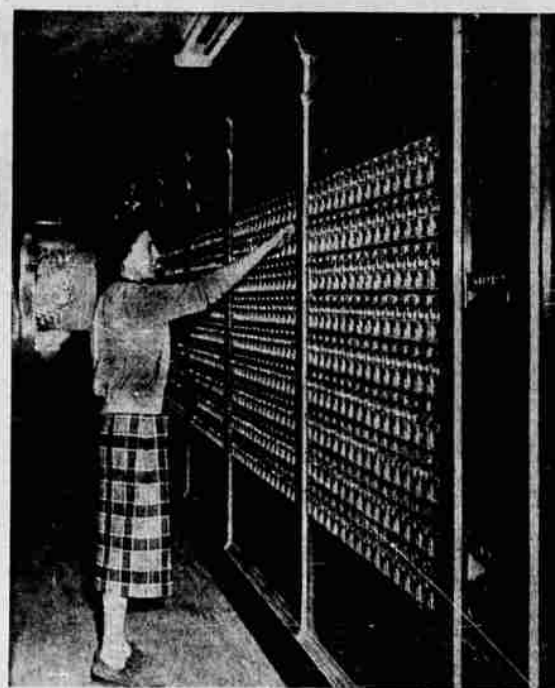
Student council members of Douglas High have adopted the constitution for the Associated Student Body of the school. The student council consists of all class presidents and student body officers.
