and property owners would vote the act into effect, this amount could be gathered.

He related that a favorable vote by a majority of the property owners would put the act into effect.

Another method for securing money for improvements might be to request the county to delegate some of the funds it uses, in the Riddle area on roads for city improvement purposes, Marsh advised.

He also said the city might inquire to see if the state would delegate some funds to keep up city streets which carry heavy industrial traffic. The city is receiving \$15,000 from the state emergency fund this year, but Marsh said more might be secured on the "heavy traffic" basis.

In the final analysis, he said four questions must be answered before definite steps can be taken to get funds.

1. Will the people of the city sign a petition to bond for the necessary funds?

2. How much state money is available?

3. How much county money is available?

4. How much does the county already spend in the area?

Marsh was accompanied to Riddle by his twin brother, Francis, and both men's wives and a nephew, Roger Marsh and his wife of Roseburg.

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Local Meetings On Classification Of Lands Slated

Dates and sites for part of a series of local meetings on grazing classification through the rest of the month have been announced by the county land classification committee.

The meetings will be held prior to three public hearings to be held in the early part of April, and will include all sections of the county. Expected to result from the meetings are suggestions for changes in present classification laws.

At each gathering will be at least one representative of the classification committee and one from Douglas Forest Protective Assn. They are to explain present laws on classification and to present progress of the committee.

The list of local meetings, all to start at 8 p.m. includes:

March 8 — Days Creek area at Days Creek School. March 9 — Calapooia area at Stephens. March 12 — North Douglas at Curtin School. March 26 — Cow Creek area at Azalea Grange Hall.

March 27 — Kellogg area at Kellogg Grange. March 29 — East Douglas at South Creek Grange Hall.

More local meetings will be announced later, according to Jack Merkle, forestry technician at DFPA headquarters.

Dates of the public hearings have been changed to April 6 and 7. Originally, they were to have been held on April 1 and 2. Times and sites of the hearings will be revealed later.

Involved are 325,000 acres of land in the county.

'Walking Blood Bank' Effective In Saving Lives

The importance of the so-called "walking blood bank" was pointed out sharply during the past three days when the Red Cross received no less than 13 requests for blood for transfusions in the Roseburg area. Most of them were rare types.

The happy twist of the story is that the Red Cross was able to fulfill all 13 requests including one of the rarest possible types of blood.

The most spectacular incident leading to a call for blood came Friday when an expectant Yoncalla mother, began hemorrhaging in a pre-birth complication at the Snake Bar Friday noon.

She was rushed to Roseburg's Community Hospital by a Roseburg Cab Co. vehicle driven by Howard Herrick after she was stricken without warning.

A call was sent out immediately for a rare type of blood, and Mrs. Mildred Herman who was at the eating establishment was already going into action. She called Mrs. Dolores Anderson, Merle R. Bashor, L. L. Bailey and Ken Bailey, who were all ready to donate.

A physician reported the baby, not due until March 22, had not yet arrived, but the mother is described as in good condition.

One call was for the rarest of all types of blood, AB negative. Even this was filled by the Red Cross. A check through the files revealed that William Hallcraft had the type. He agreed to give the blood and was rushed to the hospital in time to save a life.

The 13 requests were made when blood was not available in the local hospital stockpiles.

State Appraisers Are Acquired For Work In County

A cooperative agreement under which land appraisals will be made for Douglas County by trained appraisers furnished by the State Tax Commission, was announced Friday by County Judge Carl C. Hill.

The County Court, Judge Hill reports, has signed an agreement with the Tax Commission whereby the county pays to the commission each month the salary of trained appraisers required for appraisal work in the assessor's office, the employees to be supplied by the Tax Commission and carried on the state payroll.

The plan, Judge Hill states, is adopted for the purpose of bringing about uniform and equitable appraisals on formulas applied on a statewide basis.

Harold L. Svarverud, Salem, has been assigned to Douglas County under this program and has reported for work in the assessor's office, Judge Hill reports. One or more additional appraisers will be furnished as needed.

The special assignment of Floyd L. Crittenden to land classification and appraisal, it is announced, has been terminated. Crittenden, who retired several months ago from the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co., has been employed in the department for which personnel henceforth will be supplied by the State Tax Commission.

North American monopolies." The Guatemalan foreign minister told newsmen:

"We did not and do not attack the United States; and we repeat it, against the great monopolies, which do not represent the American people nor of their government."

After the undercover feud between Toriello and Dulles had blazed into the open Friday, Saturday's plenary session of the conference was canceled. There was no explanation, but it appeared likely that conference leaders wanted time or tempers to cool.

In his speech Friday, Toriello said his country is battling the big stick and dollar diplomacy employed by "the forces of international reaction."

wounding five members of Congress in a wild shooting demonstration Monday.

U. S. District Judge James W. Morris assigned the attorneys at a brief hearing yesterday.

In San Juan, Puerto Rico, meanwhile, Courtney Owens, representing Chairman Velde (R-Ill) of the House Un-American Activities Committee, conferred Friday with Gov. Luis Munoz Marin, presumably on plans to investigate activities on the mainland by the small, fanatical Nationalist party.

A resolution was introduced in the commonwealth senate for formation of a special security commission to investigate the party.

At the arraignment here Friday, the judge tried to explain to the defendants the significance of entering pleas and their rights to counsel and a fair trial.

Harry Hastings, a secret service agent stationed in Puerto Rico, was called in as a Spanish-English interpreter.

Finally Lolita Lebron, self-styled leader of the Nationalist demonstrators, said:

"I would like it to be charged that what I committed was the defense of my country."

"But do you enter a plea of not guilty?" the judge asked.

"Yes, on those grounds," Mrs. Lebron replied.

One of the three male defendants said something about coming here "to defend independence of our country."

The judge ordered innocent pleas also for the three men—Rafael Cancel Miranda, Andres Figueroa Cordero and Irving Flores Roriquen—"on the same grounds."
