Congressmen Introduce Bill For Columbia Funds

WASHINGTON (U.S.)—Two Pacific Northwest congressmen introduced a bill in the House of Representatives Monday in an effort to pave the way for additional appropriations for Columbia Basin projects.
The bill, by Reps. Angell (R-Ore.) and Mack (R-Wash.) would increase the limit for basin projects by 16 million dollars, most of which would be used for The Dalles lock and dam on the Columbia.
If the measure wins House approval, it would permit Congress to allot 45 million dollars to The Dalles, the amount originally sought by the Army Engineers.
The Army Engineers' budget request for The Dalles was cut to \$34,100,000 in President Eisenhower's budget and the House Appropriations Committee, in turn, trimmed the amount to 28 million.
Angell and Mack said if the full 45 million is not budgeted for The Dalles, construction of the huge structure would be delayed a year, with power revenues totalling some 9 million lost in the process.

Damages Asked In Suit From Woods Accident

A woods accident has brought another damage suit against Roseburg Lumber Co., circuit court records reveal.
Delbert D. Keifer has filed suit, seeking \$25,000 general and \$2,400 special damages.
Keifer claims permanent injuries from a mishap on Sept. 8, 1953, in the Lake of the Woods area. He claims the company was negligent in the accident, in which he was knocked off a truck being loaded with logs.

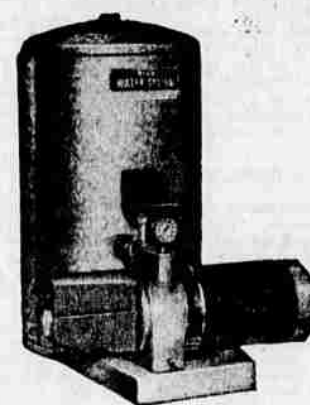
