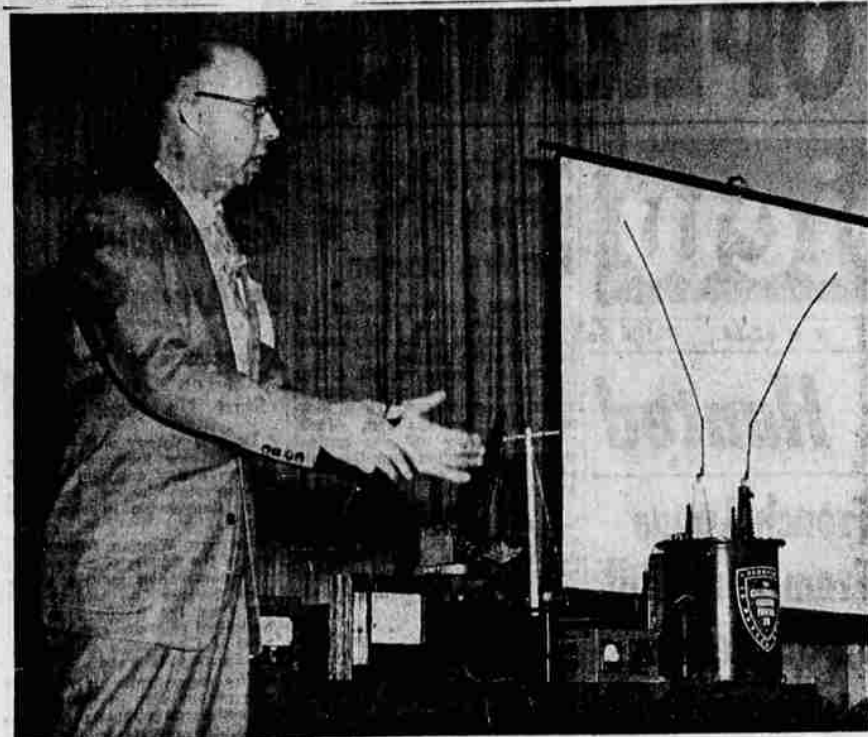

and the nation "most profound admiration for the brave and resourceful fight being waged by troops from France, Vietnam, and other parts of the French Union" in the battle now raging for the fortress of Dien Bien Phu. The President asked his message be conveyed to the garrison commander, Col. Christian DeCastries, whom he had already singled out for praise at his news conference Wednesday.

The President's gesture underlined a Defense Department announcement it is sending 25 more B26 bombers and other supplies to the defenders of Indochina.

More Aid Urged

A House Foreign Affairs subcommittee on Saturday declared that any Allied attempt to seek a truce in Indochina "would mean 'appeasement equivalent to an Indochinese Munich.'" It called for accelerated U.S. military aid to the French and Indochinese and for continuing the conflict under the United Nations as an international one—a policy the French have opposed. It said a grant of "complete independence" to the Indochinese was necessary to rally them.

Roseburg police Monday were investigating another theft from a beer truck.

1500 Britons Rescued From Burning Vessel

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) — Fifteen hundred Britons were safe ashore here today after being whisked from a burning troop ship in one of the greatest sea rescues of history. Four crewmen were the only fatalities.

The survivors—among them 277 women and children and 17 invalid soldiers—calmly and quickly abandoned the fiercely blazing British transport Empire Windrush 20 miles offshore in the Mediterranean early Sunday. The flaming hulk of the 14,631-ton vessel was left adrift, a total loss.

Four rescue ships that sped to the scene and plucked the survivors from the sea brought them to Algiers.

Three men and one officer were killed in the engine-room explosion that rocked the vessel and set it ablaze.

The cause of the blast remained a mystery. Some Algerian newspapers quoted the Empire Windrush's skipper, Capt. W. Wilson, as saying, "The possibility of sabotage was not excluded." This remark could not be directly confirmed, however.

Engineer Vance Perry Not Statement Given

A statement credited to Vance Perry, engineer of the Southern Pacific train which plowed into a car on Dole Road Thursday, actually came from another source.

The wreck, about four miles north of Myrtle Creek, caused slight injuries to Sandra and Jerry Maris, a pair of Myrtle Creek High School students. It was reported that Perry stated the brakes were not effective because the load being pulled by the train was too light. This actually was conjecture on the part of a person who appeared on the scene immediately after the wreck. Perry would not make comment until he had made his report to Southern Pacific officials.

75-Year-Old Glide Man Succumbs Sunday

Elia A. Hester, 75, resident of Glide, died Sunday March 28. He was born March 24, 1879, in Clairborne Parish La. He had lived in California a number of years before coming to this community in 1935 to make his home. He had engaged in the farming industry on Cavitt Creek. He was a communicant of the Episcopal Church.
