Pakistan And Turkey Sign Assistance Pact

KARACHI, Pakistan — Pakistan and Turkey, the latter NATO's easternmost member, have signed a five-year mutual assistance pact agreeing to cooperate in defense and economic matters.

The United States had welcomed the agreement, announced Feb. 19, as a constructive step toward bolstering the free world's defenses. The Soviet Union, a northern neighbor of the two Moslem nations, assailed the alliance, charging it creates an anti-Russian "military bloc in the Near and Middle East."
