Wright Norton To Be Conducting Services In Area

Wright Norton of the Far Eastern Broadcasting Co. will be conducting services in this area. Norton recently returned from a six months tour on Formosa, Okinawa, Hong Kong and the Philippines, also spending one month at Christian Radio City Manila in observation of the vast Far East broadcasting operations on seven transmitters.

Norton will tell how the Christian Broadcasting station was founded by faith at the close of World War II by three California men, John C. Broger, Robert H. Bowman and William J. Roberts. He will also explain how tape recording facilities have been set up by the Far Eastern Broadcasting Co. in every country of Asia outside the Iron Curtain, and Christian programs, produced by missionaries and national Christians in the languages and dialects of their respective countries, flow in a steady stream to the Christian Radio City Manila where they are broadcast by pin-point directional beaming back into their countries of origin.

Another story will concern the pre-tuned battery operated radio receivers aptly named PM's (portable missionaries) that are being built by the Far Eastern Broadcasting Co. in every country of Asia outside the Iron Curtain, and Christian programs, produced by missionaries and national Christians in the languages and dialects of their respective countries, flow in a steady stream to the Christian Radio City Manila where they are broadcast by pin-point directional beaming back into their countries of origin.

Norton's address will be illustrated by kodachrome pictures from the Far East, the actual broadcasting being done in Christian Radio City Manila to countries behind the Iron Curtain, of ceremonies, of head hunters of the Philippines, and other pictures of Asiatic and current world interest.

Glide Area Sees Work Resumed

Construction crews on timber access roads into the North Umpqua National Forest, began work the latter part of February, earlier than expected because of the good weather.

Funderburk Construction Co., who has the contract for the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads for the construction of 5½ miles access road from the North Umpqua highway at Steamboat into the forest, started in the spring of 1953, but on account of so many closures of the woods caused by low humidity, the company only completed one-third of the road when operations were stopped in mid-summer.

Funderburk Co. now has a camp again established at Steamboat. Twelve trailer houses belonging to families are already there, and modern tent houses are provided for single men. The cook house is open also.

Watts Construction Co. holds the contract for 8 miles of road construction, extension of the same road Funderburk is working on. Watts Co. added five extra men to their regular crew the past five days and expect to put on 15 more men April 1.

The John R. Saxton Co. of Clatskanie, who leased eight acres from N. W. McMullen above Idleyd Park for a trailer court to accommodate the trailer houses owned by members of its crew with families, began operations March 1 on their contract for the surfacing of the new North Umpqua Highway from Mc's place to Steamboat, a distance of 18 miles.

Funderburk Construction holds a sub-contract for the grading and leveling of the highway road in preparation of the black top.
