

Indian Baseball '9' Wins Shutout

The Roseburg High baseball team opened its regular season with a non-league 4-0, three-hit win over Cottage Grove at Finlay Field Wednesday afternoon.

Both teams got only three hits, but the Indians were in command all the way behind the tight pitching of Jerry Droscher, Gary Crenshaw and Chuck Verrel, who together walked two Lions and struck out 14.

The Indians afield played error-

less ball while Cottage Grove made five misplays in addition to several wild pitches by Lion moundsmen.

Roseburg scores came in the first, third and fourth innings, but the Indians threatened through most of the game and in the fourth and sixth the side was retired with the bases loaded.

In the first inning, with Don Lunan pitching for the losers, Jerry Parmeter opened play with a one-bagger to center. Fred Hargis struck out and Parmeter advanced to third as Dennis Brundage was safe at first on a fielder's choice play.

Catcher Nub Beamer batted in the first marker by a centerfield flyout and then Wayne Price batted a three-bagger to right field to tally Brundage. Dick Calkins rolled out to second to end the inning with the score 2-0.

Coach Bill Harper's charges came back with a third run in the third frame. Parmeter reached second on the centerfielder's dropped fly ball and then scored as Brundage collected Roseburg's last hit of the game, a double to left.

Two walks loaded the bags, but Calkin's flyout ended the threat.

In the fourth, with pitcher Don Heck going for the Lions, the Indians picked up one more as Duke Ricketts, who walked and was sacrificed around by Bill Oerding, tallied on Parmeter's fly to centerfield. Previously, Dick Stevenson, also on base by virtue of a walk, was thrown out at the plate.

The closest Cottage Grove came to scoring was in the fourth inning against Crenshaw. Jim Bollerfing singled and Ron Rice doubled to center. On the next play, however, an attempted squeeze play found Batteroff tagged out at the plate by Beamer.

Droscher and Verrel each worked three innings, with the latter striking out eight batters and Droscher four. Crenshaw struck out two in one inning — the fourth — stopping that threat.

Axemen, Pelicans, Indians Slate 3-Way Track Meet Here Saturday

One of the feature track events of the season will bring Eugene's defending district champs and the strong Klamath Falls Pelicans to Finlay Field to match strides and strength with Coach Frank Purdy's undefeated Roseburg Indian track team Saturday afternoon.

In three meets so far this season, Purdy's trackmen have overpowered three schools, Myrtle Creek, Myrtle Point and Canyonville, and in doing so have demonstrated well balanced strength and some excellent individual performances.

One school record, in the shot put, has already been broken by senior Ed Ware's toss of 45.8 in last week's meet with Myrtle Point.

Other top performances have been turned in. Mark Robbins leading the team in the two long runs and Gene Lane and John Duval strengthening the Indian field mile.

Eugene's third place finishers in the state last season, return with a graduation-riddled team that has yet to be tested in meet competition this year.

From a turnout of 60 candidates, the Axemen's main force seems to lie with all-around performer and letterman Denny George. George's best marks include a 10.2 100 yard dash, a 21-10 broad jump and a 20 second plus low hurdle event.

George also runs a leg on the relay team. Eugene's other letterman is distance veteran Don Meskimen.

At Klamath Falls, new Coach Len Surles has eight returning lettermen, including three-fourths of the 880-yard relay team which placed second in the state meet last season.

Nineteen competitors are expected to represent Klamath, led by senior letterman Jim Dougherty, second in the state last year with a 1m of 15.4 in his high hurdles.

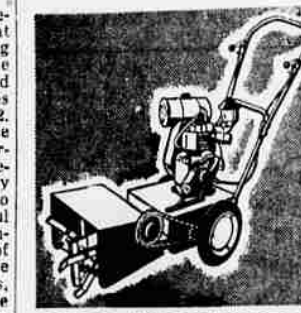

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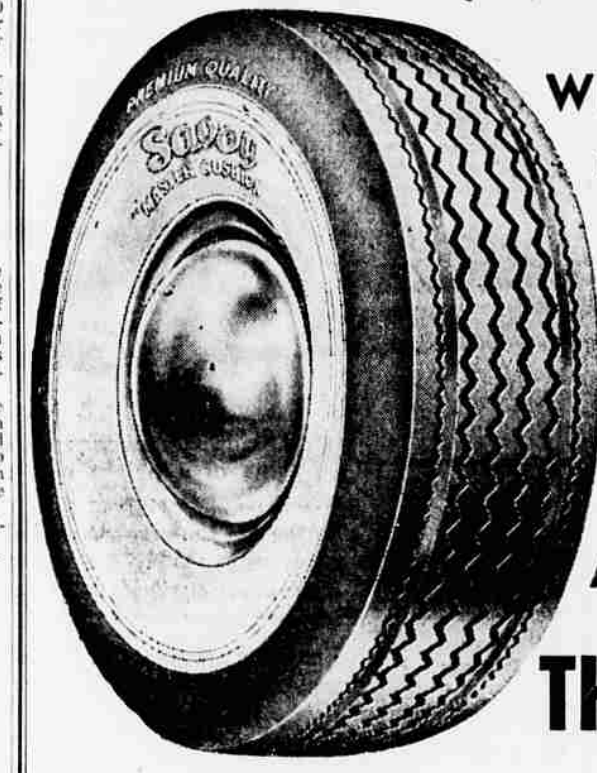
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
