The woman is a devout member of the "Witnesses of Christ" movement. She was held under a French penal code provision making it a crime to refuse help to a person in peril of death.

Engineers Want State To Take Over Hatcheries

WASHINGTON, Mo. — Army Engineers want the state of Oregon to take over operation and maintenance of the Leabury and Oakridge fish hatcheries built in connection with construction of Lookout Point Dam.

Col. William Whipple, Army Engineer executive for civil works, disclosed the engineers' position during recent testimony before a House Appropriations Subcommittee. The testimony was made public Monday.

"We are not absolutely sure now that the state will accept the responsibility for the operation and maintenance of these hatcheries," Whipple said, "but we are going to try to get them to accept it after fiscal year 1957."

He said the corps' effort is based on its belief that the hatcheries not only replace fish spawning grounds which might be lost through construction of the dam but that the additional water flow provided by operation of the dam in the low-water season will help eliminate downstream pollution, thereby increasing the fish population.

Brig. Gen. E. C. Itschner, assistant chief of engineers for civil works, said that whether the state agrees to take over operation of the hatcheries depends on how much more it feels benefits would outweigh straight compensation for the damage caused by the dam itself.

"In this case," he said, "it seems to us at least that there is going to be a rather large margin of additional benefit which the state will get which would make it desirable for the federal government to pay the initial cost, which we are doing, and let them pay for the operation later."

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Morse Says Government Had To Lower Supports

DAYTON, Ohio (AP) — Undersecretary of Agriculture True D. Morse said Tuesday the government had no choice but to lower price supports for dairy products in the marketing year beginning April 6.

Morse said that Secretary Benson, in lowering the supports for butter, cheese and dried milk from the present level of 90 per cent of parity to 75 per cent, followed a ruling by the Agriculture Department's solicitor, or top legal officer.

Parity is a standard for measuring farm prices declared by law to be fair to farmers in relation to prices they pay.

In a speech prepared for the Miami Valley Milk Producers Assn., Morse said farm law specifically directs the secretary of agriculture to support dairy prices between 75 and 90 per cent of

Reclamation Bureau To Call Columbia Bids

DENVER (AP) — The Reclamation Bureau said Tuesday bids will be called next week for construction of 70 miles of Columbia Basin irrigation system laterals east from Othello.

Excavation of more than a million yards of earth and rock is involved. The call for bids will be issued here Monday.

The laterals will help deliver irrigation water next year from the East Low canal to about 15,000 acres in irrigation block 45. Bids are also expected to be called Monday for lining of more than a mile of East Low canal near Warden.



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'Traf-o-teria' Proves Boon To Collecting Fines

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — Fuming drivers who wouldn't be caught dead — no less alive — in the police station to pay a parking fine have found salvation at last in the "Traf-o-teria."

The little device, installed recently on all parking meters here as an experiment, turns potential nonpayers of parking tickets into law-abiding citizens. Indications are it's going over big with the paying customers.

A motorist here receives a parking ticket and an envelope. If he puts the ticket and 50 cents into the envelope and places it in the Traf-o-teria, an aluminum box attached to the parking meter, the fine is considered paid. Wait 48 hours and the ante goes up to \$1.

Police Chief Albert Dodd thinks the pay-as-you-drive boxes will be a bonanza in enforcement of the city's traffic codes.

"Used to be," reflected Dodd, "women were pretty reluctant to come to the station, and they'd give the tickets to their husbands, who chances are, would forget to pay them. Now the women pay better than men."

Overtime parking fines collected in the boxes during the first month of "Operation Traf-o-teria" totaled \$400, Dodd said, a 135 per cent increase over the previous month's take.

Conceding that a few nasty notes crop up along with the ticket envelopes, chewing gum, match covers, and assorted loot when the collecting officers empty the boxes, the chief insisted that so far public reaction has been "quite favorable."

Spreckels Marriage Lasts Only 34 Days

VENTURA, Calif. (AP) — The sixth marriage of sugar heirolph B. Spreckels Jr., 42, lasted just 34 days, according to a divorce complaint filed here.

The complaint, charging cruelty, was filed against Judith Powell, 22, beautiful Beverly Hills housewife, it was disclosed last night. The document said the couple married Jan. 31 at Las Vegas, Nev., and separated last Thursday.

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
