June 13-19—Umpqua River canoe trip directed by Wilbur Larsen and Smith. Larsen has led the trip for the past two years. He is the field executive for the Three Sisters District (formerly East Lane).

July 19-24—Order of the Arrow camp at Camp Melakwa on the McKenzie River.

July 25-August 14—Camp at Melakwa.

Aug. 1-7—Explorers to log the Skyline Trail from the McKenzie Pass to Crater Lake in conjunction with the U.S. Forest Service.

Smith said the "good turn" nationally this year by the Boy Scouts of America will be in conservation of natural resources at the request of President Eisenhower.

A Douglas Fir District meeting will be held Thursday night at 8 p.m. at Riverside School. Plans for the spring and summer, with the special problem of the district camporee, will be discussed.

Silage Samples Analyzed At OSC

Analyses of dry matter and protein of silage samples sent to Oregon State College have been received, according to Wayne Mosher, assistant county agent.

Results will be disclosed in a meeting of dairymen to be held Friday at 1 p.m. in the Farm Bureau Cooperative on Spruce Street.

Harold Ewalt, extension dairy specialist, will discuss the results and answer questions.

The results of the samples returned show: Moisture content ranged between 69.5 and 83.1 per cent; crude protein per hundred weight of dry matter was between 6.3 and 13.63 pounds; crude protein in each hundred pounds of silage was between 1.75 and 3.74 pounds.

Samples were collected from dairymen in different parts of the county. Those attending the Friday meeting may bring samples in for discussion.
