Eisenhower Asks Broad Powers To Cut Tariffs

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proposals would get in Congress. Those same doubts still apply now that Eisenhower has accepted the suggestions in general, bundled them together into a message and asked Congress to do something about them. Many members of the President's own party in the Senate and House adhere to the historic GOP position that tariffs should be kept relatively high to protect domestic industry against cheap imports.

The commission, headed by Clarence Randall of Chicago, president of Inland Steel Co., turned in its report Jan. 23.

The core of the report and the Eisenhower message is a recommendation for a three-year extension of the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act, which expires June 12, and for expanded authority for the president to negotiate tariff adjustments with other countries on a give-and-take basis.

The secretary was interrupted 12 times by applause as he spoke to 1,000 persons at the dinner. Dulles said that at the forthcoming Geneva conference on Far Eastern problems the United States will not be "disposed to give communist China what it wants from us, merely in exchange for its promises of future good behavior." He said the United States would not abandon the Chinese Nationalist government on Formosa and encourage its "bloody inquisition by the Chinese Communists."

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meet everyday problems. It became a problem for the mother alone, and she could not meet the demands made by her son. Another factor; the stepfather felt he owed nothing to the boy. He claimed he had merely married the mother; the boy was not included in his family. This is one of many cases heard in juvenile court at Roseburg in which there is such a situation.

In this case the mother had sympathized with Sammy to such an extent that she lost all judgment and protected him to such a degree that, even today, the boy has strong hostile feelings against anyone who attempts to aid him.

Trainings, Praise Advised

In all probability the boy will be antagonistic to law enforcement officers and will, in turn, contaminate those about him with similar feelings. Juvenile workers are hoping that during his stay at McLauren School for Boys, away from his parents, he will gain understanding of his problem and in some way learn to help himself.

This case was outlined by Julian Halleck, assistant juvenile officer, to point out to parents the need to train children to accept responsibility. In doing this, the child must be praised when a responsible task is done by the youngster.

Some parents think it's cute when a child blames his brother or sister for some deed he has done. They do it in such a warm and disarming manner that we often chuckle about it afterwards. But children should be made to realize the difference between right and wrong as soon as possible. Also, those who have studied cases say the child must be encouraged to do certain jobs about the home — even if it is only hanging up his undies.

Timber Bidding Inconsistent With Market

Bidding of timber remained inconsistent with the condition of the lumber market Monday when two tracts of Umpqua National Forest timber were sold for prices far above appraisal estimates.

Douglas fir sold for \$35.05 a thousand in the first of the sales — a tract of 255,000 board feet of timber located 25 miles east of Cottage Grove. Appraised price of the species was \$16.40. The tract was purchased for \$8,793.75 by R. R. Tuttle, McKenzie Bridge. Appraised price of the tract was \$4,131.25. Hemlock and other species went for the appraised price of \$6.25 a thousand.

The parcel drew 11 bidders. Others were P. D. Kuiper, Remington and Galdabini, Louis A. Poole, Ivan Harris Lumber Co. and Farmer and Sons Logging Co., all of Cottage Grove; Alton F. Chittester and Bohemia Lumber Co., both of Clisp Creek; Alton Bros., Eugene; Charles E. Defoe, Cheshire; and H. A. Lillgren, Disston.

The second tract was located about 15 miles south of Tillamook and was owned by the Johnston and McPherson, Medford. It was 390,000 board feet appraised at \$3,013. Douglas fir, appraised at \$3.55, sold for \$24, and white fir and other species were let for the appraised price of \$3.30.

Other bidders included Timber Products Co., Medford; Ted Ross Logging Co., Cannonville; and Harbor Plywood Corp. of Oregon, Riddle.

Basque Dancers Stage Concert Program Tonight

A colorful village festival will be brought to the stage of the Junior High School auditorium tonight at 8:15 when the Euzkadi (pronounced "You - Ka - Dee") troop of Basque dancers bring their native songs and dances in the last of the winter community concert series.

The Basques, people of a province that lies both in France and Spain, bring a weird selection of instruments to the audience. They feature a flute, the "tixtut", which has only four finger holes, is a rustic end-blown flute, which the flutist plays while beating out the rhythm on the drum with the free hand.

LOW TEMPERATURES

Nighttime temperatures will range in the 30's and 40's for the next five days, the weatherman says, and there will be frequent periods of frost.
