McCarthy Agrees To Let Army Cross Examine Him

mittee consultant who now is an Army private at Camp Gordon, Ga.

To be probed at the same time was McCarthy's and Cohns countercharges that Secretary of the Army Robert T. Stevens and John G. Adams, the Army's general counsel, tried to "blackmail" them into an effort to ward off a subcommittee investigation of alleged Communists in Army ranks.

Serving as temporary chairman during this special probe will be Sen. Mundt (R-SD), a close associate of McCarthy in past proceedings. Mundt said he preferred that some other Senate group not directly concerned with the controversy do the job, but he bowed to the will of the seven-man group, which voted yesterday to do its own investigating.

Part of the proceedings will be in public, probably before television cameras. The hearings may come later next week.

McCarthy will continue to serve on the subcommittee during the probe and thus, unless there are further rule changes, could play a dual role—that of the investigator and the investigated.

The senator has said he is "fully satisfied that no one on my staff is guilty of improper conduct or using any undue influence on the Army." He said he regards it as being of the "utmost importance" that the public get all of the facts in the case.

Britishers Await Ghost Appearance
HOLYWELL, England (AP)—They're tossing a party at the Ferry Boat Inn tonight for a woman, who, if she exists, is 923 years old.

And spectral though she may be, at least nine of the guests are hoping the old girl will put in an appearance.

The ghost, known as the "White Lady of Holywell," is reputed to have haunted the inn since the middle of the 11th century.

Traditionally, she appears at midnight each March 17.

A. D. Cornell, of the Society for Psychic Research, claims he talked with her last year. She told him, he said, that her name was Juliet Towsley and that she hanged herself in 1050, at the age of 19, because of an unhappy love affair with a woodcutter named Thomas Zoul.

Cornell and eight other members of the society will be waiting for her tonight.

If she shows up, they will go into action with a battery of infrared cameras, a tape recorder and a spectroscopic. They want to find out what little girls are made of when they're nine centuries old.

Demonstration Scheduled On Treating Fence Posts
Farmers can learn the latest on treating fence posts at a demonstration to be held Tuesday at the county fairgrounds near Roseburg, according to Ed Gliden, county extension forester.

Two home preservative methods—cold soak and salt treatments—will be demonstrated. These two methods are most widely used in increasing life of fence posts, Gliden said.

Charles R. Ross, farm forestry specialist from Oregon State College, will demonstrate post treating and answer questions that farmers may have on the best species to use for fence posts.

The meeting is to start at 1:30 p.m., Gliden said.
