Shakeup Ordered Among Police To Curb Mau Maus

LONDON (AP)—A spell that anti-white Mau Mau terrorists cast on Kenya in 1952 with knife, torch and witch doctor ritual is growing despite a bomber-backed campaign to crush the rebellion, a British parliamentary delegation reports.

A drastic shakeup of the East African crown colony's police was proposed by the six-man, all-party delegation Tuesday to help cope with the bloody uprising that some British experts say may last a generation.

Fresh from an 18-day survey of the fertile land where British security forces each month are killing off about 300 of the terrorists and capturing 150, the delegation said there was danger the movement to drive out the whites and to this loyal tribesmen would spread beyond the Kikuyu area where it was born.

The 14 million Kikuyu number about a fourth of Kenya's African population. It is among those tribesmen — who till the fields around Nairobi, the capital, and work as laborers and servants for the whites — that the Mau Mau has done its recruiting by a combination of persuasion and violence.

"The influence of the Mau Mau in the Kikuyu area, except in certain localities, has not declined," the Parliamentary delegation said. "It has, on the contrary, increased. In this respect the situation has deteriorated and the danger of infection outside the Kikuyu area is now greater, not less, than at the beginning of the emergency."

Cases of brutality and corruption were cited among the colonial civil forces allied with British troops in the fight against the Mau Mau, and the report said:

"Reorganization of the police, from the highest level downwards, should be accompanied by stern action to enforce discipline."

GREAT-GRANDMA RIDES SOLO

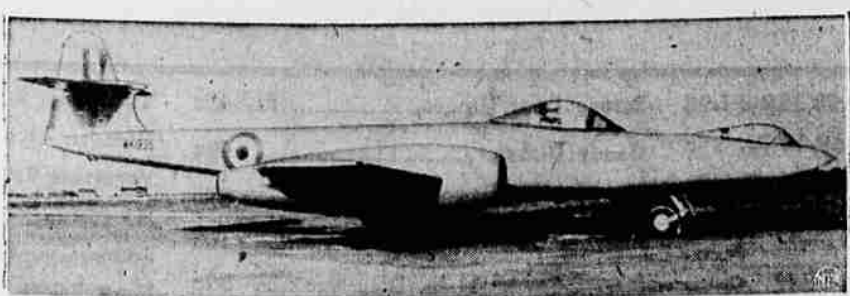
SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP)—Great-grandma Pearl H. Doremus, 79 - years - young, of Mountain Lakes, N.J., finished another cross-country automobile trip. She said this jaunt, made solo from New Jersey to Santa Barbara raised her 40-year motoring log to 800,000 miles.

Petite and perky Mrs. Doremus came to visit her son at nearby Goleta. But this trip of 3,000 miles was just routine. In 1922, she drove from the Jersey coast to the Dakota Territory, got lost in the woods, drove on until she reached the West coast. Then she turned around and drove home.

Her 1929 "voyage" by car was 16,000 miles long—New York, Canada, west to the Pacific, south to Mexico, east to New York—via New Orleans and Miami.

A well-remembered jaunt was the one from Laredo, Tex., to Mexico City. On that trip she said she forded rivers, navigated along "more imagined than real" mountain roads.

Her next excursion—back to New York via Florida—Unless she first skips up to Juneau on the Alaska-Canada Highway.

James Bassett Given GOP Committee Post

WASHINGTON (AP)—James Bassett, 41-year-old political editor of the Los Angeles Mirror, Monday was named director of public relations for the Republican National Committee.

Bassett, who was Vice President Nixon's publicity director in the 1952 campaign, succeeds Robert Humphreys, who was promoted to campaign director, a new job.

The shifts were interpreted by party spokesmen as an effort to step up the 1954 congressional election campaign by relieving Humphreys of what was termed "double duties" in recent months.

Also, the appointment of Bassett by Chairman Leonard W. Hall was looked on as reflecting, in some measure at least, the rising prestige in the party of Nixon. Both Nixon and Bassett are Californians.

3 Oregon Men Indicted For Transporting Women

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—Three Oregon men were indicted Wednesday by a federal grand jury on charges of transporting four women across state lines for immoral purposes.

The indictment charged they brought the four women from Beaumont, Tex., to Little Rock "for purposes of prostitution and debauchery."

Banbury, England (AP)—One day in 1874 a stranger bought a leg of mutton in the South Bar St. butcher shop. "Hang it up for me," he said, "until I come back."

He never did come back. The leg of mutton is still hanging there, and that's how traditions are born in Britain.

"It would be like parting with my own leg to get rid of it," was comment recently made by Edwin Walker, present owner of the business. He started in the shop as an apprentice many years ago.

The leg, which weighed 13 1/2 pounds in its younger muttonhood, is shrunken and wizened now.

Mercy Killing Victim Didn't Have Cancer

THORNWOOD, N. Y. (AP)—A 54-year-old accountant, shot to death by his wife in a purported mercy slaying, is reported to have had no sign of cancer.

Thomas Cannon was killed Monday by his wife Margaret, 55, who told authorities he pleaded: "I've got cancer. Shoot me."

Police said they were told yesterday that a preliminary examination of the body and of Cannon's medical record showed no sign of the disease. Further tests are planned.

Mrs. Cannon also shot the family dog to death and then wounded herself in the left side. She is in Grasslands Hospital in Eastview, N. Y., for mental examination.

James Devon, 53, succumbed to shock and internal injuries after jumping from a second-floor window.

conclude whether or not gamma globulin had an effect in preventing or alleviating the disease when used in this way.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis had announced that it would make available for use this summer three million doses of gamma globulin, worth 19 million dollars. It reaffirmed those plans in commenting on the committee's report.

Foundation President Basil O'Connor said the finding in the case of family contacts "was to be expected" and that the foundation, "foreseeing that, had urged unsuccessfully last year that 'by far the lesser amount of gg be used that way.'"

O'Connor said the report on the use of the product in mass inoculation programs does not rule out the possibility that it may be used effectively in such programs.
