Income Tax Exemptions Unchanged In Tax Bill

of the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee, said that as a result he has raised from 45 to 80 his estimate of anticipated Democratic gains in the House in November. His Republican counterpart, Rep. Richard M. Simpson of Pennsylvania, replied that the tax action will bring votes to the GOP. He predicted Republican gains of 25 House seats.

As the battle over the higher exemption proposal shifted to the Senate, the administration appeared to face an even tougher fight than it had in the House.

One GOP Senate leader conceded privately he believed the \$100 increase in exemptions would pass the Senate, where there are 48 Democrats to 47 Republicans. In that case, the final version would have to be worked out in a conference between the two branches.

The House afterwards passed by a 338-80 vote the 975-page tax revision bill to which the Democrats had tried to attach the reduction in income levels.

This measure would rewrite the entire tax code for the first time in 70 years. It covers such a broad range of subjects that Senate floor consideration of it may not come for two or three months.

The Finance Committee met again today in closed session to try to report out a House bill to cut 25 excise taxes by a total of \$12 million dollars.

The permanent revision program in the general tax bill would cost about \$1,400,000,000 in revenue the first year. Democrats say the loss would mount to 3½ billions when all provisions take full effect. Republicans dispute this.

The bill would permit corporations to make bigger depreciation deductions during the first years of use of plant and equipment. It also would cut taxes on dividends paid to stockholders.

It would carry a wide variety of fringe benefits for individuals, including increased deductions for medical expenses, deductions for child-care expenses of working women, deductions to farmers for soil conservation expenses, dependency deductions for college students even though they earn more than \$600, and additional deductions on retirement income.

Another provision would extend for a year from April 1 the present 52 per cent corporate income tax rate. Under present law it is due to drop to 47 per cent at the end of this month, which would mean a revenue loss of \$1,200,000,000.

West Germany Passes Rearmament Program

BONN, Germany (AP) — West Germany took the final German parliamentary step Friday to legalize the raising of a 500,000-man army for Western defense. But not a man probably will get into uniform until France approves.

The Bundestag, parliament's upper house, approved amendments to the constitution specifically saying it is legal for West Germany to join the six-nation European Defense Community and to raise armed forces by drafting men over 18.

Six of the nine states whose ministers compose the Bundestag approved the amendments, giving the necessary two-thirds majority. The amendments already had

Atomic Sharing Plan Is Offered To Soviet Union

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States proposed to Russia Friday "a concrete plan to further the peaceful development and use of atomic energy."

The plan was handed to Soviet Ambassador Georgi N. Zarubin by Secretary of State Dulles in a five-minute meeting in Dulles office.

A State Department announcement said also that Russia has given the United States "certain proposals" on atomic problems, and that these are under study.

Presumably the Soviet proposals are for some kind of international agreement to ban atomic weapons.

The plan given to Zarubin by Dulles is a detailed program for carrying out the proposal President Eisenhower made in an address to the United Nations Dec. 8 for an international atomic pool under a world-wide atomic energy agency.

The basic provisions of the proposal are:

1. That the United States, Russia, and other atomic powers including Britain and France should set up an international atomic energy agency.

2. Each of the powers would make contributions from its stockpiles of uranium and other atomic materials to a pool under this agency.

3. The agency would be responsible for storing and safeguarding this material, preventing surprise seizure by a bandit nation bent upon atomic war.

4. The agency would be authorized to mobilize the world's atomic experts to develop the uses of atomic energy for electrical power in power-starved areas of the world and for other peaceful purposes.

a Vietnam withdrawal, that Vietnam Gen. Vo Nguyen Giap might have had enough after losing an estimated 12,000 dead or wounded — one fourth of the force he is believed to have in the area.

But a French army spokesman said last night the Vietnam still were rushing supplies by coolie train and truck up to the area, indicating another mass assault was in the offing. The rebels broke off the desperate charges Wednesday night.

As the artillery duel raged, strafed, rocketed and fire-bombed the bulk of the rebel forces concentrated just north and northeast of the 6-by-4 mile oval plain.

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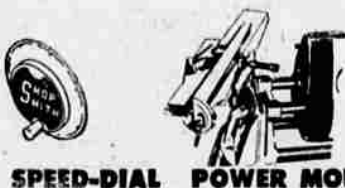
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
