Cordon Assures Lumber To Be Bought In U. S.
WASHINGTON (U. S. — Sen. Cordon (R-Ore.) says it has been agreed that nearly half a proposed 21 million board feet lumber shipment for Korea will be purchased in the United States.

The 21,278,000 board foot order is to be used for reconstruction and rehabilitation in Korea. Cordon aides said initial plans called for the lumber to be purchased without restriction on its source. But discussions with the military, they said, have resulted in agreement that at least 9,074,000 board feet will be purchased in the United States.

This portion of the shipment has been taken from present Army stocks and is to be replaced. Efforts are under way, they said, to place the same restrictions on the remaining 12,204,000 board feet.

Use Phone For Tax Information

The Internal Revenue Service is encouraging taxpayers to ask their federal income tax questions by telephone, Roseburg agents announced today. "Large numbers of taxpayers can obtain advice and assistance in a minimum of time by using our telephone service," it was explained.

Many taxpayers come to our office with questions which could be answered in a few seconds," they continued, "and it would save them time and energy if they used the telephone service."

The telephone number of the local Revenue office is 3-7311.

With no substantial changes in the income tax law since 1952, the Director believes that many taxpayer queries result from technical points which the taxpayer has not confronted in the past.

The agents assured the public that "those taxpayers who prepare their own returns, but encounter a technical problem not answered in the tax return instructions, can get a prompt answer by telephoning my office."

The deadline for filing Federal income tax returns is March 15.

Imlah Grateful For Death Stay

PORTLAND (U. S. — Donald Dwayne Imlah, who has said he would rather die in the gas chamber than spend his life in prison, apparently has changed his mind.

The 19-year-old youth, convicted of the July, 1953, slaying of Bruce Houck, Hood River County rancher, didn't want his court-appointed attorneys to appeal the case to the State Supreme Court.

They did anyway, over Imlah's protest, winning an automatic stay of execution while the court considered the appeal.

Imlah now says he is glad they did. His attorney, John Mohr of Hood River, said he had received a letter from Imlah, saying, "I have been notified that you have filed a notice of appeal to the Supreme Court and now that my death has been delayed I have thought it over a bit. I find I am grateful to you...I want to express my appreciation, but I don't know how I can..."

The court probably will consider Imlah's case at its fall term.

Last year it was held in tents. The Tumpane Co., which rented the building for the Air Force, announced last week that it would no longer be needed after August.

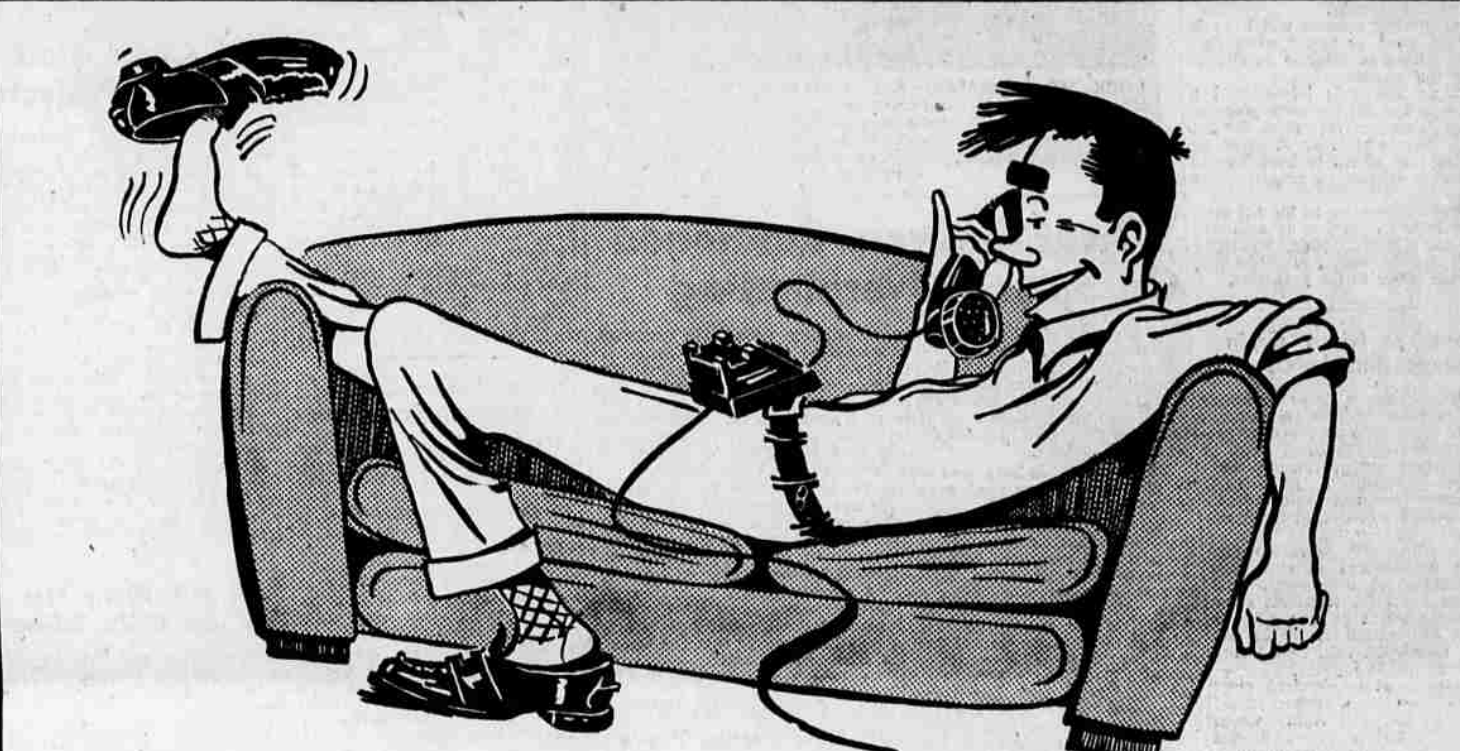
