# Nehru Gives Eisenhower Hot Answer

**U. S. Neutrality Role In Row Over Kashmir Dead, Premier Asserts**

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru blisteringly rejected President Eisenhower's offer of arms aid for India Monday and demanded that American observers with the U.N. cease-fire team in disputed Kashmir be withdrawn.

By giving military aid to Pakistan, Nehru told his cheering parliament, the United States had intervened in the India-Pakistan fight over the Himalayan state and the American observers therefore "can no longer be regarded by us as neutrals."

At the end of 1953 the United States had 14 officers with the 48-member U.N. military mission supervising the Kashmir truce.

U.S. Air Force also makes a C-54 transport and crew available when needed.

Eisenhower's offer of American arms aid "has done less than justice to us or to himself," the Premier declared, continuing: "If we object to military aid being given to Pakistan, we would be hypocrites and unprincipled opportunists to accept it ourselves."

Announcing the aid to Pakistan last week, Eisenhower had said the United States would give "most sympathetic consideration" to any request from India for such help. In a letter to Nehru he also assured India that the United States would see to it that Pakistan used the arms from America for defense only.

**Direct Aid Wanted**

Nehru Monday made public his three-paragraph reply, thanking the U. S. President "for your personal message" and saying his government would continue to follow its present policies "which are based on a desire for peace."

India now buys her arms where she pleases and does not accept direct arms aid from foreign governments.

"I have no doubt the President is opposed to aggression," Nehru said, commenting on Eisenhower's assurance that the aid to Pakistan would not be misused.

"But we know from past experience that aggression takes place and nothing is done about it. Aggression took place in Kashmir six and a half years ago and thus far the United States has not only not condemned it, but we have been asked not to press it in the interests of peace. Aggression may well follow in spite of the best intentions of the President and then a long argument will ensue on what exactly is aggression."

were killed earlier Sunday when a car skidded from a highway and overturned in a ditch near Jefferson.

They were Marvin and Melvin Quinnett, 27-year-old twin brothers from Toledo, Ore., and their married sisters, Mrs. Ellen Shaffar, about 40, Toledo, and Mrs. George Wealand, 30, Albany.

Ralph Shaffar, husband of one of the victims, discovered the wrecked car as he was driving to Soio where he was to meet his wife.

Another accident five miles southwest of Weiser on the Oregon-Idaho border Saturday claimed the lives of three—two of them teenagers.

They were Evelyn Lambertson, 17, Payette, Idaho; Ralph Emerick, 22, also of Payette, and Geraldine Chester, 16, Fruitland, Idaho. Floyd Lambertson, 23, brother of one of the dead girls, was injured. Police said they believed Lambertson was the driver of the car which failed to make a turn and crashed into a tree with such force that the car was split in half.

Robert Murphy, a 15-year-old Portland high school student who couldn't swim, died Sunday when he jumped into the Willamette in an effort to rescue an 8-year-old fishing companion who had fallen in. Other fishermen rescued the 8-year-old.

**Drowns Off Umpqua Barr**

Andy Lamon, a commercial fisherman from Eureka, Calif., was killed in a boating accident off the Umpqua River bar Sunday. His boat went out of control when rock, used for ballast, broke loose and jammed the rudder. Three huge waves battered the boat, washing Lamon overboard.

Other crewmen brought the boat into the Reedsport Harbor under its own power.

Ralph LaChance, 9, was wounded fatally Sunday when a gun he was handling discharged accidentally at his home in Grand Ronde. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph LaChance, said they had believed the revolver, which they kept in a holster hanging on a wall in the living room of their home, was unloaded.

The garden clubs of the Oregon State Federation of Garden Clubs have taken the conservation pledge and practice it by sponsoring projects in conservation. Oregon is divided into 15 districts of 250 clubs, with a membership of 800.

It is the purpose of the organization to increase the knowledge and interest in amateur gardening and in plant and bird life, and to give aid and information on all subjects pertaining to them.

# Explosion Destroys Two Buildings, Takes 5 Lives

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Five persons, including three children in a neighborhood luncheonette, were killed last night when a violent explosion destroyed two buildings in a crowded section of South Philadelphia.

A 17-year-old girl, Ruby Mosley, trapped for six hours in a public telephone booth under the mountain of rubble, escaped unharmed. Twenty others, including four firemen, were injured.

Temperatures in an atomic bomb explosion may go as high as 36 million degrees Fahrenheit.
