PORTLAND (AP) — A Portland cabbie has a thank you note for suggesting a hiccup remedy for Pope Pius XII.

Clarence D. Miner, 67, read that the pontiff, ill with a stomach ailment, also was bothered by hiccups. Drinking liberal shots of ginger ale, he found, had always relieved his own attacks. So he wired the suggestion to the Vatican two weeks ago. It cost him \$2.79. Promptly the acknowledgment came. It expressed gratitude for Miner's concern, thanks for his suggestion, and concluded: "The secretariat of state of his Holiness is directed... to communicate that his Holiness gladly invokes upon the sender abundant heavenly favors and blessings."

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Park Blocks Considered For Underground Parking

PORTLAND (AP) — The Park Blocks in downtown Portland would become the site of partially underground parking garages under a plan being considered by a group of private investors.

Par bureau officials are expected to disapprove.

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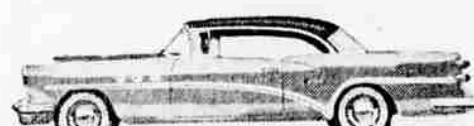
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
