PORTLAND — Building construction in the West last month was up compared with January but down compared with February 1953, the construction journal, Western Building reported.

In the 25 leading construction areas, a gain of 10.8 per cent in the value of construction for February over January was reported. Compared with February, 1953, however, construction last month was down 1.2 per cent.

Seattle was 9th in value, following San Francisco and Denver which was 4th.

Report Of Whale Catch Puzzles Radio Listener

SHIMONOSEKI, Japan — To the man who doesn't know one whale from another, it was just a bit confusing.

The Nishin Maru whaling fleet of the Nippon Fishing Co., Saturday radioed that it had caught 1,005 whales since the Antarctic season opened Jan. 2 and claimed a new fleet catch record.

As if that one-half whale wasn't perplexing enough, the fleet also radioed that its season's catch totaled 154 blue whales, 1,683 fin whales, and 15 humpback whales. That adds up to 1,852 whales—and no one-half.

CATHOLIC PRIEST DIES

SPOKANE — The Rev. Augustine Krebsbach S. J., retired Jesuit Catholic priest, died in a hospital here Sunday night. Father Krebsbach entered the priesthood in 1896 and served at St. Francis Xavier Church in Missoula, Mont., Gonzaga University, Marquette High School in Yakima, St. Leo's Church in Tacoma, and Bellarmine High School in Tacoma. He retired last year.

Dope Flow Into U. S. Far Outstripping Law

WASHINGTON — Only one twentieth of the illegal drugs flowing into the United States is spotted by narcotics officers, senators investigating juvenile delinquency say.

In a report on its first six months' work, the special juvenile delinquency subcommittee headed by Sen. Hendrickson (R.-N.J.) Sunday cited "serious" narcotics addiction among teenagers and noted that Communist China has put back into operation "the world's largest narcotic plant."

Outdrinks Driver, So He Returns Part Of Cost

OKLAHOMA CITY — Officers, bowing to an unusual request, tested a passenger in a car for drunkenness after giving the routine drunkometer test to the driver. The passenger explained he and the driver had shared the cost of the bottle and "I want to see if he's getting more of the whisky than I am." Found to be twice as drunk as the driver, he returned a dollar of the purchase price, cursing himself for "hogging up all the liquor."

Coastal States Win Title To Oil-Rich Lands

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court Monday denied Alabama and Rhode Island permission to file suits alleging Congress violated the Constitution when it conceded title to oil-rich lands to coastal states. Rejecting the request from Alabama and Rhode Island, the court's majority opinion declared that the power of Congress to do as it wishes with public lands "is without limitation."

The two states, in seeking to challenge validity of a 1953 act, contended it deprived their citizens of equitable interests in oil resources estimated to be worth 50 billion dollars, plus 62 million dollars in royalties and revenues impounded by the United States.
