Obstruction of the bowels in adults is caused by compression of the bowel at some point, as in the opening through which a "rupture" occurs; or by compression from a band of tissue resulting from former attacks or inflammation. These are called adhesions. The obstruction may result from operations or from unnatural conditions arising in the development of the individual before birth. A frequent cause of obstruction of the bowels in children is a slipping of one portion of the bowel into a neighboring part, the manner in which one joint of a telescope slips into another. Twisting of the bowel on itself is still another source of obstruction, and even an almost knotted condition may at times occur. The existence of an accumulation of hardened bowel contents may give rise to complete obstruction.

The pain accompanying a bowel obstruction is usually in the area of the navel. It begins suddenly, is at first intermittent, but later becomes continuous. It varies in intensity from moderate to excruciating pain. Vomiting is also a prominent symptom. First, the contents of the stomach are expelled; then greenish, bilious matter; and, finally, after a day or two, a brownish-black substance of an un-

Youths Selling Soap For Funds For YMCA Camp

If some of Roseburg's younger gentlemen are pleading with you to buy some soap, it isn't because they want to clean up the city.

A soap-selling campaign is under way to raise money for YMCA summer camp at Diamond Lake, July 1-Aug. 1.

Dick Turley, chairman of the camp committee, says a plan is now in operation in which boys wishing to attend the camp will sell boxes of Rossmell soap. A four-bar box costs 50 cents. The boys get 30 cents credit on each sale.

The plan is being worked out through cooperation of the YMCA, local schools and Roseburg Refrigeration. It costs \$25 for a boy to attend the camp. He can earn his own way if he sells enough soap.

Boys from 10 to 15 years, who are in good health and promise to abide by camp rules, are eligible. They can obtain a registration blank at school or at the refrigeration store. With a \$2 registration fee, the boys can sign a contract as soap salesmen. They must also obtain the signature of their parents for the registration card and the contract.

Sales are credited to the account as sales are made. Any boy who isn't able to attend camp this year, or who wants to give his credit to some other boy, may do so — but there's no cash kickback. The money must go for camping.

The annual camp has a capacity of 60 boys. The camp staff will include Y Sec. Don Naden, director; Turley; Mrs. A. H. Terrell, camp cook; a trained nurse, and selected older high school boys to act as tent counselors. Besides Dick Ricketts, Harlow Friday, Dave Maves and Barney Wimer, who served last year, enough additional boys will be selected so there will be one for each seven attending camp.

Naden, who has had more than 22 years experience in working with youth, explained that each boy will sleep in a tent, with cots and mattresses furnished them, during the 10-day camp.

McCarthy and subcommittee Counsel Roy Cohn have tangled with Secretary of the Army Stevens and John G. Adams, assistant Army Counsel, with: 1. An Army report alleging McCarthy and Cohn sought special treatment for a former subcommittee aide now in the Army. 2. McCarthy's counter charge that Stevens and Adams used "blackmail" tactics in efforts to block the subcommittee's search for Reds in the Army.

The subcommittee is now looking for an outside lawyer to help investigate the row. Asked about the McCarthy-Army exchanges, Hall said the dispute has hurt "all disreputable." His comment came just before he talked about campaign strategy at a banquet gathering of the Midwest and Rocky Mountain Republican State Chairmen's Assn.

"There is one person who always speaks for our party," he said in his dinner speech, "and that is Dwight D. Eisenhower. Don't let anybody tell you that because of quarrels in Washington that there is no unity and no leadership."

The GOP national chairman told an enthusiastic audience that the big campaign issues this year would be the economic health of the nation and the "never ending" battle with communism.

Drew Area Residents Ask Livestock District

Seven residents of the Drew area have petitioned the county clerk for an election to establish a livestock district.

Dist. 116 Budget Committee Presents \$634,464 Figure

The District 116 school board has estimated the new budget for the 1954-55 year will raise taxes by about three mills next year. The millage rate is presently 62.

The \$634,464 budget was completed this week by the budget board in the area which embraces Lookingglass, Dillard, Winston and Tenmile. The operating budget has been set at \$508,764. Added to this are bond and interest payments totaling \$104,700 and a serial levy of \$25,000.

A public hearing on the budget is scheduled April 21, and the budget vote will be held April 30 at the three regular voting places, Dillard, Tenmile and Lookingglass schools.

Supt. William Bromley pointed out that a larger amount of estimated receipts this year is the reason for the comparatively small millage increase.

Bromley related that only three major sections of the budget show increases this year. They are: Auxiliary agency (which includes transportation, cafeteria, etc.), fixed charges (insurance has been increased because of the addition of Douglas High School to the system) and instruction (teacher salaries have been increased and new teachers will have to be added).

Following are the major items of the operating budget and their prospective costs.

General control (covers administrative costs) \$12,740; instruction (teacher salaries, library supplies, textbooks and tuition of from 50 to 60 seniors to Roseburg High), \$298,900; operation of plant, \$41,505; maintenance and repair, \$7,342; auxiliary agency \$76,375; fixed charges, \$31,700; capital outlay, \$34,802; debt service, \$500; and emergency fund, \$5,000.

Bromley stated that two or possibly three teachers will be added to the Dillard School staff raising its complement to 21 or 22 teachers, and three will be added at Douglas High raising the staff to 25.

The biggest increase in the budget is the raise in bond and interest payments. Last year, the figure was \$45,000. This year it is \$104,700.

The 10 members of the budget committee started work on the budget Feb. 16. Since then, they have had five meetings to complete it.

Fosback, Dillard, chairman; Andy Jacoby, Lookingglass, secretary; Charles McCord, Dillard; Norman Slack, Winston; Herbert Northcraft, Tenmile; Paul Hult, Dillard, school board chairman; Virgil Vance, Tenmile; James Williams, Lookingglass; Fred Albertus, Winston; and Ralph Fisher, Winston. The last five are school board members.

Single, Able-Bodied Men Can't Get Relief

PORTLAND — Single, able-bodied men will not be granted welfare aid, the State Public Welfare Commission decided Friday.

Recognizing that many such men are not able to find jobs, the commission indicated that it may undertake a program of helping them find employment during winter months.

Such employment programs have been successful in Missouri and in Los Angeles County, Mrs. Lea Howard, administrator, reported.

The commission also tentatively decided to retain the policy of removing 14-to-17 year olds from aid-to-dependent-children rolls during July and August. Such a policy is an incentive for the children to look for jobs, the commission reported.

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Mitchell Says Security Risk Standard Invalid

GARY, Ind. (AP)—Democratic National Chairman Stephen Mitchell says standards get by the Eisenhower administration to determine security risks in government are "invalid and ludicrous."

Mitchell told a Lake County Democratic meeting Friday night that both Chief Justice Warren and Secretary of State Dulles could come under the administration's definition of a "security risk" if they were to leave government service.

He said 2,427 government workers had been dismissed under the new security program, but that Philip Young, Civil Service Commission chairman, said "only 383 of the total had any gossip or suspicion or crank letters in their files suggesting any connection with disloyalty or disloyal persons."

Young "would not testify that as many as a single one of these is claimed to have been actually a Communist," Mitchell said, and added:

"To show you how far this kind of thing has gone, if Chief Justice Earl Warren were to leave government employ, he would be called—under Republican definition—a security risk and become number 384."

"That is because his personnel file, as a government employee, now carries the baseless and malicious charge—made prior to his confirmation—that he has followed the Marxist line."

"On the same basis, Secretary of State Dulles stands labeled also a security risk."

"He was an associate of Alger Hiss in the Carnegie Foundation for International Peace. In fact, it was he who investigated and recommended Hiss to be the foundation's president."

"The fact that even Mr. Warren and Mr. Dulles fall within the Republican definition of security risks simply proves how invalid and ludicrous those criteria are."

"And it proves that the claim of the Eisenhower administration to have 'cleaned out' subversives from the government' is false and political."

The guardian asked for assurance from wartime experts such as Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer and Dr. Vannevar Bush that they "had satisfied themselves that all will be well with the coming experiments."

Dr. Oppenheimer is the American scientist who headed the "Manhattan Project" which made the first atomic bomb. Dr. Bush was wartime American director of the Office of Scientific Research and Development.

Little River Timber Tract To Be Auctioned

A tract of timber of Little River will be auctioned off by the Umpqua National Forest in the supervisor's office April 30.

The parcel contains 2,550,000 board feet of timber, all but 100,000 of which is Douglas fir. Appraisal price of \$20,210 includes \$8.20 a thousand for Douglas fir and \$1.20 for western hemlock and other species.

The bid price must include deposits of 10 cents a thousand for slash disposal and 35 cents a thousand for planting.

Creditors Agree To Settlement Of Defunct Bank

CLIO, Ala. (AP)—A creditors' committee sought unanimous agreement from depositors today to take a 10 to 15 per cent loss so a \$75,000 deficit in the Clio Merchants Exchange can be liquidated without a court fight.

Eighty-six of an estimated 200 customers of the unchartered, uninsured money exchange agreed on the settlement at a mass meeting last night, but another 40 or so took the prepared agreement contracts home.

The creditors' committee, headed by Easterlin, was empowered to act on behalf of the townspeople and the defunct exchange provided all depositors are willing.

One dissenting vote, however, would automatically void the proposed settlement because any disgruntled depositor could force the troubled affairs of the privately operated check-cashing agency into bankruptcy.

Absent from the meeting in the high school auditorium was Royall Reynolds, 40-year-old president of the exchange whose 12-day disappearance earlier this month brought on an investigation which showed the \$75,000 shortage in his accounts.

He was in jail in Clayton, Ala., the county seat, on embezzlement charges.
