Armed Forces Sets Need Of Doctors, Dentists

WASHINGTON — The armed forces will need about 4,500 physicians, 1,875 dentists and 225 veterinarians from civilian life in the year following July 1, a Defense Department spokesman said Wednesday.

At the same time, a Selective Service official said the need will be filled by men who willingly volunteer for commissions or who volunteer under pressure of being drafted as privates.

He added that most of the doctors going in would be subject to the draft either under regular draft laws or a special doctor draft law.

In either case, when doctors are classified as available for military service, they're told they may apply for a commission and thereby be eligible for an extra \$100 a month in pay. If they fail to volunteer, they're drafted as privates, and are not eligible to perform normal physician's duties.

Unfrocking Of Minister Upheld By Presbytery

DETROIT — A special judicial commission's unfrocking of the Rev. Claude C. Williams on a charge of heresy has been accepted by the Detroit Presbytery.

The 59-year old Presbyterian minister was convicted last month and ordered removed from the ministry. The Detroit Presbytery accepted the commission's finding Tuesday night.

Williams, now a resident of Helena, Ala., was wartime industrial chaplain in Detroit. He said he will appeal the order to the church's "highest courts." He can appeal to the Synod of Michigan and thence to the church's general assembly.

Williams was found to have held doctrinal views "contrary to the holy Scripture and creed of the church."

WILL DONATE BLOOD

CHICAGO — Thirty Puerto Ricans will donate blood to the U. S. Veterans Administration hospital Wednesday night as a gesture of sympathy for the congressmen wounded by Puerto Rican terrorists.

"We want to show the people of Chicago that we, too, were horrified at what happened in Congress," said an organizer of the mass donation who declined use of his name.

PORTLAND — Walter R. Carroll, 39, pleaded innocent Wednesday to a charge of stealing \$20,000 in currency from the Umatilla Postoffice Nov. 30, 1950.

Federal Judge Gus Solomon set April 27 for his trial. There were two \$20,000 thefts from the postoffice in 1950. William Ritchey, who is serving six years in the state prison for another crime, pleaded guilty to the earlier theft. Judge Solomon said he would sentence Ritchey after he completes the state prison term.

Sack Preliminary Hearing Slated

PORTLAND — George F. Sack, 37, accused of suffocating his wife last month, was to be brought to court Thursday afternoon for a preliminary hearing on a charge of first degree murder.

The woman, Mrs. Goldie Sack, 36, was his third wife to die violently. The other two died in the 1930s in Chicago—the first in an apartment fire and the second of a gunshot wound.

Sack was accused of first degree murder in the shooting but was found insane and committed to an Illinois mental hospital. He was released in 1932.

In 1939 Sack was held 10 days and questioned about the disappearance of J. C. Young at Seattle. Young has never been found.

Sack has denied any knowledge of how his third wife died. Her body was found under a clump of brush east of Portland a day after Sack reported her missing.
