

Fire Kills Four Only Inches From Safety Exit

KOKOMO, Ind. (AP)—A family of four perished in a blazing apartment here late last night—inches from a window and safety exit.

The dead were Paul Imlay, 27, a filling station operator; his wife, Betty, 24; and two children, Cindy, 4, and William, about 1.

Imlay apparently awoke and smelled smoke in their second floor garage apartment. Rushing outside, he called to neighbors for help and raced back inside.

Fire Chief Francis X. Mannion of Kokomo said he apparently succeeded in getting the wife and two children out of bed but collapsed a few feet from the window through which they could have jumped to safety.

Mrs. Imlay was lying across the two children, her outflung arms just inches from the blackened window, Mannion said.

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being felt in the handling of money bills by the Senate Appropriations Committee, of which he is chairman.

All this talk about cutting taxes is making it almost impossible to cut expenditures as we should," the New Hampshire senator said. "We struggle to cut off a million dollars here and a million dollars there and then we hear that all of these savings will be swallowed up in tax reductions. It has caused some members to adopt a 'what's-the-use' attitude."

Democrats are undecided whether they will attempt to attach to a House-approved excise tax bill which comes up for hearing before the Senate Finance Committee today an amendment which would increase the personal income tax exemption allowed for each taxpayer and each dependent from the present \$600 to \$700.

They plan definitely, however, to offer it for inclusion in a general tax revision measure scheduled for a House vote Thursday.

This measure carries a 240-million-dollar tax relief provision for corporation stockholders and this is under direct Democratic fire.

House Speaker Martin (R-Mass) predicted over the weekend that if the tax exemption increase is attached, President Eisenhower will veto the bill.

Indochina's Bloodiest Battle Enters 3rd Day

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a wide swath in the ranks of the wildly charging rebels.

The legions of Communist leader Ho Chi Minh appeared making an all-out effort to give the French a major setback before the Big Four and Communist China meet in Geneva, Switzerland, April 28 to seek a path to peace in Indochina.

The French for their part hoped to decimate the ranks of the best rebel divisions and perhaps thus break the back of the Vietminh forces.

The fighting was described as the most savage yet in the seven-year-old Indochina war.

French Outposts Fall

The Vietminh encircled the fortress, entrenching from 36,000 to 46,000 troops in the surrounding hills. Making up this force were the four best trained and equipped divisions of the Vietminh's eight regular divisions. More than 100,000 coolies packed in supplies — mostly from Communist China — over mountain trails.

Screaming infantry fired rifles, pistols, submachineguns and hurled bamboo spears as they closed in for hand-to-hand fighting.

Two French outposts were overpowered.

The defending force, under French officers, was made up of French paratroopers, Foreign Legionnaires, North Africans and Vietnamese.

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were destroyed and this contributed heavily to the 20-million-dollar damage estimate at Lawton Field and at Ft. Benning, the nation's largest Army base.

Dead at the air base were 6-month-old Linda Joyner, daughter of Sgt. J. C. and Mrs. James T. Joyner, and Airman 3-C Bobby T. Robinson, 22, of Dublin, Ga. The baby died when several huge cinder blocks tumbled from the roof of her parents' two-story house and crushed her in her bed.

Twin tornadoes took parallel paths through the Macon area three hours later and accounted for most of the dead and injured. Macon hospitals still house 15 persons and 35 others were dismissed after treatment.

The Macon dead were 6-month-old Dorothy Ann Lockhart, Gilbert Robinson, and Austin Hogan. The parallel twister killed Irene Wallace, 11, and Lorena Wallace, 6, when it destroyed a farmhouse in rural Lizella. Sam Emory was killed when another farmhouse collapsed near Centerville.

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communism played into the hands of opponents of the administration and that the administration's procedures used both in the executive and legislative branches must be fair and proper.

McCarthy Cries Blackmail

The feud flared anew last week with publication of an official Army report to senators alleging that McCarthy and an aide on his Senate investigations subcommittee had put pressure on the Army to get special favors for Pvt. G. David Schine, a drafted former member of the subcommittee's staff. The report specifically accused the subcommittee's chief counsel, Roy Cohn, who is a pal of Schine, of backing such demands with threats.

"Blackmail," McCarthy retorted. He accused Secretary of the Army Robert T. Stevens and John Adams, Army general's chief of trying to use the drafting of Schine as "a club" against further probing by the subcommittee into McCarthy's charges of Reds in the Army.

In a weekend exchange between the Wisconsin Senator and the Army secretary:

1. McCarthy made public Saturday a letter he had addressed to Stevens last Dec. 22 declaring that the subcommittee's investigations of Reds in the Army would "in no way be influenced" by anything the Army might do about whether Schine ever would have been drafted if he had not been connected with the subcommittee.

2. "Smoke screen," Stevens fired back in a telegram to McCarthy. The wire renewed the accusation that "your representatives" had been after the Army to give Schine special treatment.

Other Developments

In New York last night CBS commentator Edward B. Murrow, who criticized the senator and then offered to let him take over a succeeding program to reply, refused to accept a substitute McCarthy proposed. The senator had offered to send author William F. Buckley Jr. to speak for him.

In Cincinnati a local radio broadcast of a talk by Roger W. Baldwin, chairman of the American Civil Liberties Union, on McCarthy was canceled. A spokesman for the International Forum, the sponsor, said the reason was fear McCarthy might demand equal radio time.

Missouri and St. Louis Republican committee chairman said last night they would oppose issuance of any invitation to McCarthy to speak in the state in Republican campaigns if he "disturbs the President's program."
