting knife was lying against the inside of the rear bumper, caught between the bumper and the filler panel.

Olson said the youth told this story:

He had been to the home of Flora Ellen Mae McFarland Sunday evening for dinner. Later they watched television and drank a few beers.

About 7:30 they left so she could take him home in her car. During the drive, in which she drove the gravel pit, they started arguing about her going out with other fellows.

Farley continued by saying "I blew my top and struck her." Then, he told officers, he couldn't remember anything until he got home about 10 p.m. He said he noticed his suit was covered with blood, so he took it off and chucked it under his house.

Sleeps In Car

He then headed south, spending Monday night in the parked car east of Roseburg, just off the North Umpqua Highway.

He had gone steady with the victim about a year, he told officers, having met her the latter part of 1950.

According to the Associated Press, the body of Mrs. McFarland, which had been run over several times by a car, was found by Isaac Lerew who became curious about pools of blood on a narrow roadway near the gravel pit.

Chief Olson said Tacoma authorities would be here later today to take custody of Farley.

When officers spotted Farley in the bowling alley, they went up and sat down beside him, guns ready, to get a closer look and see if he answered the description they had been given. Farley, after admitting who he was, told them he was waiting for money to be wired to him by his mother. He said he called his mother about 7:30 a.m. Tuesday, but officers here did not know of the call.

As they went about their duties earlier in the evening, they did not realize what was in store.

Communist Party member, Hayes protested, "You have already condemned her before she appears," he said.

McCarthy recessed his hearings until 10:30 a.m. (EST) Thursday when Secretary of the Army Stevens is to appear for a face-to-face encounter on McCarthy's charge that the Army has been soft toward Communists.

Stevens, in an angry exchange last weekend, accused McCarthy of "abusing" Army officers who have appeared before his investigations subcommittee. The secretary directed that two officers, who had been subpoenaed, should not appear.

McCarthy opened a hearing by his Senate investigations subcommittee with a dramatic announcement that two Communist witnesses "broke with the party" Tuesday night and agreed to "give us all the information they had."

He said one of the two had named Mrs. Moss.

Mrs. Moss, a gray-haired Negro of 48, wept as she and her counsel walked from the room. She sat a few steps outside the hearing room while Hayes whispered to her.

Tuesday Hayes had told reporters that Mrs. Moss wished to testify and that her stand was that she was not and never had been a Communist.

He commented on testimony by a former FBI undercover informant that Mrs. Moss was a card-carrying Red in the 1940s.

McCarthy asserted at Tuesday's session that Mrs. Moss handled "top secret" messages at the Pentagon. Later, the Army came out with a statement saying she never had "access to the codes... or the code books."

The Army said she had, however, worked in the communications center prior to Feb. 5 and in that job handled "unintelligible code messages, both classified (secret) and unclassified." It said she was transferred to another job Feb. 5 because of its own investigation.
