Death Benefits Sought In Suit Against SAIC

Two suits against the State Industrial Accident Commission were filed in circuit court Friday. One is by Irene Erma Jones who seeks funeral and death benefits as the widow of Thomas J. Jones, who died Aug. 30, 1953. Jones was injured July 24, 1953, when struck by a truck tailgate while working for the State Highway Dept. The SAIC previously rejected a claim by Mrs. Jones on the ground the condition causing death had no relationship to the injury on July 24. Mrs. Jones claims this is not true and seeks to have the claim referred back to the commission. In the other case, Irish Davis seeks awards from the commission as follows: award of disability compensation equal to 50 percent loss of function of a right leg, award of 75 per cent on an arm and award of 25 per cent on left arm. The SAIC previously awarded 25 per cent on an arm as final settlement. Davis was hurt Dec. 24, 1952, while working for Layton Brown as a logger. In the accident, near Azalea, he was thrown against a log.
