Oregon's Korean War Vets Draw Jobless Benefits

Oregon veterans of the Korean action have drawn \$1,155,034 in federal unemployment benefits since the program started 18 months ago, according to the State Unemployment Compensation Commission.

Claims have been filed by 6,269 former service men and women under Title IV of the veterans readjustment act, which is administered by state agencies through local employment offices. During the same period, thousands of these veterans have been placed on jobs all over Oregon.

Returning service men unable to find work are entitled to \$26 for 26 weeks, but only 155 have drawn the entire amount. If they are entitled to state compensation, veterans may supplement weekly payments by drawing federal funds up to \$26. Eligibility is on the same basis as for state-covered workers.

With employment of discharged veterans as the main object of the program, officials emphasize that the employment service is assisting in maintenance of re-employment rights, in registration for work and in suitable training for new activities. Special deputies in each local office are in charge of veterans' placements and claims.

During the first year of the federal-state program few claims were filed but layoffs in payments of more than \$500,000 in the past three months. Under the post-war II veterans' program (referred to as Title V, the Oregon agency paid out \$2 million to about 100,000 service men and women. Payment conditions were considerably different, however.

The present act will expire five years after the official end of the Korean action.

Justice Douglas, Party On Fourth Day Of Hike

ALONG THE C&O CANAL IN WESTERN MARYLAND (AP)—Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas and a party of hiking companions pushed forward today on their 184-mile walk to Washington, D. C.

Douglas is seeking to demonstrate to two Washington editorial writers, and others who joined the group, that the natural beauties of the government-owned Chesapeake and Ohio Canal would be marred by construction of a proposed federal highway.

The rugged justice, who relishes outdoor life, showed little sign of fatigue. Charles P. Thomas, the 78-year-old retired mail carrier from Washington and oldest man in the group, also was going strong on the party's fourth day.

He will speak at 12:45 p.m. The theme of his speech and the afternoon is "Home, School Relations." Smith urged that people from the community attend the general session between 12:45 and 1:30.

The district has also arranged a display of some 500 books through the Oregon News Co., Portland, for possible selection for the school libraries next year, Smith said.

The district's school pupils will be excused at noon as in past months. Buses will take them home just before noon when classes are dismissed. No lunches for pupils will be served in the school's cafeterias.

Driver Cited In Mishap At Myrtle Creek Span

A traffic accident at the High way 99 bridge at the north edge of Myrtle Creek early Sunday morning resulted in no injuries to the motorists, but one driver was cited for driving in the left lane of traffic.

State police said John Oliver Westwing of Myrtle Creek was cited after his car collided with one driven by Orville J. Shanafelt of Roseburg. Shanafelt and his passenger, Forrest H. H. (Honey) man, had been to a dance hall where they were carrying out their duties as sheriff's reservists.

Officers said Shanafelt was unable to avoid the collision when he met the Westwing car. Westwing allegedly was partly in the left-hand lane of traffic. Both cars received damage on their left sides.

Police also reported a minor accident in front of the Tri-City drive-in theater about 7 p.m. Sunday. No details were available.

ponement but said the court would entertain affidavits as to what the judicial witnesses would say in the matter.

News Story Enters Quis

In questioning prospective jurors, as the trial began, Porter asked that jurors be excused for cause if they had read a News-Review article of March 12 which told of the trial coming up.

Judge East told the attorney to continue his questioning on specific grounds. Porter quipped that apparently local residents read only the headlines of the newspaper, after several jurors said they read the headline, but could not recall the content of the article.

Much of Porter's questioning dealt with reading the newspaper and whether the jurors had read about "Cory's being involved with another woman." Several jurors were excused through challenges by the defense and prosecution.

Earlier, Porter said he felt a new trial should be granted in connection with firearms trial because (1) Cory was acting as a broker on a merchant when he had two .22 caliber revolvers in his possession, (2) he went hunting and (3) there had been an invasion of the relation between attorney and defendant.

In connection with the last named, Porter said a microphone was hidden in the cell where he interviewed Cory in jail here Sunday night. Although he did not claim the sheriff had listened to the interview, he said it was possible. Sheriff Cal Baird told him Porter said that the microphone was not turned on. Stells said it had been used several months ago and, to his knowledge, had not been turned on since.

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
