Drawings Held For Awarding Columbia Lands

PASCO, Wash. (AP) — The name of a Lemore, Calif., war veteran was the first of 410 names drawn from a fishbowl Friday as the Bureau of Reclamation began the first step in awarding 82 units of land in the Columbia Basin near here.

The little capsule containing the name of Harold Smith was drawn by Flory Cavin, Pasco High School honor student, in a draw conducted by the bureau and officials of the South Columbia Irrigation District.

Fresh And Clear Streams Major Concern Of State

TILLAMOOK (AP) — Fresh, clear streams are a major concern of the Oregon fish industry, the State Water Resources Committee was told here Friday.

Continued efforts to reduce pollution and to maintain watershed areas that could supply adequate year-around stream flows were urged by a spokesman for the industry.

This was the first time the industry has appeared before the committee in its current tour to collect data for a state-wide water development program. Numerous other industries and groups have discussed their water needs in earlier committee hearings in eastern and southwestern Oregon.

Beale Dixon of Tillamook, manager of the Tillamook Creamery Association, was chairman of the meeting at which these recommendations were presented also.

Improved logging practices to prevent the runoff of silty water into coastal streams.

Regulation of irrigation to maintain adequate stream flows.

Establishment of a permanent Water Resources Commission.

Stratojet Bombers Make Global Mobility Flight

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (AP) — Twelve big stratojet bombers completed an exercise in "global mobility" Friday when they arrived at March Air Force Base after a non-stop flight from England.

The bombers took off from land made the 5,880-mile trip over land and sea in 12 hours and 21 minutes. All of the bombers were refueled twice while in flight.

The pilot of the lead plane was Col. John B. Henry Jr., commander of the 22nd Bomb Wing. He said the crossing was uneventful except for heavy head winds along portions of the course. Colonel Henry said his six-jet bomber was refueled by an aerial tanker, once over the Atlantic and again over the United States.

The dozen arrivals here Friday were the first batch of 45 stratojet bombers returning from Upper Heyford in England. Others are expected to arrive Saturday and Sunday.
