

All-California NCAA Title Round Set

Santa Clara, USC Triumph

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — Two California entries, versatile Santa Clara and smooth-passing Southern California, clash here Saturday night for the Far West regional NCAA basketball tournament title.

They crushed two Rocky Mountain hopefuls before a crowd of 8,819 Friday night, Southern California romping over Idaho State, 73-50, and Santa Clara walloping Colorado A&M, 73-50.

Meet Tonight
They meet Saturday night in the second game of a doubleheader, the winner to qualify for the NCAA finals at Kansas City.

In the first game, Idaho State, champion of the Rocky Mountain Conference, will meet the Colorado Aggies, champions of the Skyline Conference, for third place in the regionals.

Southern California, normally a team that stresses defense, fell out Idaho State carefully, then turned on offensive steam in the final period to win going away.

Southern California had a big height advantage and never trailed.

Santa Clara also showed a strong defense, throwing up a zone that forced Colorado A&M to shoot from far out. Few of the Aggies' shots went through.

With this the winners coupled a fast break that had the Aggies reeling as early as the second quarter. The halftime margin was 44-27 and later in the game the advantage was as high as 25 points.

Leads Scoring
Jim Young, 6-3 Santa Clara forward, led the scoring with 20 points, taking the honors away from 6-9 Ken Sears, who usually leads the way. Sears had 11.

The Broncos, their shooting percentage aided by numerous lay-ins after fast breaks, made no less than 50 per cent of their shots.

For Southern California, Roy Irvin, 6-8 center, sank how shots repeatedly to total 25 points. His team made good on 37 per cent of its field goal attempts.

Santa Clara, averaging nearly 6-4, will carry a height advantage in the game Saturday night, but it will be the Santa Clara record is 41-6, Southern California's 19-12.

The Southern California victory was one of teacher over pupil. Coach Steve Belko of Idaho State formerly played for coach Forrest Twogood of Southern California when both were at the University of Idaho 14 years ago.

Ione, Harrisburg Matched In State 'B' Hoop Finals

SALEM (AP) — Ione and Harrisburg won their way into the championship finals of the Oregon class B high school basketball tournament here Friday night, and will meet Saturday night in the title game.

Ione nosed out Elgin, 48-45, and Harrisburg edged Powers, 42-40, in the semi-finals.

Ione ran into a tough Elgin defense in Friday night's feature game, but came from behind to post its 25th victory of the season. Ione is the state's only undefeated prep basketball team.

Ione's Dwayne Baker hit a free throw in the final seconds and then deliberately missed his second shot, giving Dick Rea a chance to score the winning tip-in. Baker and Rea had teamed to do the same thing less than a minute earlier.

Rea and Elgin's Eddy Hug shared high scoring honors with 12 points each.

Phil Estergard was the hero in Harrisburg's victory over Powers. He connected for two free throws in the final seconds to break a 40-40 deadlock.

Bob (Red) Walker turned in a sparkling floor game for losing Powers, and topped game scoring with 19 points. DeWayne Crabb was high for Harrisburg with 16.

Elgin, the runnerup in last year's class B tournament, meets Powers in the first game Saturday night for third place.

Friday's consolation round winners — Knappton and Talent — will fight it out for the consolation title Saturday afternoon at 2:30. Knappton defeated Heppner, 51-50, and Talent rolled over Mill City, 63-38. Heppner missed a fine chance

Riddle, Glide Beaten At Ashland; Wildcats Vie For Third Tonight

Glide moved into contention for third place in the Southern Oregon Invitational High school tournament at Ashland by winning a second round game and losing a third-start Friday, while Riddle, a second Douglas County entry moved into the consolation bracket by losing two straight starts.

In a second round game, Glide upset the pre-tournament favorite, St. Mary's of Medford, 49-43, but in an evening game the Wildcats lost to Gold Beach, now the tournament favorite, 50-36.

Riddle fell to Gold Beach 43-42 in a double overtime game in the second round and lost to St. Mary's 35-32 in the evening.

Glide now meets Sacred Heart of Klamath Falls in a game for third place Saturday night, while Gold Beach and Mapleton clash in the championship game.

Glide struggled for first and second quarter deficits of 9-5 and 23-20 to overcome St. Mary's in a second round game. The Wildcats led 34-34 at the end of the third period behind the shooting of Bob Franks who tallied 15 for the game.

Glide lost to Gold Beach by a 56-36 count after trailing through much of the game. The Panthers led 10-7 at the end of the first quarter but it was tied at 19-19 at halftime.

The third quarter ended with the winners leading 34-24. High point men were Glide's Dick Smith with 12 and Bill Allard of the winners with 16.

Riddle led most of the way before losing to Gold Beach in a second round game. The Irish led by second and third quarter scores of 19-17 and 32-28 only to see the winners tie it up at 36-36 at the end of regulation time. First quarter score was 8-8.

The first overtime ended 41-41 before Gold Beach's Bob Myers sank a field goal and Ray Rhodes

to send its game into overtime when Dick Kononen missed a free throw with 10 seconds to play. Knappton was leading, 51-49, when Kononen drew a pair of foul shots. He hit the first but missed the second. Knappton's Bob Hunt led game scoring with 18 points, and Eddie Elliott scored 16 for the winners. Rich Ruhl was high for Heppner with 14.

Talent jumped to a 12-point lead before Mill City scored a point, and Talent went on to win handily. Al Hoffman with 19 and Clyde Gett with 13 paced the winners. Center Phil Carey was high for Mill City with 11.

SUDS WIN
ONTARIO, Calif. (AP) — The Seattle Rainiers clubbed two San Diego pitchers for 14 hits Friday as the Suds blasted the Padres, 6-2, in a Pacific Coast League exhibition baseball game here.

Rosenthal collapsed and became ill on the sidelines with a little more than a minute to play, he summoned enough strength, however, to play the final seconds. It was a fine all-around performance by the courageous youngster.

Penn Wins
Penn State, for its part, upended Louisiana State 78-70 in the other half of the Iowa City doubleheader so Notre Dame will have its hands full.

The other round of 16 games did not provide any startling form reversals. La Salle whipped North Carolina State 88-51 and Navy edged Cornell 69-67 in Philadelphia; Oklahoma A&M slugged Rice 51-45 and Bradley turned back Colorado 76-64 at Stillwater, and at Corvallis, Southern California dumped Idaho State 73-59 and Santa Clara halted Colorado A&M 73-50.

Penn State, an at-large entry like Notre Dame, must be an underdog team. The Nittany Lions couldn't do much with LSU's all-America, Bob Pettit, who poured 34 points through the hoop, but they did stop his mates.

Jesse Arnall was high man for Penn State with 24 points.

Another all-America, Tom Gola of La Salle, had better luck with Pettit. He scored 26 points and grabbed the same number of rebounds in his team's triumph over North Carolina State. The game was close until the last five minutes.

The other half of the Philadelphia twin bill was a real thriller and unheard-of Ken McCall turned out to be the big gun in Navy's victory over Cornell. He made only one basket but it was the winning one with three seconds to go.

Bradley Hits
Bradley's victory over Colorado was engineered to a great extent by Bob Carney, who set a new NCAA record for foul shots hitting for 23 of them. He totaled 37 points for the game. Seattle's Johnny O'Brien held the old foul record—18.

Another upset looked in the making for three periods of the Oklahoma A&M Rice contest. At one point in the third period, the Southwest Conference champions were ahead by 10 points. But the Aggies found the range in the final quarter and pulled away.

Roy Irvin was the big gun for Southern California, the Pacific Coast champion. He scored 25 points, while the rest of the Trojans were permitting Idaho State few good shots.

Colorado A&M held Ken Sears, Santa Clara's 6-9 high scorer, to 11 points. But where he left off his mates picked up. Jim Young had 20 points and Dennis Stuebgen pitched in 18.
